## TOWN WARRANT

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To Lester F. Smith, a Constable of North Yarmouth, in  
the County of Cumberland,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to meet at the Town House in said Town on Monday the 11th day of March, A.D. 1935, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of Poor and Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the North Yarmouth School Fund Trustees and vote how the money shall be expended.

Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.

Art. 6. To receive accounts against the Town and raise money for such as may be allowed.

Art. 7. To choose all such officers as required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.

Art. 8. To choose a Cemetery Commission for five years.



Art. 9. To elect one or more fire wards, also to designate one Fire Ward as Inspector, fix the compensation and raise money for the same.

Art. 10. To raise money for the support of Schools as follows: Common schools, text books, repair of school-houses and all other school supplies, music and high school tuition, insurance and school contingent.

Art. 11. To raise money for the repair of roads, snow roads, bridges and culverts, for the support of poor, payment of Town Officers, cemeteries, cutting bushes, contingencies and interest on Town notes.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid, as provided in Section 20, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art. 13. To see what sum the Town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the Town for State Aid highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionment.

Art. 15. To see what sum, if any, the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, Public Laws of 1931.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will join the State Highway Commission in raising the sum of \$50.00 to be used in grading the Patrol road.

Art. 17. To see what sum the Town will raise for maintenance and resurfacing the Third Class highway, as per State law.

Art. 18. To see what action the Town will take on cutting and removing bushes on State and Third Class highways, as per law.

Art. 18a. To see if the Town will hire additional snow equipment for the removal of snow for the ensuing year, or take any action thereon.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to buy snow fence and raise money for the same.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will cooperate with the State in controlling the White Pine Blister Rust in North Yarmouth and raise money for the same. The State guarantees to add fifty per cent to the amount raised by the Town, the total sum to be used on eradication work.

Art. 21. To fix the price of men, horses and trucks per day and all Town officers not fixed by law.

Art. 22. To see what sum the Town will raise for maintenance, and resurfacing the special road as per law.

Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the services of the nurses of Cumberland County Public Health Association.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to instruct Selectmen and Treasurer to enter into an agreement with the men working for the Town to deduct 25 per cent of all their orders to apply on their taxes, or take any action thereon.

Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to choose a Budget Committee.

Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer to release and convey any title the Town may have in any real estate sold for taxes on settlement of said taxes in any way satisfactory to the Board of Selectmen.

Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow by temporary loans such sums of money as may be necessary to pay bills of the town, in anticipation of unpaid taxes for the current year 1935, or take any action relative to the same, subject to the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 83, of the Revised Statutes of the State of Maine.

Art. 28. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk on revising the Jury Box.

Art. 29. To see what action the Town will take to repair Hayes Mill bridge and raise money for the same.

Art. 30. To see what action the Town will take to close some of our winter roads.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to accept the names of the different roads in Town, as presented by the Selectmen, and to take any action thereon.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to procure a loan in anticipation of the payment of the tax deeds or take action thereon.

Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to adopt daylight saving for the year 1935.

Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to buy a Collector and Treasurer bond.

Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to discount taxes or take any action thereon.

Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to set a time when the taxes of 1935 shall be paid.

Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to have the books audited for the ensuing year.

Art. 38. To have the records of said meeting read and adopted.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said Town and hearing and deciding upon applications of persons desiring to have their names entered upon the voting list at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to one of us on or before the day of said meeting.

#### PROPOSED ARTICLE FOR TOWN OF NORTH YARMOUTH AUTHORIZING FUNDING OF OUTSTANDING NOTES

Art. 18b. To see if the Town will vote to fund the following Town obligations to the following named noteholders in the amounts and of the character indicated opposite their names, viz:

Cephas W. Lowe, overdue tax anticipation note,	\$ 2,000 00
Lewis T. Hamilton, overdue tax anticipation note,	1,000 00
Hollis A. Swett, note for purchase price of safe,	500 00
Westbrook Trust Co., note balance due on bridge loan,	500 00
Lewiston Trust Co., note representing bank stock assessment,	1,400 00

a total of fifty-four hundred dollars (\$5400), and interest thereon to the extent of one hundred dollars (\$100), and to issue five (5) Town Serial Funding Notes in the aggregate sum not exceeding fifty-five hundred dollars (\$5500), each note for the principal sum of eleven hundred dollars (\$1100), bearing interest at the rate of four per cent (4%), and payable eleven hundred dollars (\$1100) April 1 of each year, beginning April 1, 1936, and to be dated March 15, 1935, and otherwise to be in such form, terms and substance as the Selectmen may determine, to be signed by the Selectmen and to be countersigned by the Treasurer, and to be sold and negotiated by the Selectmen as they may deem most advantageous to the Town, and the proceeds thereof to be applied to the payment of said outstanding notes; and to take such other action with respect thereto in modification of or addition to the foregoing as the Town by vote may determine.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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February 1, 1935

To the School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of  
North Yarmouth:

I herewith submit the annual report of the public schools in North Yarmouth for the year ending February, 1935.

Although the school report contains the regular statistical information covering costs, enrollments, and attendance records—it is curtailed this year to allow space for one of the most important recommendations of the Maine Public School Finance Commission.

The following is taken from Legislative Document No. 56 which was presented to the Maine Legislature on January 17, 1935. This Document may be amended—and it may or may not become a law either in its present form or amended form. It is given here in order that the public may have for ready reference the type of Equalization Program which the Maine Public School Finance Commission recommends.

There are other sections in Document No. 56 aside from section 210 which is quoted here.

**'Sec. 210. Equalization aid. I.** The amount of equalization aid which any city, town, or plantation is entitled to receive in any year shall be computed as follows: To the amount equivalent to the yield of 7.3 mills on each dollar of assessed value of taxable property within such city, town, or plantation, equalized as hereinafter defined, shall



be added the total amount allotted to such city, town, or plantation in the school year 1933-1934 from all state sources, but exclusive of federal aid for vocational education and exclusive of aid for educational facilities for adults. The sum of these two amounts shall be subtracted from the computed cost of maintaining the foundation program as hereinafter defined. One-quarter of the difference so computed shall be credited with any increase in aid to be received under section 205 over that received under section 205 in the school year 1933-34, and the remainder, if any, of said one-quarter of said difference shall be paid such city, town, or plantation from the equalization fund.

Provided, however, that the equalization aid granted any city, town, or plantation shall not be less than the excess of 60% of the cost of the foundation program as hereinafter defined over the sum of a yield of a tax of 11 mills on each dollar of equalized assessed value of taxable property within the town and 60% of the aid received from industrial education and physical education, aid received under section 206 not in excess of \$46 per pupil, and all other state aids, not obtained from federal funds.

The commissioner of education shall ascertain the amount required to supplement the revenue of such city, town, or plantation in accordance with this provision, and shall apportion from the equalization fund and distribute the same to such city, town, or plantation in the same manner and at the same time as other apportionments for cities, towns, and plantations provided by law.

All funds thus received by each city, town, or plantation and the school committee thereof, shall be used to pay current operating expenses of elementary and secondary schools.

No city, town, or plantation shall continue to participate in the benefits of additional state aid, as herein provided, after July 1, 1938, which has not expended during the preceding year, exclusive of expenditures for debt service and



permanent improvements other than maintenance, the larger of the following two amounts: (a) an equivalent of 60% of the computed cost of the foundation program, as hereinafter defined, or (b) an amount equivalent to the sum of all aid received from the state and the equivalent of a yield of a tax of 7.3 mills on the equalized assessed value of property in the city, town, or plantation. In computing expenditures for this purpose, expenditures of funds derived from gifts, endowments, or local permanent funds, shall not be considered.

Provided, that the amount of additional aid granted by this act for pupils attending academies and for whom state aid is paid either under section 206 or under other state aid provisions shall not exceed an amount necessary to supplement up to \$76 the aid granted under section 206 or under other state aid provisions other than aids from federal funds and the amount of aid granted per Maine resident pupil directly to the academy. When the aid granted under section 206 or granted from other than federal funds under other state aid provisions, added to the amount of aid per Maine resident pupil granted directly to the academy, exceeds \$76, no additional aid shall be paid for the pupils concerned, and the excess of present aids over \$76 shall be deducted from any increase in aid apportioned to the city, town, or plantation by this section.

**II. Definition of foundation program.** For the purposes of this act the cost of the foundation program to be used in computing state aid shall be determined as follows, on the basis of the statistics of the preceding school year:

1. The foundation program cost of a one-teacher elementary school which is declared to be a necessary part of the state school system shall be counted as \$1,305.

2. The foundation program cost of an elementary school with two or more teachers and an average daily attendance of 42 pupils or less shall be counted as \$62 for

each such pupil in average daily attendance. Provided, however, that any elementary school with two or more teachers which is declared a necessary part of the educational system shall be counted as not less than \$1,305.

3. The foundation program cost of any elementary school with two or more teachers and an average daily attendance of 43 to 290 pupils, inclusive, shall be counted as \$2,610 for the first 42 pupils in average daily attendance and \$42 for each additional pupil in average daily attendance.

4. The foundation program cost of any elementary school with an average daily attendance of 291 pupils or more shall be counted as \$45 for each pupil in average daily attendance.

5. The foundation program cost of any four-year secondary school which has an average daily attendance of 36 pupils or less shall be counted at \$1,672 for the first 6 pupils in average daily attendance, and \$112 for each additional pupil up to 36 pupils.

6. The foundation program cost of any four-year secondary school which has an average daily attendance of from 37 to 725 pupils, inclusive, shall be counted as \$5,032 for the first 36 pupils and \$72.70 for each additional pupil.

7. The foundation program cost of any four-year secondary school which has an average daily attendance of 726 pupils or more shall be counted as \$76 for each pupil in average daily attendance.

8. The foundation program costs for cities, towns, or plantations supporting a partial secondary school program shall be calculated as if they had four-year secondary schools, except as follows: any city, town, or plantation offering work in grades 9, 10, and 11 only shall have its secondary school computed foundation program cost reduced by 20%. Any city, town, or plantation offering



work in grades 9 and 10 only shall have its secondary school computed foundation program cost reduced by 35%. Any city, town, or plantation offering work in grade 9 only shall have its secondary school computed foundation program cost reduced by 45%.

9. For each non-resident elementary pupil \$45, and for each non-resident secondary school pupil \$76 shall be subtracted from the cost of the foundation program for the school attended.

10. For each elementary pupil sent to school in another city, town, or plantation for whom tuition is paid, \$45 shall be added, and for each secondary school pupil sent to school in another city, town, or plantation, or in an academy, and for whom tuition is paid, \$76 shall be added to the computed cost of the foundation program of the city, town, or plantation paying the tuition.

11. The cost of a program of transportation for elementary and/or secondary pupils, or subsistence in lieu of transportation, to be determined by the commissioner of education according to rules and regulations to be established by the said commissioner of education, with the approval of the governor and council, shall be counted as a part of the computed cost of the foundation program of the city, town, or plantation supplying transportation, or subsistence in lieu of transportation.

12. Where there are two or more schools of elementary or secondary grade in a city, town or plantation, the attendance in such schools shall be treated as if it were a single elementary school or a single secondary school, as the case may be, provided, however, that where the operation of an isolated school is considered essential by the commissioner of education, the attendance in such a school may be computed as a separate unit.

13. The commissioner of education is hereby empowered and it shall be his duty to reapportion the amount

due any city, town, or plantation from the equalization fund as hereinbefore authorized when, as, and if it shall appear to him that the attendance in or condition of the schools therein have changed to such an extent as to create an emergency, and to render such reapportionment as is necessary to carry out the intent of this act. Such reapportionments must receive the approval of the governor and council.

14. In case the number of teachers supplied in any town is less than the number normally supplied, on the average, to schools of the same size in the state, and in the judgment of the commissioner of education such shortage in teachers is not offset by higher qualifications of teachers or by other services supplied in the city, town, or plantation, the commissioner of education may, with the approval of the governor and council, use \$1,305 times the number of elementary teachers and \$1,672 times the number of secondary school teachers as that part of the cost of the foundation program arising from average daily attendance, or any intermediate figure between such figure and the figure obtained by the computations outlined above.

**III. Definition of equalized value.** The equalized assessed value of the taxable property in any city, town, or plantation to be used for the purpose of this act shall be the latest available true value of such property as fixed by the state tax assessor, multiplied by the equalization ratio. The equalization ratio shall be defined as the ratio which the total assessed value of all property taxable by municipalities within the state for the same year bears to the true value of such property in the state as determined by the state tax assessor. The term "true value" shall be defined as the value of all taxable property obtained by uniformly applying the same measure of consideration to the same elements of value, although the weight given such elements may vary according to local conditions. In computing the equalization ratio the figure to be used as the total assessed



value of all property taxable by municipalities within the state shall not be less than the total assessed value of such property as shown in the report of the state tax assessor for December, 1933.

On or before the first day of August, 1935, and before the first day of January for each year thereafter, the state tax assessor shall certify to the commissioner of education the assessed value of the taxable property within each city, town, and plantation, the true value of such property, the equalized assessed value of such property, and the equalization ratio for the state.

IV. When pupils are sent from one city, town, or plantation to another and any amounts of tuition for such pupils are two months or more overdue, the commissioner of education shall pay such claims as he allows to the receiving city, town, or plantation, and charge the same to the sending city, town, or plantation at the next regular annual apportionment, with interest at 6% per annum.'

#### MISCELLANEOUS

The school financial records are closed twice a year. The accounts are balanced and closed in February for the Annual Town Meeting and also in June for the State Reports. The enrollment varies from year to year in the Town of North Yarmouth and it is much more accurate to figure school costs for the school year beginning July 1st and ending June 30th.

In the Town of North Yarmouth the children are being housed, educated, and in some cases transported at the following per pupil costs:

How do these costs compare with the costs of other services for which you have to pay?

The school buildings in this town have been kept in repair at a cost per pupil of \$1.53. How does this compare with the repair bill on your home per person housed therein?

The number of pupils per elementary teacher is 24.

On behalf of the faculty members, the school officials, and all school employees, I wish to express to the citizens of the town our deep appreciation.
