Report of the School Committee and Superintendent of Schools.

We submit the following report for your approval.

The schools of North Yarmouth are in line for progress. That the schools exist for the benefit of the children, and that their interests are the chief interests involved, seem to be truths so obvious that no one could overlook or disregard them; yet we must ever keep in mind that we must be unselfish in our service to the children and endeavor in every way possible to promote their welfare. We should try to make our service as valuable as possible and to make the returns to the community for the money it provides as large as possible. The next aim should be to utilize fully the ability of each scholar by assigning him the work best suited to his qualifications, and by making the conditions under which he works favorable and enjoyable.

TEACHERS.

We have had a staff of teachers the past year that have labored hard for the welfare of the pupils under their charge. After the opening of the fall term, which is the beginning of the school year, we have made no changes. This is a decided advantage, as a frequent change of teachers does more to check the advance of a school than anything else.

Our teachers are fully alive to the fact that while books, to be sure, are to be studied, and studied chiefly, in most of our schools, yet they realize there is much for the teacher to do towards the growth of the mind which is not to be found in school-books, and it is the practical recognition of this fact that constitutes the great difference in teachers. Truth, in whatever department, is open to the faithful teacher. The profession of teaching is advancing. Much more is required of the teacher of the present than the teacher of ten years ago. This may well be so; for within that time quite

an advance has been made in the compensation offered to teachers. When our people are convinced that teachers are better than they were years ago, then they will be ready to reward them.

TEXT BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

We have carried out the suggestion made last year and have commenced to displace the old Morton geographies that were badly worn by substituting Tarr and McMurry and the Dodge. The schools have been furnished with Textbooks and supplies. We used a portion of our appropriation for music books.

REPAIRS.

Before the schools opened in the fall the Buxton, Walnut Hill, and Hick's schoolbuildings were made cheerful and attractive by having the walls and ceilings tinted. Later a portion of the fence, at the Walnut Hill school, was rebuilt. The purposes for which the appropriation is asked this year will be fully explained by your committee if desired.

PROMOTION.

The promotion of pupils is a matter requiring not only constant and careful attention, but good judgment and a steady resolution to serve the best interests of the individual child. The tendency is to hold pupils back, unduly, rather than to push them forward too rapidly. There is no single standard of measurement by which the fitness of all may be determined. Every wise and experienced teacher knows that the written test so often applied is entirely inadequate and in many cases misleading. The teacher who has to make out the promotion cards at the end of the year, possibly after only one term of service with the pupils, must have something as a guide. The all-important question which must be asked and answered is, where is the best place for this child? Where will all his educational interests be best served? When this has been carefully considered and determined according to the best judgment of the teacher and superintendent, the child should be placed there.

MUSIC.

We regret the illness of our music teacher. The work in music has been of an exceptionally high character. Near the commencement of the year the New Educational Music System was adopted. The aim has been to make the music period one of pleasure as well as educational value. The fundamentals of music have been taught step by step. When the child first enters school he is taught simple little songs which appeal to the little people. Great care has been taken in the choice of good material. These songs are gradually increased in difficulty, according to grade and understanding. With this song drill, theory must be presented in an interesting manner. Individual work and sight singing trains the child to think and act independently, and in this way gains confidence in himself which is an aid, not only in music, but in other things which may be required of him.

Warrant for Town Meeting.

To C. L. Dunn, a Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth in the County of Cumberland.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town, on Monday, the eighth day of March, A. D. 1915, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the Trustees of the School Fund and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 9. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.
- Art. 8. To raise money for the support of Schools and the Poor. For the repairs of Roads, Bridges and School houses. For payment of Town Officers, Text Books. High School tuition, extermination of Brown Tail Moth, Cemeteries and Contingencies.

- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, apparatus, appliances and other school supplies.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State aid as provided in section 20 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 00 for the improvement of the section of state aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges: the above amount being maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of section 19 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 12. To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of state and highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provision of section 9 and 18 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 13. To elect one or more fire wards; also to designate one fire ward as a fire inspector, fix the compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to change section 3 of the by-laws of the North Yarmouth Cemetery Commission so it shall read as follows:
The duties of said Commission shall be the care, management and improvement for burial purposes of the cemeteries of North Yarmouth. Said Commission shall consist of five persons who shall be elected; one for five years, one for four years, one for three years, one for two years and one for one year. All vacancies shall be filled at the next annual Town Meeting for the unexpired term.

- Art. 15. To Choose a Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 16. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer, and Town Clerk. On revising the Jury box.
- Art. 17. To hear the report of the Committee chosen at our last annual Town Meeting to investigate, estimate and obtain plans for a new Town House, and take any action thereon.
- Art. 13. To see what instruction the Town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to accept such persons as bondsman as the Treasurer and Collector may present.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said Town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons desiring to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant and your doings, to one of us, on or before the day of said meeting.
