TOWN WARRANT

To Lester F. Smith, a constable of North Yarmouth, in
the County of Cumberland,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to meet at the Town House in said Town on Monday the 12th day of March, A.D. 1934, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of Poor and Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees and vote how the money shall be expended.

Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.

Art. 6. To receive accounts against the Town and raise money for such as may be allowed.

Art. 7. To choose all such officers as required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.

Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commission for five years.

Art. 9. To elect one or more fire wards, also to designate one Fire Ward as Inspector, fix the compensation and raise money for the same.

Art. 10. To raise money for the support of Schools as follows: Common schools, text books, repair of school-houses, appliances, apparatus and all other school supplies, music and high school tuition, insurance and school contingent.

Art. 11. To raise money for the repair of roads, snow roads, bridges and culverts, for the support of poor, payment of Town officers, cemeteries, cutting bushes and contingencies.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the Town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 25, Section 18 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments.

Art. 15. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the

purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will join the State Highway Commission in raising the sum of \$50.00 to be used in grading the Patrol road.

Art. 17. To see what sum the Town will raise for maintenance and resurfacing the Third Class highway, as per State law.

Art. 18. To see what action the Town will take on cutting and removing bushes on State and Third Class highways as per law.

Art. 18A. To see if the Town will hire additional snow equipment for the removal of snow for the ensuing year, or take any action thereon.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to buy snow fence and raise money for the same.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will cooperate with the State in controlling the White Pine Blister Rust in North Yarmouth and raise money for the same. The State guarantees to add fifty per cent to the amount raised by the Town, the total sum to be used on eradication work.

Art. 21. To fix the price of men, horses and trucks per day and all Town Officers not fixed by law.

Art. 22. To see what sum the Town will raise for maintenance, and resurfacing the Special road as per law.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the services of the nurses of Cumberland County Public Health Association.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to instruct Selectmen and Treasurer to enter into an agreement with

the men working for the Town to deduct 25 per cent, of all their orders to apply on their taxes.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to choose a Budget Committee of fifteen, no member of which shall be a Town officer or pay a tax of less than \$60.00.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer to release and convey any title the Town may have in any real estate sold for taxes on settlement of said taxes in any way satisfactory to the Board of Selectmen.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the Town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,050.00 for the purpose of maintaining the first year of high school in the town hall.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Collector's and Treasurer's bond.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to discount taxes and to charge interest on same after Oct. 1st or take any action thereon.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to set a time when the taxes of 1934 shall be paid.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to have the Town books audited for the ensuing year.

Art. 33. To have the records of said meeting read and adopted.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said

Town and hearing and deciding upon applications of persons desiring to have their names entered upon the voting list at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to one of us on or before day of said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1934.

To the School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of
North Yarmouth:

I herewith submit the annual report of the public schools in North Yarmouth for the year ending February, 1934.

On approaching the close of this fiscal year we are mindful that North Yarmouth has undertaken the solution of its problems in an understanding and constructive manner. It is a matter of history that any other course leads only to confusion and ultimate disaster. Those connected with North Yarmouth educational work are, therefore, very appreciative of the town's forward-looking policy and have endeavored to show that appreciation through earnest effort in maintaining the highest ideals in their work at all times.

The educational policy of this town is part of the educational policy of the American People as a nation. Our local, state, and national patriotism is nothing more than an indication of our love for our children; to the extent that we believe that our institutions and our ideals are worth preserving for our children—just to that degree are we patriotic.

Education must be universal if we are to attain the full meaning of the great American Ideal—"Equality of Opportunity". Through sacrifices we make provision for the health of our children. Child labor through the sixteenth year has been eliminated; the American People could boldly take that step because a place had been prepared

to receive these children. They believe that these growing children should be transferred from the crushing and depressing wheels of industry to the guiding and uplifting forces of the public schools which have been developing during the past decades.

The open doors of the sensible, practical public school system beckoned to the American People and focused their attention on "Equality of Opportunity." As a result, the American People demanded that every child in this nation should be permitted to develop physically, mentally, morally, and spiritually under the guidance of helpful influences. The children have been freed to receive this instruction. We cannot take these children from industry—present them for guidance and then close the doors with them on the threshold. The Federal Relief Program even recognizes the importance of adult education and guidance so we cannot consider curtailing the advantages for those who are immature in all respects. Business is improving and any ground lost to education during the past few years should be regained at once in order that the elimination of child labor may be an asset to these young people affected instead of a liability. North Yarmouth has an obligation to help maintain confidence in our institutions.

The public is interested especially in two phases of public education. First: **The quality of its teaching force.**

The quality of the teaching force determines the quality of the school system. Capable, well-trained teachers conduct happy, interesting and stimulating schools. Children under such supervision develop and grow into citizens capable of carrying forward our institutions. No community can afford to undermine the quality of the teaching force in its schools. To permit material accumulations to decay is waste but the effect of deterioration in the supervision of the unfolding of a child's life is far too serious to contemplate. Quality in the guidance of youth renders to us all a greater service than quality in any other

phase or walk of life. Serious thought should be given to the methods of maintaining this quality.

If salary is a means of attracting quality among employees in the business world perhaps it would be well to estimate the value to education of such an attraction. Our mode of living still requires some foresight. Society is still critical of the man who cannot pay his bills. Young people in planning a career, therefore, find it necessary to consider the importance of entering fields that offer some assurance that they can meet their future financial obligations. When financial obligations can be met without serious worry—the culture offered through an educational career can be obtained more easily than through dedicating one's life to the service of education. It is my belief that the quality needed in the training of youth should not be permitted to escape because of these money considerations.

Second: The public is interested in the opportunities offered for all-round development of the individual. We need trained leaders but we also need an enlightened public capable of selecting those leaders. We, as a nation, believe that our leaders should be of our choice. Educators occasionally present impractical plans and policies just as our business leaders do. There are necessarily experimenters in the educational field as well as in the field of business. However, those interested in the administration of public education are continually evaluating the courses offered. They realize that a very large majority of those completing the high school course must conform at once to the requirements of a complicated world. The training of these young people, therefore, must stimulate in them an appreciation and a will to understand those conditions. There must be a harmonizing of the whole school life with the everyday life of the adult population.

There is a tremendous force at work in our schools that is modern to some extent yet very vital in this problem of

harmonizing. I refer to the courses in homemaking, agriculture, industrial training, commercial work, music, athletics and similar activities. All of these activities help the whole child to blossom out in harmony with the world in which he lives. Educational authorities have recognized and incorporated these additional foundation stones because the technique of the business world is not confined to proficiency in the three R's. This program does not retard the progress of those planning to continue work in higher education. It is possible to maintain higher standards in the college courses because those interested in other fields have courses provided for them. Although North Yarmouth sends its children to other towns for their high school work—I include this to further enlist support for such a vital part of the high school program.

Many of the citizens of North Yarmouth undoubtedly will be interested in a pamphlet published by the National Education Association entitled, "Desirable Social-Economic Goals for America". These pamphlets sell for ten cents each and are available at the office of the Superintendent of Schools.

Junior High School (Grade 9).

Last year figures relative to establishing a central grammar school were presented in the town report. No action was taken.

Eighteen (18) pupils are enrolled in grade eight this year. These young people could receive their first year of high school work in North Yarmouth provided the town should vote to make provision for the same. Such provision would involve equipping the present Town Hall to accommodate a school of 18 first year high school pupils—and to provide a teacher and materials.

It is my belief that the students would greatly profit by such an arrangement because these eighteen pupils all in one class would have the undivided attention of a well-qualified teacher. One year of such training would be of

tremendous help to these young people coming from our four ungraded schools where much of the morning must be devoted to work of the lower grades.

The following comparative figures show that for one year of education under such a plan, the town would save the difference between \$1,800.00 and \$1,425.00 which equals \$375.00 and the permanent equipment purchased would still be the property of the town. This equipment increased the above saving by \$285.00.
