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### 2024 Geddes W. Simpson Lecture

## Pain, Opioids, and the Search for Relief: A Political History



Monday, October 7 | 3:15 PM, EST | Hill Auditorium, Barrows Hall

#### You are invited to attend the 2024 Geddes W. Simpson Lecture

Dr. Keith Wailoo is Henry Putnam University Professor of History and Public Affairs at Princeton University where he teaches in the Department of History and the School of Public and International Affairs. He is widely known for award-winning writing that is both academic and public facing, historical and timely. His books include Pushing Cool: Big Tobacco, Racial Marketing, and the Untold Story of the Menthol Cigarette (University of Chicago Press, 2021); Pain: A Political History (Johns Hopkins University Press, 2014); How Cancer Crossed the Color Line (Oxford University Press, 2011); The Troubled Dream of Genetic Medicine (Johns Hopkins University Press, 2006), with Stephen Pemberton; Dying in the City of the Blues: Sickle Cell Anemia and the Politics of Race and Health (University of North Carolina Press, 2001); and Drawing Blood: Technology and Disease Identity in Twentieth Century America (Johns Hopkins University Press, 1997).

Pushing Cool received the 2023 Hughes Prize from the British Society for the History of Science which considers books which are "accessible to a wide audience of non-specialists." The New Yorker named Pushing Cool one of the Best Books of 2022. It was also shortlisted for the Stone Award from the Museum of African American History and named a finalist for the Association for the Study of African American Life and History Book Prize. Dying in the City of the Blues received six awards, including the Welch Medal for best book in the field, from the American Association for the History of Medicine and the Lillian Smith Book Award from the Southern Regional Council for best book on issues of race and social justice. It also won awards for best book in interdisciplinary humanities scholarship, and best book in medical innovation; and on the politics of disease." In 2007 Wailoo was elected to the National Academy of Medicine. In 2021, he was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. From 2020 to 2022, he was President of the American Association for the History of Medicine.

Before joining the Princeton faculty, Wailoo was Martin Luther King Jr. Professor of History at Rutgers University and founding director of its Center for Race and Ethnicity. Before Rutgers, he taught at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in the School of Medicine and in History. His research has been supported by the National Institutes of Health, the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Investigator Awards in Health Policy Research, and the James S. McDonnell Foundation's Centennial Fellowship in the History of Science.

Wailoo is a graduate of Yale University where he earned a Bachelor's in Chemical Engineering, after which he worked as a science writer for several years. He earned a Ph.D. from the University of Pennsylvania in the History and Sociology of Science.

The University of Maine Foundation recently received a \$1 million gift from the Agnes Ann Walsh estate to establish a new named chair in the **Department of Modern Languages and Classics**. In addition, Agnes Ann funded the Agnes Ann Walsh '41 Scholarship to benefit students majoring in romance languages. These contributions are legacy gifts of the class of 1941 alumna who sadly passed away in 2021 at the age of 100.

The inaugural chair is **Frédéric Rondeau**, associate professor of French and director of the Canadian-American Center.

"Agnes Ann Walsh's bright spirit and passion for the University of Maine during her lifetime will now live on through her generous gift and the many students who will benefit from her generosity," said University of Maine President Joan Ferrini-Mundy.


Christie is advised by associate professor Liliana Herakova.


