## School Report.

of the School Committee and Superintendent of Schools.

#### NORTH YARMOUTH.

I have the honor of presenting this report covering a period of seven months of my Superintendency and five months of my predecessor.

#### TEACHERS—

The teacher makes the school. The scholars are always with The School Committee rarely changes from its fixed policies. The Superintendent can outline his courses of study, suggest plans and methods, instruct to a limited extent, and be helpful in times of trouble. But in the schoolroom the teacher must ever be supreme. She must be the guiding spirit of the work and of the play. In the rural school, she must possess tact and judgment in dealing with the problems of discipline, in the room and in the school yard, in attention to the cleanliness of school buildings, care for the sanitary conditions and keep a general oversight of everything connected with the school. To secure teachers possessing these qualifications at the salaries we can pay is difficult. That it is possible is evidenced by the fact that we have had, with one exception, during the past year, a good teach-That we have failed to retain these teachers, is a matter of regret to both Superintendent and School Committee and a distinct loss to the pupils and the community. seem advisable to place all teachers on a salary schedule, starting with a small minimum salary and leading to a stipend sufficiently large to retain all teachers giving satisfactory service. for your consideration the following graded salary schedule,

similar in plan to those to be placed before the citizens of the other towns of the union.

Each year at Normal School and each two years of satisfactory teaching experience elsewhere may count for a year's service in the town upon the recommendation of the Superintendent, and the approval of the Committee.

#### TEXT-BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

Our text-books are in good condition and the only changes which need to be made will be in the text-book of the geography to be used, and new language texts.

In view of the demands for better industrial training, it would be well to add some manual work and an appropriation of \$30 00 in addition to the usual amount for supplies might well be made for this purpose.

#### AGRICULTURE.

Every rural community should demand that its schools foster the spirit of the dignty and greatness of agricultural labor. It is the community, of which our town is one, which supplies to the world its life. Our boys and girls ought to be taught to sense the great responsibility that devolves upon them, and the school with its school gardens, and home gardens, connected with the work of the school might be made a valuable asset to the community. In this connection, it will be apparant to all, that, the only way in which this highly desirable end may be reached, is in retaining our teachers sufficiently long, that they may become acquainted with what can and what ought to be done, and gain time through a knowledge of the work of the school, to do the work in the agricultural line.

## Warrant for Town Meeting.

To E. G. Hayes, a Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth in the County of Cumberland.

#### Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday, the tenth day of March, A. D., 1913 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2 To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3 To hear and act on the reports of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4 To hear and act on the report of the Trustees of the School Fund and vote how the money shall be expended,
- Art. 5 To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 6 To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7 To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.

- Art. 8. To raise money for the support of Schools and of the Poor, for the repairs of Roads, Bridges, and School houses, for the payment of Town Officers, for Text Books, High School Tuition, extermination of Brown Tail Moths, Contingencies and Cemeteries.
- Art. 9 To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, apparatus, appliances and other school supplies.
- Art. 10 To see if the town will vote to mow the bushes within the highway and raise money for the same.
- Art. 11 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, also Chapter 21, Public Laws of 1911, and Chapter 183, Public Laws of 1911, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1913.
- Art. 12 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and set apart to be expended in building a state road.
- Art. 13 To see if the town will vote to accept such persons as bondsmen as the Treasurer and Collector may present.

- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to unite with other towns in employing a superintendent of schools, provided satisfactory arrangements can be made for such a union, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to place the care of the Buxton Lot, so called, in the Walnut Hill Cemetery, with the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 16. To see what instructions the town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to sell the Smith schoolhouse, so called.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this warrant and your doings to one of us, on or before the day of said meeting.
