

Warrant for Town Meeting.

To C. L. Dunn, a Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth in the County of Cumberland,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town, on Monday, the thirteenth day of March, A. D. 1916, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the Trustees of the School Fund and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 6. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.
- Art. 8. To raise money for the support of Schools and the Poor, for the repairs of Roads, Bridges and School Houses. For payment of Town Officers, Text Books, High School tuition, extermination of Brown Tail Moth, Cemeteries, Contingencies and Cutting Bushes.

- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, apparatus, appliances and other school supplies.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 12. To see whether the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of state and highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provision of Section 9 and 18 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 13. To elect one or more fire wards, also to designate one fire ward as a fire inspector, fix the compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to unite with other towns in employing a Superintendent of schools, providing satisfactory arrangements can be made for such a union, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 15. To see what instruction the Town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said Town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons desiring to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant and your doings, to one of us, on or before the day of said meeting.

Report of the School Committee and Superintendent of Schools.

The following brief report of the condition of our schools is submitted for your consideration and approval.

The people of North Yarmouth have a right to expect that our public schools should train their children for good citizenship. When the home, the school and the community work together, we may expect results such as all interested citizens are looking forward to with interest. When our boys and girls see their part in making their community life all it can be, they will not be satisfied with poor roads, a low production per acre on our farms, a school that is inefficient or a lack of the greatest of all powers, neighborhood co-operation in every undertaking which is for the welfare of the town. The school should be first in raising the standard of community life. When the older pupils are careful in their treatment of the younger ones, when all are loval to their teacher and respectful to all with whom they come in contact, then the discussion relative to the education of our pupils will be to see how plans may be formulated whereby those children may be lifted to the highest round of the ladder of The formation of habits of neatness, the proper success. care of all school property and the love for beautiful surroundings combined with a knowledge of how to do things well, is the future capital by which our boys and girls may obtain good situations, when they have finished their school course, and go out into the world to work for themselves.

TEACHERS.

The past year has been one of unusual success. We have been fortunate in our selection of teachers and the interest manifested by all has been worthy of the highest commendation. Every elementary school teacher admits that it is difficult to teach all branches so as to get equally satisfactory results. We often hear our teachers say, "I feel almost discouraged about my sixth grade arithmetic class" or "my fifth grade language class is not doing good work" or "my eighth grade does very good work one day but poor work the next." This is characteristic of all our schools and does not signify, in the least, that our teachers are inefficient or lack enthusiasm. It is one of the inevitable conditions that now exists and always has existed since public schools were established. It is conditions of this kind that we are endeavoring to overcome by getting the pupils especially interested in the study that seems hard to him.

The teachers of North Yarmouth are those who have had Normal training, or a number of years experience, thus fitting them to meet and overcome the obstacles that all teachers have to face some time during their teaching career.

TEXT BOOKS.

Owing to the large number of pupils attending the Hick's school and for lack of room in that building several of the pupils were conveyed to the Walnut Hill school necessitating the addition of several new books, as we could not take any from the Hick's school at that time. The demand for primary arithmetics has been much larger than formerly owing to the promotion of a large number of pupils to a higher grade where a text book was required. The schools have been well supplied and a majority of the pupils take an interest in taking good care of new books furnished.

REPAIRS.

The school buildings have received careful attention. The Walnut Hill building has been shingled, the Buxton painted outside and the interior of the Dunn thoroughly painted. The other incidental repairs have been attended to. The expense the coming year will not be as large as last year.

MUSIC.

Our music teacher has been unable to carry on the instruction in music during most of the winter term but our teachers have carried along the work to the best of their ability and the music teacher has been much pleased with the results. We hope to be able to resume the work in spring.

A nice piano has been purchased for the Dunn school owing to the efforts of the teacher and the hearty cooperation of parents and pupils.
