

#### Supervisor's Report.

Fellow Citizens:—I respectfully submit the following report as Supervisor of Schools:

As was fully explained at Special Town Meeting, there was not money enough to run the schools the usual length of time this winter. Some of the schools had commenced at the time the matter came up, and so were continued until it was decided in town meeting that the town would not raise more money for the continuance of the common schools. Immediately after the action of the town the teachers were all notified that the schools could not continue longer at the expense of the town. I am exceedingly sorry that it so happened, but as I explained at town meeting there was an overdraw of \$75 two years ago when the schools were changed over from a district to a town system, and \$300 one year ago, which was not apparent at the time of making the report, as the schools were then all in session, that being the first report made, Feb. 1st, under the new law. The money, however, appropriated for schools has all been expended for the schools and none of it misappropriated. The fact is the town, for the past two years at least, has not raised a sufficient amount to run the schools as they now exist. It is said that I have been extravagant in the expenditure of the money; of this I must allow you to be the judges, I can only say I have used my best judgment and employed the best teachers I could find, and I believe that in order to have first-class schools it will be necessary for the town to raise more money for the support of them.

I give you herewith a full statement of every order drawn for the support of schools, and you can see what has been done with the money. You will see that the statement includes the schools in session at the time of making my last report.

A class of seven graduated from Welchville High School last June. Every member of that class performed the part assigned The school in No. 7 was continued this winter about two weeks by an arrangement made between the teacher and the district.

No. 11 also made arrangements with the teacher whereby the school will continue, as I understand, the usual length of ten weeks.

No. 3 also raised a sufficient amount of money to keep all four of its schools in session for the usual ten weeks. The same teachers as last term are in charge. The fact that this district has raised by subscription over four hundred dollars for the support of these schools during this term is proof enough, I think, of the efficiency and popularity of these schools in the opinion of the people.

So far as I am able to judge every school in town, during the past year, has done a good work. Only first-class teachers have been employed and they have given the schools their best services. I know that they have not in all instances been perfectly satisfactory to all, but such a thing as giving perfect satisfaction to all is out of the question. I am well pleased with the work that has been done and think a large majority of the people are satisfied of the same thing.

I hope my successor will be able to give you better school and better satisfaction. I shall do all in my power to assist him and to advance and improve the education of our children.

## TOWN WARRANT.

To W. R. Farris, a Constable of the town of Oxford, in the County of Oxford, State of Maine.

#### GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Oxford, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town house in said Oxford, on Monday the 2d day of March next, at 10 o'clock A. M., to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1st. To choose a moderator to preside in said meeting. Art. 2d. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3d. To act upon the report of the town officers for the past year.

Art. 4th. To choose a board of selectmen, overseers of the poor, a town treasurer, town agent, superintending school committee and all other town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 5th. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the town schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 6th. To see what sum of money the town will raise for free high school for the ensuing year.

Art. 7th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 8th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest for the ensuing year.

Art. 9th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to liquidate the town debt.

Art. 10th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the town treasurer to issue bonds to pay town debt.

Art. 11th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 12th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to appoint a road commissioner or divide the roads of the town into two or more sections or districts and appoint a commissioner or surveyor for each.

Art. 13th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of highways and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 14th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to be expended in highway labor tax for the ensuing year.

Art. 15th. To see what wages the town will vote to pay per hour for labor on highway for men, oxen and horses.

Art. 16th. To see what discount the town will vote to make, if any, on all highway taxes paid into the town treasury on or before June 15, 1896.

Art. 17th. To see what discount the town will vote to make, if any, on all money taxes paid into the town treasury on or before the first day of September and the first day of December 1896.

Art. 18th. To see if the town will vote to fix a date on which all money taxes assessed for the ensuing year shall become due.

Art. 19th. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all money taxes assessed for the ensuing year when due and unpaid and what rate.

Art. 20th. To see what action the town will take in regard to town books in custody of Geo. Hazen.

Art. 21st. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to purchase a piece of land to procure clay and gravel for highways.

Art. 22d. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to adjust rebate of \$184.50 in favor of school Dist. No. 3, caused by rebate of Robinson M'f'g Co's tax of the year 1894.

Art. 23d. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the contingent fund for the ensuing year.

Art. 24th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day for the ensuing year.

Art. 25th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Freeland Holmes Library for the ensuing year.

Art. 26th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fuel, insurance, repairs, supplies, etc., for schools and school-houses for the ensuing year.

Art. 27th. To see what action the town will take in regard to land unoccupied adjoining town house.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the town house for the purpose of receiving and correcting the list of voters on the 2d day of March next, at 9:30 o'clock in the fore-noon.
