# Warrant for Town Meeting.

To J. W. Hunting, constable of the town of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Oxford, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said Oxford on Monday, the 6th day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2nd. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3rd. To act upon the report of town officers for the past year.

Art. 4th. To choose a board of selectmen for the ensuing year.

Art. 5th. To choose a board of assessors for the ensuing year.

Art. 6th. To choose a board of overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 7th. To choose a town treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 8th. To choose one member of the school board for three years.

Art. 9th. To choose a road commissioner, town agent, auditor, pound keeper and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 10th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of town schools for the ensuing year.

Art. 11th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for free text books.

Art. 12th, To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the free high school for the ensuing year.

Art. 13th. To see what sum of money the town will, vote to raise for repairs, insurance, apparatus and appliances.

Art. 14th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year. Art. 15th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers salaries.

Art. 16th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for summer roads and bridges.

Art. 17th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for winter roads.

Art. 18th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for a contingent fund for the ensuing year.

Art. 19th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day the ensuing year.

Art. 20th. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Freeland Holmes Library for the ensuing year.

Art. 21st. To see if the town will vote to relay the stone wall at the back side of the town house lot, if so what sum of money it will vote to raise for same.

Art. 22nd. To see if the town will vote to raise money to convey high school scholars to High school for the year 1911, if so, what sum.

Art. 23d. To see if the town will vote to repair the Town farm buildings, if so, what sum.

Art. 24th. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112, of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1911.

Art. 25th. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$400.00 being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907 as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909.

Art. 26th. To see what action the town will take to exterminate the brown tail moth, to see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for same.

Art. 27th. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to purchase a winter sidewalk machine, and if so what sum of money.

Art. 28th. To see if the town will vote to furnish bonds for the treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 29th. To see what action the town will take in relation to fixing the price of labor on the highway, including the salary of Road Commissioner.

Art. 30th. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell the hemlock timber on the town farm.

Art. 31st. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes of 1911 if paid before a certain date, and the town to fix the date.

Art. 32nd. To see if the town will vote to repair the hearse house building, and if so what sum of money.

Art. 33rd. To see if the town will vote to raise money to exchange the old hearse for a more modern one.

Art. 34th. To see if the town will vote to have the taxes for 1911 made payable to the Town Treasurer, the Selectmen to decide what his remuneration shall be.

Art. 35th. To see if the town will vote to repair, and rail the stone bridge "so called" near the R. C. Thomas place and how much the town will vote to raise for same.

The selectmen will be in session at the town house in said town of Oxford for the purpose of receiving and correcting the list of voters on the 6th day of March, A. D., 1911, at nine o'clock in the forenoon.

#### SALE OF PULP WOOD ON TOWN FARM.

We, the undersigned committee, having been instructed by the inhabitants of Oxford, to sell the pulp wood on the town farm, have sold to E. W. Penley of Paris, and A. L. Chaplin of Oxford. The consideration therefor to be one dollar and eighty-seven and one-half-cents per cord on the stump, all to be removed not later than the winter of 1911-'12. According to the survey of John W. Rowe there is now cut two hundred and eighty-four cords and three feet. There is more to cut, and there has been none removed, and as the time for payment was to be at the time of shipment, it is not paid for, and is therefore listed in the inventory of property on town farm.

We will also state that Mr. Sawyer has exchanged for groceries \$9.40 worth of eggs and \$11 26 of kidney beans which he has produced on the farm this year.

In the expense of the town farm for 1910: we will state that the expense of the farm from Jan. 31, to Mar. 29th under the management of Mrs. Farris was \$231.47 of which sum \$28.89 was the expense of S. D. Jillson and John Rowe for labor and material used for repairs on the house, and the receipts to March 29th, 1910 \$126.01 leaving a balance against the farm of \$105.46, March 29th, 1910.

On that date Mr. M. M. Sawyer took charge he being hired for one year for \$400, the town to have the use of his horse. His expense was \$1,224.06 and the receipts without the pulp wood and ash bolts which are listed in the inventory is \$1,046.22, which leaves a balance against the farm under the management of Mr. Sawyer of \$177.84, Jan. 31, 1911.

, Mr. Sawyer and wife came to us well recommended and they have both proved their worth and we hope the town will be able to secure their services for the coming year.

EXPLANATION OF THE PAUPER CASES OF OXFORD.

David Morse had the misfortune to break his hip, May 30tb, and the expense was necessarily large. He has moved to Peru, to live with his son. His pension will partly support him and his son pays the balance.

John Lane's account amounts to \$175.61 this year. The State reimbursed the town for his expense.

A. E. Pike has been helped by the town of Windham to the amount of \$99.46.

Eliab Averill has moved to Bridgton. As he got an increase in his pension this year, he was able to get along with \$41.42.

Sam Tripp was sick for a long time the first of the year, requiring a number of surgical operations, therefore his bill was large. He is still with us.

Cyrus Reed still continues to have help once in a while.

Carroll Davis children are at the Healey Asylum, Lewiston. The town pays seventy-five cents each per week toward their support, their grand-parents pay the rest. Their father was living at last account we had of him in Massachusetts. If he ever comes back there is a law for him.

Mrs. Russell is now married and now belongs to some other town.

A. I. Morse became insane last July. He is in the hospital at Augusta. The State pays his bills.

Ella Farrington is now in the hospital at Bangor. The officials notified us last spring that she had consumption and that they had a ward there for such cases. As she had a small place in Welchville we had Mr. Roscoe F. Staples appointed guardian for her and have presented to him a bill of her expense to the town.

John McDermott, the man found frozen to death in East Oxford last winter. We were unable to get an affidavit from his people, therefore we put in a claim for reimbursement in the Legislature.

Minnie Titus, in our claim against Auburn for her support in 1909 Report, we will say that we sued Auburn for the bill of \$89.28 as shows due in the report of 1909. The case was left to the Judge of the Supreme Judicial Court for his decision with a statement of facts satisfactory to both parties. The decision was in favor of Auburn as we are led to believe on the ground that she is a State charge.

### Report of

### Board of Health

From Jan. 31, 1910, to Jan. 31, 1911.

The people in general are more favorable to the work done by the Board of Health than in former years. They see the benefits and are beginning to realize that immunity from contagious and infectious diseases is due in a great measure to the care of the local Boards of Health, and where we used to meet opposition they are in sympathy. There has been one case of typhoid fever, no nuisapce reported, a few cases of mumps, one case infantile paralysis and sixteen cases of scarlet fever. The cause of searlet fever is a special micro-organism of great vitality. It retains its infecting power for a long time, most likely to ocenr among children. Second attacks are not common, but may happen. Of these cases of scarlet fever, three families were obliged to call for help from the town.

### Report of the

### Superintendent of Schools

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF OXFORD:

The annual report of the condition of the schools and school property of the town of Oxford is hereby respectfully submitted.

Number of persons in town between the ages of 5 and 21 years, April 1, 1910, 311.

Total number of pupils registered during the year, 209. At the close of the fiscal year, January 31, 1911, our schools have been in session 35 weeks. The additional allotment of money from the State for common schools has enabled us to increase the length of the school year, to reduce the amount appropriated, and have a snug balance to begin the new year. I think our appropriation can be further reduced and \$1,000 will be amply sufficient for 1911. The average attendance during the year has been exceptionally good, nearly every case of prolonged absence being due to sickness.

At the close of the winter session our High School will have been in session 36 weeks. It has been the most profitable and up-to-date school year during my connection with the school department. The standard and efficiency of the school were never seen to better advantage than at the present time, and any parent or friend who will visit the school room cannot fail to see the interest, energy and ambition displayed by the pupils to obtain an education. The transportation of the High School scholars has been a great benefit. More than one-half of our pupils come from the rural districts and each one is doing his or her best to take advantage of the opportunity offered. The excellence of our school is extending its influence among the adjoining towns as shown by the fact that we have eight tuition pupils. The building of the new school-room is another distinct advantage as it enables the assistant teacher to devote her entire time to the High school.

The State inspector made his annual visit in January and was very much pleased with the condition of the school and gave it a most excellent report and was most emphatic in his approval of the introduction of spelling into the high school.

For the first time in many years our Grammar school is in a class by itself and has a teacher who can devote her entire time to the Grammar grades. The Primary, Intermediate and Grammar schools have been graded so that each school now has three grades and the arrangement works very satisfactorily.

Our Grammar school has been the weak spot in the village school system on account of the limited number of hours the assistant high school teacher could devote to it. The present teacher devotes her entire time to the school and the improvement is marked and each grade has made steady progress.

The introduction of, reading and spelling into the Grammar grades has shown good results. The leaks have been stopped, the rough places smoothed over, and best of all the pupils have been taught to think and anylyze for themselves.

The Intermediate school is the hardest school in town to show results, but under the care of the present teacher the school has done good work and shown great improvement. The reading has improved to a marked degree, most of the old sing-song style of delivery being done away with and nearly all the pupils read with good expression. They also have been taught to think and reason for themselves.

In the Primary department the present teacher, Mrs. Emmons, at the close of the winter term will have completed her fourth year as instructor in that department. At no stage during a pupil's journey through the grades is a wise and efficient teacher more needed than during the first three years. It is needless to say that Mrs. Emmons continues to turn out classes well fitted for the higher grades.;

The school at Welchville has made good progress. The grading and classification shows good results. The teacher is interested and energetic and the school shows good work done during the year.

Our rural schools have been in good hands, and the work has been uniform during the entire year.

A branch of the School Improvement League has been organized in each rural district. The parents, pupils, and teachers are interested and each school-room has been improved, and libraries and furniture needed for the schools provided through the efforts of the League.

Each school in town has made satisfactory progress and individual cases that fall behind are those that are absent and do not study at home. The reading of the different grades and the spelling of the entire schools show a most gratifying improvement. The thinking and reasoning powers of the pupils have been stimulated and they have been instructed to think and reason for themselves and not rely entirely upon their teachers.

This is one of the fundamental principles of common school education as it not only enables the pupil to accomplish more work during his future school life but fosters that spirit of confidence which is so essential to success.

The school buildings are in good condition. A new floor has been put into the Intermediate room ot the village schools and a new room added for the assistant in the high school, both of which filled long felt wants.

The school house at Welchville needs painting and I recommend that it be painted this coming summer as it is a good building and should be kept in repair.

The above is in my judgment a correct report of the actual condition of the schools and school property.
