TOWN WARRANT

To Willard E. Baston, a Constable of North Yarmouth, in
the County of Cumberland,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to meet at the Town House, in said Town, on Monday, the 14th day of March, A. D. 1932, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of Poor, and Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees and vote how the money shall be expended.

Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.

Art. 6. To receive accounts against the Town and raise money for such as may be allowed.

Art. 7. To choose all such officers as required by law to be chosen in the month of March, annually.

Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commissioner for five years.

Art. 9. To elect one or more Fire Wards, also to designate one Fire Ward as inspector, fix the compensation and raise money for the same.

Art. 10. To raise money for the support of schools, as follows: Common schools, textbooks, repair of school-houses, appliances, apparatus and all other school supplies, music and high school tuition and school contingent.

Art. 11. To raise money for the repair of roads, snow roads, bridges and culverts, for the support of poor, payment of town officers, cemeteries, cutting bushes and contingencies.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the Town is allowed to raise under the provision of Chapter 25, Section 18, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will join the State Highway Commission in raising the sum of \$50.00 to be used in grading the Patrol road.

Art. 15. To see what sum the Town will raise for maintenance and resurfacing the Third Class highway, as per State law.

Art. 16. To see what action the Town will take on cutting and removing bushes on State and Third Class highways, as per law.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will cooperate with the State in controlling the white pine blister rust in North Yarmouth and raise \$200.00 for same. The State guarantees to add fifty per cent to the amount raised by the Town, the total sum to be used on eradication work.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

Art. 19. To fix the price of men, horses and trucks per day and all Town officers not fixed by law.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise an additional sum of money for the repair of the Hayes' Mill bridge.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the services of the nurses of Cumberland County Public Health Association.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to buy the land and building formerly used by W. J. True as a blacksmith shop, same to be used for housing the tractor; also to raise money for the same and for any necessary alterations.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to elect our Selectmen this year in the following manner: one for 1 year, one for 2 years, one for 3 years, and thereafter each year one for 3 years.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Collector's and Treasurer's bond.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to discount taxes and to charge interest on same after October 1, or take an action thereon.

Art. 26. To see what action the Town will take in joining Yarmouth to protect the North Yarmouth Town landings in the Town of Yarmouth and raise money for the same.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to buy snow fence and raise money for the same.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to take any action on painting and making any necessary repairs on the Town House and raise money for the same.

Art. 29. To see what instructions the Town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to set a time when the taxes of 1932 shall be paid.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town books audited for the ensuing year.

Art. 32. To see what action the Town will take in authorizing the Cemetery Commission to use the income of the General Fund of the Cemeteries for the improvement of the yard.

Art. 33. To have the records of said meeting read and adopted.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons desiring to have their names entered upon the voting list at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to one of us on or before day of said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1932

To the School Committee and the Citizens of the Town
of North Yarmouth:

I herewith submit the annual report of the public schools in North Yarmouth for the year ending February, 1932.

In times of hardship people think seriously on all questions. At such times enterprises are evaluated truly. While many enterprises have become insolvent through extravagance and mis-management, public education stands forth as a sound institution presenting to the youth of the country the best that our civilization has to offer.

None of the faults that have caused our present depression are chargeable to the youth of the country nor to that institution—public education. The taxpayers of the country can turn to the public schools as practically the only investment that has appreciated in value. How many concerns stand in such an enviable position? Few enterprises could long weather the public scrutiny that public education is glad to accept. Since this is a fact, citizens should consider all ways and means to strengthen and broaden public education which serves every individual in every community.

I quote the following from the 1928 Annual Report of the State Commissioner of Education.

“We are told by students of society and economics

that the human wealth of a country is five times its material wealth. The greatest resource of the State, therefore, is not visualized as a million horse-power in our streams, 2,500 miles of sea coast, thirty-five billion feet of timber or 60,000 farms, but in the 248,000 children and youth of the state."

It is quite important that this great human resource be properly conserved.

According to the figures for 1931, the Town of North Yarmouth is making the following investment in each youth of the town:

Cost of eight years of elementary' education per pupil,	\$ 366 32
Cost of four years of high school (tuition) per pupil,	395 80

	\$ 762 12

In addition to the items indicating school development as listed in the 1930 Town Report—I add the following:

Adoption of the book—"The Art Teacher" as a basis of the drawing and art work; adoption of "The Pathway to Reading" as the basal reading system; complete study and use of the new State Course of Study completed September, 1931; improvement of teachers through a Professional Library; improvement in janitor and bus service through conference before opening of school.

This total investment per individual about equals the cost of a moderately priced automobile. This investment, however, is expected to extend over the allotted period of threescore years and ten and may come back to the human race in the form of leadership and service that cannot even be estimated in terms of material wealth. In times such as these we are fortunate, indeed, to have an investment at our very doors that brings such handsome returns.

The Superintendent and Teachers are always glad to meet any patron by appointment to discuss individual problems that may arise.

Patrons are cordially invited to visit the schools and see at first hand the progress being made. In this connection, however, teachers will be greatly assisted in the administration of their schools if parents would visit in very small groups and also for periods not exceeding one-half hour.

Many parents also appreciate the wisdom of delaying their visits in the fall until the schools are well-organized in order that a correct impression may be gained of the schools. We all know how little it takes sometimes to create an unnatural atmosphere in the schoolroom and it is very difficult, indeed, for a teacher organizing a school to have situations forced upon her over which she has no control.

REPORTS TO PARENTS

I desire to call to the attention of the parents some features of the report cards issued to the pupils.

All marks are general estimates of the pupil's attitudes and attainments and are as accurate as it is possible for an unbiased person to definitely grade any individual. The fact that your child may receive a B and another child in his grade may receive an A should never be considered the basis for registering dissatisfaction.

We thoroughly believe that the child of ten talents should produce according to his talents and not according to an individual of less ability. Therefore, in our reports to the parents we endeavor to bring to their attention our opinion of whether or not the child is using his ability to best advantage.

Spaces are provided on the report card for giving general estimates of qualities such as cooperation, conservation and application. We feel that these qualities are even of greater importance than the amount of subject matter consumed or retained.

Spaces are provided also on the report card for statements regarding any particular attainment or need of the individual and whether or not he is up to grade. Spaces are provided also to insert the number of health points acquired by the child. One health point is given for each of the following:

- Normal or corrected vision.
- Normal or corrected hearing.
- Normal or corrected nose and throat.
- Normal weight.
- Normal posture.
- Normal care of teeth.
- Birth record.

TOWN PLANNING

Perhaps by exercising foresight such as our forefathers did in laying out the West and in planning some sections in the East, we can help our descendants establish even better educational facilities than we are providing. Recently a neighboring district cut \$7,500 worth of pine from its town forest and modernized a school plant with the proceeds. There may be waste land in our town that, if taken over by the town and planted to pine, would materially help in retiring bond issues or in modernizing school plants in the future. The first cost is the only cost in such a venture. Why not thus turn liabilities into assets?

I recommend that a Town Planning Committee be created to look into this matter and into the features of economy, conservation, and beautification fostered by regional planning. Such a Committee, through interest and research, could help all officials serve their town toward its best interests.
