TOWN WARRANT.

To Hanover S. Nickerson, a constable of the town of Pittsfield in the county of Somerset.—GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Pittsfield, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at Union Hall, in said town, on Monday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1894, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit :

ARTICLE 1.—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2.—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 3.—To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools and the poor, and repair of roads and bridges and to defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 4.—To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money to purchase school text books.

ARTICLE 5.—To see what sum of money the town will vote and raise for the repairs of school-houses.

ARTICLE 6.—To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money for a free high school.

ARTICLE 7.—To see if the town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to elect a Superintendent other than one of their own number if they see fit.

ARTICLE 8.—To see if the town will appropriate any money for a free public library, if so, how much.

ARTICLE 9.—To see how much money the town will vote and raise for building new sewers.

ARTICLE 10.—To see how much money the town will vote and raise to repair sewers.

ARTICLE 11.—To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money to put in a reservoir near the corner of Forest and West streets.

ARTICLE 12.—To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money for the repair of hydrants.

ARTICLE 13.—To see what action the town will take to promote the efficiency of the fire department.

ARTICLE 14.—To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money sufficient to pay Robert Dobson & Co. for services rendered the fire department in extinguishing fires.

ARTICLE 15.—To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money sufficient to complete the store house.

ARTICLE 16.—To see if the town will vote and raise fifty dollars for memorial purposes.

ARTICLE 17.—To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money to dig a well and put a pump in the same at the cemetery.

ARTICLE 18.—To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money to build a sidewalk to cemetery.

ARTICLE 19.—To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to remove certain isolated burials in the village cemetery to one lot so as to make more spare lots in said yard.

ARTICLE 20.—To see what action the town will take in relation to purchasing land for a new burying ground, or for addition to the old one.

ARTICLE 21.—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire such sum or sums of money as shall be necessary to pay the accumulated or accumulating indebtedness of the town.

ARTICLE 22.—To see if the town will instruct its assessors to make a general re-appraisal and adjustment of the value of the real estate in town.

ARTICLE 23.—To see how much money the town will vote and raise to break roads.

ARTICLE 24.—To arrange for the collection of taxes in said town, and to see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid after a specified time and to fix a time within which the aforesaid taxes in said town shall be paid.

ARTICLE 25.—To see if the town will vote to accept Harrison Avenue leading from Peltoma street to the trotting park, built and dedicated to the town by Harrison Gardner and R. A. Conant.

ARTICLE 26.—To see if the town will vote to accept Russell street commencing on the east line of Hartland Avenue between the north line of A. L. Sylvester's homestead and the south line of the homestead of the late J. M. Coffin, extending east from Hartland Avenue 24 rods; and also Bates street extending from Russell street southerly parallel with Hartland Avenue 16 rods to Mill street, built and dedicated to the town by A. L. Sylvester.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voters in said town and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list at Union Hall, in said town of Pittsfield, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.

REPORT OF S. S. COMMITTEE

Of the Town of Pittsfield.

The past year has witnessed for our town some radical changes in school matters and has been marked by many progressive features, both in methods and manner of teaching, and the additions made in school buildings and appliances for teaching, so that in the excellency and length of our schools we are surpassed by very few if any towns in the State according to the report of the State Superintendent of Schools.

The town system has become well established this year and is proving a satisfactory method of conducting school business.

Pupils throughout the town have been afforded the same number of weeks schooling, each district having had 30 weeks of school. The total number of weeks of schooling in town exceeds that of last year by 27 weeks.

The amount of school money brought over from last year was used to meet bills not presented before last year's report went to press.

The appropriation put into the hands of the S. S. Committee for building a school-house in district No. 6 has been expended for that purpose; and as it was necessary to buy a lot, grade it and build a good stone foundation, also to buy furnishings, which was not provided for, these necessities together with the cost of the building have exceeded the appropriation about

\$400. The building is thoroughly built throughout with all modern school improvements, having hard-wood floors, cement blackboards, wainscoating, moulded pilaster finish, globe desks, which are considered the best, doors, windows and all other material of the most durable quality. The house is appreciated by all in that section of the town.

The appropriation for finishing the second story in Riverside school-house was at a special town meeting put into the hands of the S. S. Committee, having been overlooked at the regular town meeting. After looking over the building the committee thought it would be for the interest of the town not to finish the upper rooms in a manner similar to those on the first floor, but to make the work strong and thorough so as to make the cost of repairs light in years to come. Although the lower part is comparatively new, the cost of repairs have been quite heavy this year, and the amount expended also includes repairs on these rooms. The building had never had any system of ventilation which is very necessary in crowded school rooms. Consequently a system of ventilation was put in. It was found necessary to build over the stairway leading to the upper rooms as the stairs were too steep to be safe for school purposes, and also to make a room for text books, maps, etc., on the lower floor. As the arrangement of rooms was not definitely laid out, the S. S. Committee arranged the rooms as seemed best fitted for the requirements of the school; accordingly the upper floor was divided into rooms as follows: One large school room, one teacher's room, one coat room, one cloak room and hallway. Hard-wood floors were laid through the second story, all plastered surface was dry-skimmed, the rooms are all wainscoated and finished with moulded pilaster. The school room has cement blackboards and is furnished with globe desks. As there was no appropriation for the furnishings and as there has been many necessary changes from the first plans to add to the cost we have also overrun this appropriation, yet we are satisfied that it will prove a better investment and a more satisfactory building for the town than a very cheap job, which it must have been to keep within the means of the appropriation.

In school district No. 7 the house was damaged by fire to the amount of \$2,742.08. \$27 being the regular discount for cash, the amount of \$2,715.08 was received by the S. S. Committee, and temporary repairs at once commenced to prevent further damage to the building. As soon as arrangements could be made a thorough job of repairing was commenced and continued until the building was made even stronger than when new, and to present a better appearance inside and out than before the fire. It was thought best by the committee, as a matter of economy to the town, not to remove all damaged timber, plastering, etc., that is practically as good as new for durability. Thus we have been able to turn \$1,237.24 into the town treasury, which we think ought to be appreciated as it has required not a little effort and good calculating to be able to secure or save this money.

The repairs on other school-houses throughout the town have been quite extensive. All buildings that were worth repairing have received the attention of the Committee and have been put in as good a condition as the percentage for repairs would allow.

We would suggest here that quite a liberal appropriation be raised this year for repairs as several of the school buildings are much in need of outside paint, some roofs need shingling and one house is entirely without a wood shed. And as no percentage of the school money can be used for repairs, this year an appropriation must be raised.

At a special town meeting five hundred dollars was appropriated to put in water closets in Lancey street school house. These were very much needed. The old privies were a public nuisance. We have put in an excellent system and this together with all the other modern improvements of the house make the building quite a model school-house.

It was also voted at this meeting to expend five hundred dollars for high school purposes. This is something that has been very much neglected in this town. There are but very few towns that do not do something in this direction, and this

town, with the excellent school privilege it can have at so low a cost, ought to raise not less than this each year. Your Committee made a written contract with the trustees of Maine Central Institute, in accordance with the vote of the town, and have paid them \$750 of which \$250 is paid back to the town by the State by the terms of the free high school act, making the total cost to the town of \$500. With this money sixty town scholars were given the benefit of a first-class free high school education for twelve weeks during the fall term and about fifty scholars ten weeks this winter term, making a total of twenty-two weeks' free high school privileges afforded those qualified in town to attend. No school money has been so well and profitably expended, and the town is fortunate in obtaining free high school privileges at so small expense, as equal privileges could not be obtained in any other way at many times this cost.

In hiring teachers, preference has been given to those living in town as far as practicable.

The scholars in District No. 1 have been conveyed to District No. 6.

Miss Nettie Collamore of Palmyra taught the summer school in District No. 2. Miss Collamore is well known in this town as a proficient teacher.

In District No. 3 the summer term was taught by Miss Lillian Maddocks, the fall term by Miss Cora Mosher, the winter term by Guy Small, all being very good schools.

The schools in District No. 4 have been taught by Miss Susie Merritt of Houlton, assisted by Miss Annie Holmes of Brewer, in the intermediate, and Miss Blanche L. Connor of this town in the primary, Mrs. Josie Smith having taken the school in the absence of Miss Merritt on account of ill health. The school, though somewhat interrupted, has proved a profitable one.

In District No. 5 the summer school was taught by Miss Ethel Brackett of Detroit, the fall term by Miss Myrtie Hanson of this town, the winter term by Miss May Bowman of Detroit. We would make special mention of Miss Bowman as being an excellent teacher.

Miss Minnie Patten taught the summer term in District No. 6, Miss Nettie Collamore the fall term and Miss Lillian Maddocks the winter term. The summer and fall terms were very successful schools. The winter term lacked something of interest and was not altogether a profitable term.

The schools in District No. 7 have been taught by Mr. Geo. L. Mildram, assisted in the intermediate by Miss Mercy Thomas and Miss Minnie Rice in the primary. On account of the illness and finally death of Miss Thomas, the intermediate department was given to the management and instruction of Mr. Ernest Files of Bangor. These schools have all been very profitable. Mr. Mildram is an exceptionally able instructor, and as principal of the school is proving worthy of the trust reposed in him.

Miss Caro Murray has taught in District No. 8 through the school year. Miss Murray is an excellent teacher. The thoroughness of her work is with difficulty surpassed.

Miss Myrtie Sinclair taught the summer school in District No. 9. Although this was Miss Sinclair's first term, she did profitable work.

In District No. 10 Miss Mercy Thomas taught the summer term, Miss Isa Lothrop the fall and winter. Miss Thomas and Miss Lothrop both did excellent work in their schools.

Miss Florence D. Foster taught the winter term in District No. 11 with good success. In the summer and fall the scholars were conveyed to District No. 3.

The attendance in schools this year has been very good, and upon the whole profitable work has been done throughout the town.
