TOWN WARRANT

To Francis E. Hayes, a constable of the Town of North Yarmouth, in the County of Cumberland.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Monday the ninth day of March, 1925, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

- Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 6. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7. To choose all such officers as required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.
- Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commission for five years.

- Art. 9. To raise money for the support of schools as follows: Common schools, text books, repair of school houses, appliances, apparatus and other school supplies. Music and high school tuition.
- Art. 10. To raise money for the repair of roads, snow roads, bridges and culverts. For support of poor, payment of town officers, cemeteries, cutting bushes and contingencies.
- Art. 11. To elect one or more Fire Wards; also to designate one Fire Ward as Fire Inspector, fix the compensation and raise a sum of money for the same.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will join the State Highway Commission in making a sum of \$50.00 to be used in grading the patrol road.
- Art. 15. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter Four, Section Fifty-nine of the Revised Statutes of Maine, the same to be expended by the Maine Development Association.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the rate of High School tuition to meet the requirements of the

advanced rate in other towns to which we send pupils.

- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to straighten the Gray Road, so called, at its point of intersection with the New Gloucester Road, so called, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to buy an adding machine and raise money for the same.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to let the town hall.
- Art. 20. To fix the price of men and horses per day, and all town officers not fixed by law.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will buy a Collector's and Treasurer's bond.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to discount taxes or take any action thereon.
- Art. 23. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk on revising the Jury Box.
- Art. 24. To see what instructions the town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons desiring to have their names entered upon said list at the Town House, at nine o'clock in the forenoon on day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to one of us on or before day of said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT

North Yarmouth has been exceedingly fortunate in its choice of teachers the past year. Before the opening of the schools in September your committee had elected four teachers who were those of experience and they have proved their worth. Three of these teachers are residents of North Yarmouth. The Hicks being a large rather difficult school we felt it to be the wiser plan to continue a male teacher in that school, for at least, another year and Mr. Roy Berry of Woodfords was chosen for that position. Because of my illness I was able to visit the schools only twice, when I was advised by my physician to go easy and if possible have some one to help me. The members of the school board and the selectmen of the union came to my relief and Mr. F. W. Norton of Cumberland was employed to assist me for three months. His labors began Oct. 20, 1924 and ended Jan. 20, 1925. The field work was given over to him while the clerical work was retained by myself. Mr. Norton proved an efficient helper and I am sure the schools were well looked after. In his report to me after he had completed his term of service he spoke well of the North Yarmouth schools. His report included all the schools of the union with the exception of Chebeague island, which I visited myself, so I am unable to give his report verbatim. was a source of satisfaction to have a stranger come into the union, one who was unacquainted with the teachers and our school system in general and give such a fine report of his impressions.

TEXT BOOKS

Several new text books have been purchased for the schools as they were needed. The Long Histories have been provided for the seventh and eighth grades; supplementary readers for the lower grades, new physiologies to replace those worn out were sent to Miss Baston of the Buxton school and a few of the New Lewis Spellers, introduced last year, and adopted, were furnished Miss Hayes of the Walnut Hill school. Mr. Berry of the Hicks school considered that the time had arrived for his fourth grade to have a text book in geography and Emerson's Geography of New England, a new upto-date book, published in 1924, for fourth and fifth grade pupils was selected. We hope all the schools can have this book another year.

REPAIRS

The school buildings have had the necessary repairs made and the improvements suggested last year have been attended to by your committee. It was not necessary to purchase new desks for the Hicks school as the attendance is not as large as last year. I consider it economy to paint one of our school buildings each year. The Buxton needs painting the most of anyone of our school buildings. Nearby towns often refer to North Yarmouth and comment on the interest shown in this town in the care of its school buildings. A worthy example for other towns to follow. But few towns in the State, of its size, have more up-to-date schoolhouses than this town. Let us keep up our reputation in this respect.

CONCLUSION

We feel that from every view-point the work of the schools has been a success. Fortunately no serious in-

terruption has occurred on account of sickness or for other reasons. The discipline in our schools has been maintained without severity or friction. Progress in studies has been uniform and thorough. I am unable to make any definite report in relation to music. Two of our teachers have had music as a part of their daily program and we hope that after the annual town meetings in the three towns composing the union some arrangements can be made for its continuance in all our schools. We have those on our list of teachers who are qualified to act as music supervisor having taken a musical training course that amply fits them for this work.
