## TOWN WARRANT

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To A. L. Dunn, a Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth, in the County of Cumberland, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Monday the twelfth day of March, 1923, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 6. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7. To choose all such officers as required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.
- Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commission for five years.
- Art. 9. To raise money for the support of schools and the poor. For the repair of roads, bridges and culverts and school houses. For payment of

town officers, text books, high school tuition, cemeteries, cutting bushes and contingencies.

- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, appliances, apparatus and other school supplies.
- Art. 11. To elect one or more Fire Wards; also to designate one Fire Ward as Fire Inspector, fix the compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will join the State Highway Commission in making a sum of \$50.00 to be used in grading the patrol road.
- Art. 15. To fix the price of men and horses per day, and all town officers not fixed by law.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will buy a Collector's and Treasurer's bond.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to unite with the Towns of Gray and New Gloucester in the employment of a Health

Officer and District Nurse as set forth in the laws of the State.

- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to discount taxes or take any action thereon.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to sell their title in the Cumberland Water Co.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to accept \$100.00 in payment of their claim on the Josephine Dalton property or take any action thereon.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to complete the horse sheds now under construction on the town-house lot and raise money for the same.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to pay outstanding notes of Mary E. Lawrence and Hollis A. Swett and raise money for the same.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to remove old vault and finish off the room for Selectmen's office also raise money for same.
- Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to relieve C. L. Dunn from taxes due from him as Collector.
- Art. 25. To see what instructions the town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons desiring to have their names entered upon said list at the Town House, at nine o'clock in the forenoon on day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to one of us on or before day of said meeting.

## SCHOOL REPORT

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To the Citizens of North Yarmouth:

The essential purpose of every school is realized in the results it produces in the lives of its pupils. Of necessity, these children are judged mainly by what is discovered in the home by parents who are really interested in the welfare of the child, but home duties or the force of habit keeps them from visiting our schools and forming an opinion first hand. The times demand the help of our citizens in the management of our public schools, the greatest asset of any prosperous town.

Unless we are in close touch with our schools we are not able to measure thoroughly the teachers success. "Equal opportunities for all the children of all the people" is our motto, and in this spirit school facilities are being improved each year. Effort is being made to make the rural schools of Maine the foremost in the union thru centralization which will bring good buildings and equipment, afford a division of labor for teachers, and afford high school privileges for all the pupils who graduate from our grammar grades. Maine is taking advanced grounds in regard to health and sanitation, and North Yarmouth is one of the towns that is keeping up with other progressive towns in these matters. Buildings are being standardized in regard to light, heat and ventilation. Grounds and outbuildings are receiving attention. The Dunn school building has been modernized the past year and it is now one of the pleasantest buildings in town. A larger school ground is the one need at the present time. Our high school pupils are doing excellent work and those in college are an honor to the town.



## PROGRESS AND TEXT BOOKS

The Beacon Readers introduced last year are proving a great success. Our children have made greater progress than by any other system ever used in our public schools. The inexperienced teacher can get good results at an expenditure of less time and effort than by any other phonetic method now in use. No new books have been introduced this year. The teachers employed by your school board the past year have proved to be efficient and very good disciplinarians. At the opening of the fall term it took three weeks of the term to get the school at Walnut Hill organized as it should be. At the close of the fall term we had two resignations, Miss Sanford at the Buxton school and Miss Kimball at the Hicks school. These were excellent teachers and the committee were sorry to lose them; but we were fortunate in our selection for the winter term, and while the term has been a short one we are convinced that the continuance of these teachers, Miss Marshall and Mr. Besaw, will be for the good of these schools.

But few new books have been purchased. It was necessary to buy a few more copies of the new Frye-Atwood geographies introduced last year, and the book committee advised the purchase of a few inexpensive copies of the classics for the two upper grades. *Evangeline* and the *Courtship of Miles Standish* were selected. *Silas Marner* has been used in one school and the class has done work worthy of special mention. They have improved wonderfully in their reading and papers written from the synopsis prepared by members of the class were productions worthy of older pupils.

We cannot repeat this statement too often,—education in the true sense of the word is the key to the solution of the world's problems.

The youngest children in our public schools are those who should have the best teachers, if any discrimination is to be made. Emergency situations will occur and must

be taken care of, for the sake of the children, as soon as possible, and we hope our citizens will face willingly the problem of maintaining adequate schools in charge of competent, well trained and well paid teachers.

### MUSIC

The union music teacher, Miss Dunton of Cumberland Centre, seems to be the right person in the right place. She is making the music instruction a vital element in the education of our boys and girls. Her continuance in this position will be for the best interests of all concerned.

REPORT OF LOCAL BRANCH OF A. R. C.

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Report of local branch of A. R. C. of the work done by public health nurse, Miss Louise Sherwood.

Each child in all schools has been individually inspected by the nurse.

13 children have been taken to a dental clinic.

It was found that in our schools:

63 children were under weight,

64 children had bad teeth.

22 children had enlarged tonsils.

A course of fifteen lessons has been given by the nurse on Home Hygiene and Care of the Sick. Eight students receiving certificates. Many others attended several of the lectures but did not take the examination.

The nurse has made many instructive visits to homes of school children and children under 1 yr., and has given bedside nursing care wherever and whenever called.

Total number of all visits in the three towns during the months when a Public Health Nurse was on duty for the year 1922 is 836. A little less than one third of these have been in North Yarmouth.
