#### TOWN WARRANT

To C. L. Dunn, a Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth, in the County of Cumberland, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town, on Monday the eleventh day of March, A. D. 1918, at ten o'clock in the foremoon to act on the following articles to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 6. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.
- Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commission for five years.
- Art. 9. To raise money for the support of schools and the poor. For the repair of roads, bridges and schoolhouses. For payment of town officers, text books, high school tuition, cemeteries, cutting bushes and contingencies.

- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, apparatus, appliances and other school supplies.
- Art. 11. To elect one or more Fire Wards; also to designate one Fire Ward as a fire inspector, fix the compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18 of the Revised Statutes of 1916 in Chapter 25.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to finish the repair on the Town House and take any action thereon.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to sell the old seats and furniture of the Town House.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will join the State Highway Commission in making a sum of \$100.00 to be used in grading the patrol road.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the Poll Tax to three dollars or take any action thereon.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to make a discount on a person's tax if paid on or before a given time and fix the time and the discount.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to sell the School House on Sligo road.

- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to have Music taught in the schools and take any action thereon.
- Art. 21. To fix the price of men and horses per day and all town officers not fixed by law.
- Art. 22. To raise the sum of \$14.00 for the Collector and Treasurer's bond.
- Art. 23. To see what instruction the town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons desiring to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant and your doings to one of us on or before the day of said meeting.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE

#### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Committee and Citizens of the Town of North Yarmouth:

I hereby present you my fifth annual report. The work done by our schools for the past year has been on the whole very satisfactory. All departments have worked together in harmony. Our teaching force is one of the best we ever had. To have good schools we must have good teachers, and to have good teachers we must pay salaries large enough to attract and keep them. It is poor economy to engage any who are not the best that we can afford. Your superintendent and committee feel that every inducement possible should be brot to bear, to retain the present teaching staff another year.

We realize that the teacher is the most vital and important factor in the whole school system. Though all the other elements of efficiency are supported they count for nothing with an inefficient teacher in charge. Conversely, a good teacher will make up in large measure for many deficiences in other parts of the system. teacher should be a person of broad culture, good education and thorough training, combined with health, character, tact, and a willingness to work. North Yarmouth has gone ahead of many country towns with a larger population, in increasing the salaries of her teachers. Nevertheless, owing to the great changes that have taken place in the nation since the call "to arms" came in April 1917, we must face the stern fact that our teachers must have a salary commensurate with the increased cost of living. An appeal to the citizens of North Yarmouth seems almost unnecessary, for we feel, judging from the

attitude of the town in the past, in regard to school appropriations, that whatever sums the school board recommend to be raised, will be voted by the town.

The schools must be the most democratic institutions in our country. Here the rich and the poor meet on equal They sit side by side, study the same lessons and receive the same instruction. Each one stands upon his own merits without regard to the kind of clothes he. wears, or the wealth or social standing of his parents. The talent of the poor boy whether in the class or on the playground is respected equally with the rich. Real success has no favors to bestow upon either poverty or It depends upon industry, perseverance and wealth. nobility of character. These cannot be bought with money nor can any be deprived of them because of a lack Our country boys are to fill large places of responsibility in the future; may we do our part in educating them for the world's redemption.

#### PROGRESS

Excellent discipline has prevailed in our schools thruout the year. Only one case of corporal punishment has been reported. The attendance has been good until the winter term. Owing to the severe weather and many cases of sickness the schools have been somewhat broken up. The Buxton has suffered most in this respect.

With one exception our teachers are Normal graduates, therefore the methods used are up to date and good results have followed the efforts put forth. All branches have received attention and while all show improvement, special mention should be made of the work in arithmetic and history. Thoroughness and accuracy have been the aim of our teachers. The time has been well improved both in preparation and recitation. I am pleased to note that some of our teachers are requiring not only accurate work, but accurate analysis of problems.

#### REPAIRS AND IMPROVEMENTS

As reported last year our school buildings are in good general repair. The steps at the Hicks school must be repaired. That portion of the blackboard surface near the stoves in the Buxton and Walnut Hill schools should be replaced with new boards as it seems doubtful if repainting will put them in usable condition. The boards at the Dunn have been unsatisfactory for a long time. The special recommendations of last year have been attended to, i.e., the water-coolers have been purchased, the grading done at the Buxton, and new blackboards purchased for the Hicks school.

#### MUSIC

We hope that music may be continued in our schools the coming year. Rote singing has been carried on by some of the teachers, but the work in this department is retrograding. Let us not under-rate the value of music in our public school. We have presented, with pride, North Yarmouth as an example of progress in up-to-date requirements in her schools. Let us cling to our high standards.
