#### LIST OF TAXABLE PROPERTY.

The following is the copy of a vote passed at the last annual town meeting, copied from the record of the Town Clerk:

"On motion of J. C. Connor, voted that the Selectmen shall make up their annual reports in season that they may be printed and circulated at least four days previous to the annual March meeting; and all property, real and personal, shall be itemized in their report and the names of all persons to whom taxed; and all bills to be itemized, all monies expended upon roads, bridges and sidewalks; the place for which it was expended and to whom it was paid; and it shall be the duty of the Clerk to distribute such reports."

The undersigned, S. S. Committee of the town of Pittsfield, respectfully submit the following as their report of the public schools of said town for the year ending March 1, 1887:

#### DISTRICT NO. 1.

George D. Wilson, Agent. The summer and winter terms in this district were taught by Miss Nettie M. Patten, of Palmyra. Whole number of scholars attending school in summer, 15; average, 14. Wages of teacher, \$4.00; board, \$1.40. Winter term—whole number attending, 16; average, 15. Both terms were successful.

#### DISTRICT NO. 2.

T. B. Williams, Agent. The summer term, of eight weeks, was taught by Miss Edith S. Nichols, of Detroit, with fair results. Whole number of scholars attending school, 16; average, 13. Wages of teacher, \$3.50; board, \$1.65.

The fall term, of six weeks, was taught by Miss Lizzie E. Fischer, of this town. Whole number of attendance, 17; average, 14. Wages of teacher, \$4.15; board, \$1.60. The term was not highly successful.

The winter term, of ten weeks, was taught by Miss Lucelia S. Osborne, of Hartland. Whole number of attendance, 14; average, 13. Wages of teacher, \$5.00; board, \$1.75. On account of a lack of discipline, the school did not prove as profitable as it should.

#### DISTRICT NO. 3.

Wesley S. Burrill, Agent. The summer terms were both taught by Miss Lucelia S. Osborne, of Hartland. The pupils made good advancement while under the instruction of Miss Osborne. Wages of both terms, \$4.00 per week; board of summer term, \$1.65; board of fall term, \$1.49.

The winter term was taught by Mr. Leander D. Rand, of this town. Mr. Rand is an excellent teacher, and enforced better order than there has been in the school for some time. Wages of teacher \$30.00 per month; board, \$1.88 per week.

#### DISTRICT NO. 4.

N. B. Runnalls, Agent. The spring term was taught by Miss Lutie Hilton, of Hartland. Whole number attending school, 49; average number, 41. Wages \$6.00; board, \$2.00. Miss Hilton's good work in this school was highly appreciated by the district.

The summer and fall terms were taught by Miss May E. Rowe, of Newport. Whole number attending summer term, 50; average number, 37. Whole number attending fall term. 39; average number, 30. Wages in summer, \$6.00; board, \$2.31. Wages in fall term, \$6.00; board, \$2.40. Miss Rowe, being a teacher of experience, maintained good order and her scholars made good advancement.

The winter term was taught by Miss Hattie F. Gifford, of Plymouth. Whole number attending school, 38; average number, 34. Wages, \$6.50; board, \$2.50. Miss Gifford maintained her former good reputation as a teacher of Normal school training.

#### DISTRICT NO. 5.

James Kenney, Agent. The summer and fall terms were both taught by Miss Lizzie N. Freeman, of Detroit, with medium results. Wages, summer term, \$4.00; board, \$1.85. Fall term, wages of teacher, \$5.00; board, \$1.90. Whole number of scholars attending summer term, 24; average, 20. Fall term, 21; average, 18.

The winter term, of ten weeks, was taught by Miss Alice P. Holmes of this town. Miss Holmes still holds her former reputation as an excellent teacher. Wages of teacher, \$5.50; board, \$2.00. Whole number attending, 27; average, 22.

#### DISTRICT NO. 6.

PHILIP POWERS, Agent. The summer and winter terms were both taught by Miss Mertie M. Jones, of Corinna. Miss Jones worked hard for the interest of her scholars. Whole number of scholars attending summer term, 14; average, 13. Winter term, 15; average, 12. Wages of both terms, \$3.75 per week. Board for summer term, \$1.50; winter, \$1.60.

#### DISTRICT NO. 7.

Hartwell J. Brackett, Agent. The Primary school in this district has continued under the able management of Miss Ida M. Holmes, of this town, for the past two or three years, excepting the last fall term, when, on account of the ill health of Miss Holmes, Miss Hattie Gifford, of Plymouth, was employed for the term, and gave general satisfaction. This school has been well favored each term with an efficient teacher; and for a Primary school the attendance has been excellent. Whole number attending in summer, 57; average number, 50. Whole number attending fall term, 55; average, 48. Whole number attending winter term, 50; average number, 43. Wages per week throughout the year, \$7.50; board, \$2.50.

The Grammar School was taught during the summer term by Frank H. McLaughlin, of Newburgh. Whole number attending school, 42; average number, 34. This term, though not quite up to our wishes, was by no means a failure and would, perhaps, have been a very profitable term at any other time of year.

The fall and winter terms were taught by Fred L. Stinson, of this town. Whole number attending in fall term, 43; average number, 39. Whole number attending winter term, 48; average, 43. Mr. Stinson is an able teacher and has performed his duties as a teacher in a very faithful manner.

#### DISTRICT NO. 8.

S. H. Mosher, Agent. The summer term, of eight weeks, was taught by Miss Alice P. Holmes, of this town. Every feature of her school was commendable. Whole number attending school, 26; average, 24. Wages of teacher, \$5.00; board, \$1.40.

The fall term, of ten weeks, was taught by Miss Etta M. Abbott, of Clinton. Whole number attending, 30; average, 25. Wages, \$5.00; board, \$1.95. This district can well congratulate itself in securing the services of so fine a teacher; her order was excellent and her explanations very clear.

The winter term, of eight weeks, was taught by Miss Eldeth L. Abbott, of Clinton, with fair results. Whole number of scholars attending, 24; average, 22. Wages, \$5.00; board, \$1.95.

J. P. Tuttle, Agent. The summer term, of eight weeks, was taught by Miss Mamie E. Osborne, of Hartland. Whole number of scholars attending school, 9; average, 7. Wages of teacher, \$3.00; board, \$1.75. The order and advancement were commendable.

The fall and winter terms were both taught by Miss Lizzie E. Fischer, of this town. Wages of fall and winter terms, \$4.00 per week; board for fall term, \$2.00 per week; winter term, \$1.75. Miss Fischer gave excellent satisfaction in this district; her order was good and the scholars made good advancement. We think with experience she will make a fine teacher.

#### DISTRICT NO. 10.

Calvin Jacobs, Agent. The summer and winter terms were both taught by Miss Etta E. Parks, of this town. There is no need of saying that this was a good school. The fact that Miss Parks has taught this school several terms before is evidence that she was highly appreciated by the people and scholars in the district, and that the school has been a profitable and successful one. Whole number attending summer term, 14; average, 11. Wages, \$4.50; board, \$1.85. Number attending winter term, 17; average, 15. Wages, \$6.00; board, \$2.12 1-2.

#### DISTRICT NO. 11.

John A. Chase, Agent. The summer and winter terms were taught by Miss Lizzie M. Webber, of Clinton. Whole number attending summer term, 13; average, 12. Wages, \$3.00; board, \$1.40. On account of sickness the school closed one week sooner than was intended, therefore was visited but once. From all appearances at our visit the school could not fail to be a success. The winter term is now in session.

This, gentlemen, is in brief a report of our schools for the past year. In making this report, as in all school matters, we have tried to perform our duties faithfully, regardless of the fault-findings of those whose children continually suffer imaginary wrongs and find daily excuses for leaving school.

Some of our schools have been very profitable, while others have not. Success has generally been the result of employing teachers who understood their work and so arranged it that there was but little loss of valuable time to the scholars. the other hand, lack of success was largely due to employing inexperienced teachers at low wages, which gives the district a longer, but not a more profitable term. It is, in our opinion, unprofitable to employ such teachers, for, at best, too many weeks of the scholar's life are lost, and in many instances scholars, or rather those who should be scholars, arrive at the years of manhood unable to read or write an intelligible letter. fact, we have those around us who cannot write their own names, nor would they know them if they saw them written. Yet such inexcusable ignorance as this is not wholly attributable to hiring poor teachers; for all parents, however situated, can give their children some education. And so, also, can all parents keep their children at school, instead of on the street becoming worthless truants, schooling themselves in crime. When some children get into trouble at school, the parents quickly take the part of the children, and, regardless of how prominently they figured in the matter, exonerate them from all blame and take them

from school, in some cases to be privately tutored, but generally to be educated on the street. It is, in our opinion, a grave error to take a child out of school on account of some petty trouble which can easily be adjusted and the child kept in better surroundings than he would perhaps find in running on the street; besides, this would be giving the teacher a little of that support which is so much needed from every family. A little good, healthy home discipline wonderfully lessens a teacher's troubles and increases the results of his labors in the same ratio. Most people seem unconscious of the fact that a teacher can accomplish far more when ably sustained by the parents than he can with a portion of them constantly taking sides against him in a seemingly harmless manner. Unity of action on the part of teachers, scholars and parents is ever an indispensable requisite to good schools; and when this is attained, success, to a valuable extent, is sure to follow.

But we must not be content with these requisites alone upon which to build a profitable school system, for children are children just the same, whether they are enjoying the comforts and luxuries of a good modern home, or, in solemn contrast to that, roasting one moment and freezing the next in an old building fitted up with a stove, a chair, and four or five rows of plank benches and erroneously called a school-house. We have four or five school-houses in town that are very good, but the others are unworthy of the name. Our village school-houses are a little better than some in the other districts, and yet there is scarcely a trace of a modern school-house about them. is a stove in each room that seems to indicate that the old fireplace has long since become a too burdensome relic to be supported, while fragments of three small globes and a handful of ancient wall maps are still cherished and cared for as indispensables in our village districts. This state of things may seem incredible to some who do not visit the schools, but one good visit will thoroughly satisfy them and forever dispel the desire to be a child again. Still there are some among us who consider the old school-houses good enough, because they are as good or better than they had when they were young. We admit that they are better than they had in the distant past, and so are the pleasant homes that surround those school-houses better than the log-cabins of the past; and we look ahead with earnest expectation to the time when the pioneer life of our forefathers will be known in our school-rooms only by its stern and solemn We look forward to a time in the near future when our worthless school-houses will be condemned as such, and place given to appropriate buildings with modern improvements that will cast no reflections upon us, but ever stir up a lively interest in the schools, and give to those who are to be the men and women of the future a thorough mental, moral and physical training. And we hope that ere long the public will give more attention to the schools, visit them often, and give them their long-needed support. Give them also good buildings, healthily situated and fitted up in a manner to accommodate the comforts and wants of the scholars. Then give them good instructors, and, if needed, an officer to see that none fail to get the benefit of all this expenditure without a reasona-) S. S. Committee C. C. WEEKS, ble excuse.
