## TOWN WARRANT

To Francis E. Hayes, a Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth, in the County of Cumberland.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Monday the tenth day of March, 1924, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:—

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 6. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7. To choose all such officers as required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.
- Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commission for five years.

- Art. 9. To raise money for the support of schools as follows: Common schools, text books, repair of school houses, appliances, apparatus and other school supplies. Music and high school tuition.
- Art. 10. To raise money for the repair of roads, bridges and culverts. For support of poor, payment of town officers, cemeteries, cutting bushes and contingencies.
- Art. 11. To elect one or more Fire Wards; also to designate one Fire Ward as Fire Inspector, fix the compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will join the State Highway Commission in making a sum of \$50.00 to be used in grading the patrol road.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to complete the horse sheds now under construction on the town house lot and raise money for the same.

- Art. 16. To fix the price of men and horses per day, and all town officers not fixed by law.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will buy a Collector's and Treasurer's bond.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to unite with the Towns of Gray, and New Gloucester in the employment of a Health Officer and District Nurse as set forth in the laws of the State.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to discount taxes or take any action thereon.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to pay outstanding notes, with interest, of Mary Lawrence and Hollis A. Swett and raise money for the same.
- Art. 21. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk on revising the Jury Box.
- Art. 22. To see what instructions the town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons desiring to have their names entered upon said list at the Town House, at nine o'clock in the forenoon on day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to one of us on or before day of said meeting.

## SCHOOL REPORT

To the Citizens of North Yarmouth:

The plan of retaining teachers in schools where the work is progressing satisfactorily has been followed as usual and the advantage of the teacher's knowledge of the conditions and requirements of the school has in nearly every case been evident. The services of efficient teachers have been lost to the schools by their resignation. The cause of the resignations were beyond the control of the The effects upon the schools must be school officials. regarded as a matter for regret. The same teachers as were employed for the winter term of last year were retained for the spring term of this year. At the opening of the new school year in September we were obliged to make but one change and that was at the Dunn school. Miss Lucille Skofield of Weld. Me., was employed for that school for the fall term and Miss Eva M. Clark for the winter term. It is always a difficult problem for the school board to secure and hold efficient teachers in all The town of North Yarmouth has been very our schools. fortunate, in the past, in having teachers in town who were available to carry on the work.

Each school is a little community consisting of teacher and scholars who are living together a conscious, purposeful life whose ideals, morals, and occupations are all tending to lift it to a higher level. Therefore in planning and conducting the administration of a school we must not look for immediate results—must await future developments.

#### PROGRESS AND TEXT BOOKS

Only those text books, which were needed to make the required number for classes that were made larger by promotion or new pupils moving in from other towns, have been purchased. The new Lewis Spellers were adopted by the three towns comprising the union and we now have the uniform course, as these spellers are designed to accompany the Beacon System of reading.

Miss Abbie Buck of the Maine Public Health Association visited our schools in December and was much pleased with the interest manifested by both teachers and scholars in this work.

#### MUSIC

At the opening of the school year, Miss Hazel Jones of Auburn was employed as music supervisor in place of Miss Dunton who resigned and accepted a fine position in New Hampshire. Until we can pay our music teacher a larger salary I think it is wisdom for us to employ a local teacher, as the long distances to travel and the board consumes the larger part of her wages.

#### REPAIRS

The school buildings have been looked after by the committee, and all necessary repairs made. The largest expense the coming year will be the painting of the Dunn school building, and a few new desks are needed. The Hicks school lack desks enough for the pupils registered, and the castings are broken on two or three of the seats at the Buxton. The steps at Walnut Hill should be rebuilt.

#### CONCLUSION

The attendance the past year has been about the average. In each of our schools illness or accident has kept several of our pupils at home for several days, much against their will. These cases require our sympathy. Many pupils become discouraged if they are obliged to lose much time. Every one has trials and difficulties. Some are much more easily discouraged than others. They should have just the word they need. Some have to struggle hard to keep pace with their classmates under favorable conditions and when discouragements come, a smile, a nod or a word now and then will keep up their courage to the sticking point. Notice every good effort. and reward it with some kind of recognition. The teachers are those who inspire their pupils to heroic efforts. Since they cannot always measure their own success it is well for the teacher to point it out to them. Show them some of the difficult things they have mastered and if they excel in only one thing be sure you encourage them in that one. Make it plain that the future will be no more difficult than the past if they are ready to meet the future bravely.
