

We would recommend to be raised at the coming annual meeting for the ordinary town expenses:

For	Support	of schools	\$1,400	00

The assessors are importuned from almost every quarter, for abatement on taxes, and we would suggest that all abatements hereafter be made in open town meeting.

The shortage on J. W. Chadbourne's bills of 1888 was \$1,057.00 instead of \$759.00, as reported. Having no bond and there being no proof that there ever was one, our counsel advised a settlement on the best terms we could get. We settled for \$500.00, making a loss to the town of \$557.00. On tax bills of 1889, the deficiency amounts to \$2,887.50 We commenced suit against the bondsmen which is still pending.

There is no reason why we cannot take our place among our sister towns and proudly invite comparison in social position, educational advantages, prudent, honest and faithful management of our public affairs with our resources unimpaired and for once during this generation have no notes or bonds outstanding. Such is the desire of your retiring board.

# SCHOOL REPORT.

FELLOW CITIZENS: - Your Supervisor submits the following report for your consideration.

DISTRICT NO. 1. E. E. Millett, Agent.—There was no Summer or Fall term in this district. The Winter term is now being taught by Miss Mary C. Jones. When visited at the begining of the term, the indications were very favorable for a profitable term.

DIST. No. 2. C. B. Fuller, Agent.—The Summer and Fall terms were both taught by Ina G. Rounds who succeeded well in keeping up the interest in the school, and the result was two profitable terms for the district.

DIST. NO. 3. W. R. Farris, Agent.—Two hundred and fifty dollars of the High School money were expended by your Supervisor in conjunction with the Agent in the employment of Ernest O. Cobb who taught the Summer and Fall terms. Mr. Cobb came to us highly recomended, and he has fully sustained his reputation. Rules for government were enforced with ease, and the good will of the pupils was secured and retained. Methods of instruction were good, and so far as I have been able to learn has given universal satisfaction. Mr. Cobb has been employed by the Agent to teach the Winter term in the grammar department which is now in session, and it will undoubtedly be a profitable term.

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.—The Summer and Fall terms were both taught by Mrs. Nellie M. Durrell, and the Winter term is now in session under the same teacher. Mrs. Durrell's reputation as a teacher is too well established to be added to by any thing which might be said here. She deserves all the credit which can be given for active and conscientious work, followed by the most gratifying results.

#### SCHOOL REPORT.

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DIST. NO, 4. John E. Ordway, Agent.—The Summer term was taught by Miss Blanche P. Brooks until the last two weeks, when, on account of sickness of Miss Brooks, her father Wm. M. Brooks finished out the term.

The Fall term was also taught by Miss Brooks and the result was two very successful terms of schools. Miss Brooks has undoubtedly given the methods of teaching considerable study. She is a fine teacher.

The Winter term was taught by Charles M. Andrews. Although there were but few pupils attending school, Mr. Andrews succeeded in keeping up an interest, and good progress was made. He has every qualification for a fine teacher.

DIST. NO. 5. Irving Bean, Agent.—Miss Cora Shedd taught the Summer term. Miss Shedd is a good teacher and the school made good progress.

Miss Mary A. Stone taught the Fall term, but as I did not receive notice of the close of the school in time to attend at its close, I am unable to report it.

The Winter term under the charge of Miss Blanche P. Brooks was a very profitable term. Miss Brooks is fast proving herself one of our best teachers.

DIST. No. 6. George A. Poor, Agent.—Miss Lucy A. Andrews taught the Summer and Fall terms and is now teaching the Winter term. Miss Andrews is one of our most easy and pleasant teachers. Her continuance in the position is sufficient proof of the satisfaction given. There are some good scholars in this district and with the judicious expenditure of the money. They have a good amount of the best schooling, and, we are glad to say, improve it.

DIST. No. 7. Abijah Paine, Agent.—Miss Mabel Whitehouse taught the Summer and Fall terms and gave good satisfaction. Miss Whitehouse is a good teacher.

DIST. NO. 8.—United with district No. 6.

DIST. No. 9.-Union district. Reported in Hebron.

**DIST.** No. 10. Henry Coy, Agent.—Two hundred and fifty dollars of the High School money were expended by your Supervisor, who employed Anson A. Cobb to teach both the Fall and Winter terms. Mr. Cobb worked hard for the success of the school, and possessing as he does all the neccessary qualifications for a good teacher, the results of these two terms were all that could be desired. Mr. Cobb has been employed by the agent to lengthen out the Winter term which is now in session.

GRAMMAR DEPARTMENT.—The Summer term was taught by Miss<sup>\*</sup> Bertha M. Phillips. Miss Phillips closed her school three days sooner than was expected on account of sickness of some of her friends, so it was impossible under the circumstances for me to visit the school at its close, but judging from all I can learn the school was not what we might wish it.

PRIMARY DEPARTMENT.—The Summer term was taught by Mrs. S. Lizzie Chaplin and a good school was the result.

The Fall, and Winter term now in session, were taught by Miss Annie F. Fuller. Miss Fuller is a model teacher. Too much cannot be said in praise of her efforts in this school. She is wonderfully well adapted to teaching primary scholars, and her services should be retained in town if possible.

DIST. NO. 11. Eugene L. Burns, Agent.-Miss G. Lena Perkins in the Summer showed work worthy of praise.

The term now being taught by Wm. Haskell promises the most satisfactory results.

DIST. No. 12. Josiah Keen, Agent.—The Summer and Fall terms were both taught by Lenora Dunn who worked hard for the success of the school.

The Winter term by Mabel Herrick was very satisfactory. The pupils made good progress.

It is with feelings of the deepest concern for the welfare of our schools that this report is respectfully submitted. Our schools during the past year have been, it seems to me, unusually good. The agents at the beginning of the year, secured good teachers, and have retained them, when satisfactory, during the whole year. And 1 would urge upon those who employ our teachers, not to let those who have been tried and tested in our schools, go away to teach, and in their places employ inexperienced strangers. Do not let a small amount in salary be the scale in which the merits and demerits of our teachers shall be balanced, for six weeks of school well taught, is of more advantage than ten weeks but indifferently managed.

I would recommend that the town raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars this year for Free High Schools, since it is, as it seems to me, a saving of that amount to the town.

### SCHOOL REPORT.

It is a matter of regret to me that I have been compelled, in the purchase of books, to exceed the amount appropriated by the town for that purpose. It was thought at the last March meeting, that \$350, the amount voted for this purpose, would be sufficient, and I was of that opinion, but of course it was a matter which was largely guess work, and I think it would have been sufficient to have supplied all the pupils in town with as many books as they have had heretofore, but when books are free there is naturally a tendency to have more. And although I have done all in my power to prevent any extravagant supply by the teachers to the scholars, yet as many scholars were formerly poorly provided with books, it has taken more than was anticipated. I have turned over to the respective agents in town the books, and taken their receipt therefor. I believe all the districts are now well supplied with books and enough, it would seem to last at least five years.

I give herewith an itemized account of the books purchased for the use of the town.
