Report of the School Committee and Superintendent of Schools.

We respectfully submit the following report for your consideration:

On the whole, the past year may be regarded as a very successful one for the schools of the town. The attendance has been good until the winter term. Owing to the severe weather and frequent interruptions caused by sickness among the pupils, the average is a little below that of the preceding terms. The long distances which many of our pupils are required to travel to reach the school building in many of our country towns, renders it unsafe many times for the smaller children to attempt to go to school on severely cold days.

Good progress has been made along nearly all lines, and although it has been necessary to make frequent changes in our teaching force, the new teachers employed have in nearly every case proven satisfactory.

The same general plan of work has been followed as last year.

TEACHERS.

At the opening of the fall term, Miss Alma E. Jordan was employed for the Walnut Hill school and her interest and enthusiasm made this one of our best schools. We were very sorry to be obliged to accept her resignation at the close of the term. Miss Grace Percy was employed for the winter term. Miss Percy is a normal graduate and a teacher of several years' experience. The vacancy in the Hicks' school was filled by Miss Bertha L. Winslow, who is doing very satisfactory work. Miss Fannie L. Hersey, who succeeded Mrs. Libby at the Buxton school, is doing good work. The Dunn school has had the good fortune to be able to retain the services of the same faithful teacher, Miss Charlotte Small.

The teacher is manifestly the most important factor in connection with school work. For while much may depend upon other conditions surrounding the schools, without the services of faithful, efficient teachers, the best results need not be looked for. Our schools are not above criticism, for no system has ever yet been devised that cannot be made a little better.

TEXT BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

Our text books, with the exception of the old Morton geographies, are in fairly good condition. It will be necessary to purchase some new primary geographies the coming year as many of the old Morton cannot be used. New language books would add much to the advancement as well as to the interest in this study.

The usual amount of supplies has been purchased and the schools have been supplied with all necessary material in this line.

REPAIRS.

The usual incidental repairs have been made. The school buildings in North Yarmouth are a credit to the town and the citizens will undoubtedly see that sufficient money is appropriated each year to keep them in good condition.

MUSIC.

One of the prominent indications of progress and up-to-date methods was evidenced when it was learned that music was taught in the schools of the town. The pupils in but few of our country towns have this privilege. Under the direction of the present musical instructor, the scholars are doing excellent work. The expense to the town is not large but the benefits derived from this training is of untold value. Now that you have this department in our schools continue it by all means.

We regret that the old-fashioned singing school is practically a thing of the past; but such being the case, the next best place for musical instruction is in our public schools.
