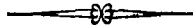

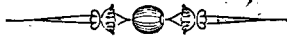

SCHEDULE OF CITY PROPERTY.

1.—EAST CEMETERY—Corner of Congress and Mountfort streets, containing about seven acres, including a large School Lot, with two School Houses thereon.

2.—WEST CEMETERY—Corner of Danforth and Vaughan streets, containing about fifteen acres.

3.—OLD TOWN LANDING—South side of Fore street, near the foot of Hancock street, sixty-six feet on the street and extending to the channel.

4.—OLD FERRY WAYS AND FLATS—At the foot of Thames street, three rods wide, extending to the channel.

5.—LOT OF LAND—on Brackett street, sixty-six feet on the street, and one hundred and twenty-four feet deep, with a large Brick School House and Ward Room thereon.

6.—LOT OF LAND—On Congress street, between Pearl and Lime streets, sixty-two feet on the street, and one hundred and nineteen feet deep, with a large two-story School House thereon.

7.—LOT OF LAND—On the North side of Spring street, about seventy feet on Spring street, running back from said Spring street one hundred and fifty-one feet, with a large Brick School House thereon.

8.—LOT OF LAND—On the South side of Spring street, between Centre and South streets, fifty feet on Spring street, and one hundred and thirty-three feet deep, with a School House and Ladder House thereon.

9.—LOT OF LAND—On the North side of Spring street, between Park and State streets, sixty feet on Spring street and seventy-nine feet deep, with a large Brick School House, granite front, Ward Room and Engine House thereon.

10.—LOT OF LAND—East side of Casco street, sixty feet on Casco street, and one hundred and five feet deep, with a School House and ~~Brick Building~~

11.—LOT OF LAND—On the South side of Danforth and Tyng streets, with a School House thereon.

12.—LOT OF LAND—On the Westerly side of Franklin street, forty feet front, with a Brick School House, Ward Room and Engine House thereon.

13.—SCHOOL HOUSE—Near Vaughan's Bridge.

14.—LOT OF LAND—On Sumner street, with a Brick School House thereon.

15.—LOT OF LAND—North side of Congress street, between Franklin and Locust streets, one hundred and eighty feet, by one hundred and twenty-four feet, occupied for a Hay Market and the Hay Scales standing thereon.

16.—LOT OF LAND—Westerly side of Lime street, sixty-eight feet on Lime street, and twenty-three feet on Milk street, with a large Brick Engine House, containing three Engines, and Watch House thereon.

17.—LOT OF LAND—At the junction of Middle and Congress streets, with the City Hall and Market House thereon.

18.—LOT OF LAND—On the Southerly side of Spring and South streets, about eighty feet on Spring street, with a large Brick building, containing a Ward Room and two Engine Houses thereon. Under this building is a large Reservoir, supplied with water from "Mariner's Spring."

19.—LOT OF LAND—On the Southerly side of South street, between Spring and Pleasant streets, twenty feet by one hundred and sixteen feet.

20.—A SMALL STRIP OF LAND—On the North side of Spring street, adjoining the westerly side of Clark street, five and a half feet by sixty feet.

21.—LOT OF LAND—On Exchange, Middle, and Lime streets, one hundred and sixty-six feet on Exchange streets, ninety-one feet eight inches on Middle street, and one hundred and ninety-six feet on Lime street with the Exchange Building thereon.

22.—LOT OF LAND—Laying Northeast of, and joining

the Promenade—extending to the Bay Shore, containing three acres, with the City Hospital thereon.

23.—ABOUT TWO AND A HALF ACRES OF LAND—Purchased of the United States, at the eastern extremity of Munjoy Hill, called Fish Point.

24.—LOT OF LAND—Southwest of and adjoining the State Arsenal, containing five acres, with a powder House thereon.

25.—LOT OF LAND—On the Westerly side of Park street, ninety feet on Park street, running back from Park street about two hundred and ten feet; with a new Brick School House, two stories high, on the same, designed for the accommodation of two Schools.

26.—THE “OLD STATE HOUSE,” recently purchased by the City, occupied for a Primary School, standing on leased land.

27.—LOT OF LAND—On the Westerly brow of Bramhall’s Hill, containing about thirty-nine acres: The Bramhall Promenade passes over part of this land.

This land is held by a Bond from Mrs. LITTLE, to be paid for when she shall make a legal conveyance to the City.

The preceding Lots, numbered 22, 24, and 27, in this Schedule, are under the care and improvement of the Overseers of the Alms-House.

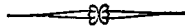
28.—CITY FARM—Containing about fifty-one acres of Land, with the Alms-House, House of Correction, Barns, and other out-buildings.

29.—Two-fifths, in common and undivided, of House and Land on Pleasant street, near High street, adjoining westerly the estate formerly owned by JOSEPH ADAMS, Esq.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER.



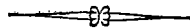

Gentlemen:—In compliance with the order of the Board of Aldermen of the twenty-third instant, I herewith submit a complete Return of the Engines, Hose Carriages, Hose, Ladder Carriages, and other Apparatus, with the location of each; and of the Officers and Engine-men, belonging to each Engine, Hose, Hook and Ladder Company of the Department;—together with a Return of the Public Wells and Reservoirs, with their location.

ENGINES.

CASCO No. 1.

Located corner of Spring and South Streets.

This Engine has 5 Buckets; 2 Axes; 4 Torches; 28 feet Suction Hose; 379 feet Leading Hose, with a Hose Carriage and Spanners, and 1 Crow-bar.

CATARACT, No. 2

Located in Lime Street, near corner of Milk Street.

This Engine has 4 Buckets ; 2 Axes ; 2 Torches ; — feet Leading Hose ; Crowbar.

The Cataract is not considered as belonging to the Department, and is not used at fires ; she had a full and efficient company, which keeps up an organization of mere form, in the hope of obtaining a new Engine ; she can never be made of much use to the city.

VOLUNTEER, No. 3.

Located at the corner of Milk and Lime Streets.

This Engine has 4 Buckets ; 2 Axes ; 5 Torches ; 1 Crowbar ; 28 feet Suction Hose ; 355 feet Leading Hose ; with a Hose Carriage, and Spanners.

At the House of No. 3, there are 45 feet spare Hose.

OCEAN, No. 4.

Located on Spring Street, near State Street.

This Engine has 4 Buckets ; 2 Axes ; 5 Torches ; 1 Crowbar ; 28 feet Suction Hose ; 328 feet Leading Hose ; with a Hose Carriage and Spanners.

PORTLAND, No. 5.

Located in Franklin Street, near Middle Street.

This Engine has 4 Buckets ; 2 Axes ; 5 Torches ; 1 Crowbar ; 28 feet Suction Hose ; 337 feet Leading Hose ; with a Hose Carriage and Spanners.

—————, No. 6.

This number has been vacant for several years, and will be filled by the Engine now building by E. Wyer & Co.

DELUGE, No. 7.

Located in Caseo Street, near Cumberland Street.

This Engine is not a suction, and has 4 Buckets ; 2 Axes ;

7 Torches; 2 Crowbars, 380 feet Leading Hose; with a Hose Carriage and Spanners.

At the Casco Street Engine House there are 340 feet spare Hose.

HYDRAULIAN, No. 8.

Located in Lime Street, near Milk Street.

This Engine is a "Perkins' Single Chamber" Suction, and has 4 Buckets; 2 Axes; 2 Torches; 21 feet Suction Hose; 160 feet Leading Hose, on a reel fixed to the Engine, and she has the necessary number of Spanners.

NIAGARA, No. 9.

Located in Casco Street, near Cumberland Street.

This Engine has 4 Buckets; 2 Axes; 5 Torches; 1 Crowbar; 24 feet Suction Hose; 310 feet Leading Hose; with a Hose Carriage and Spanners.

CITY HOSE CARRIAGES.

CITY HOSE, No. 1.

Located in the House with Engines No. 7 and 9.

This Carriage has at present 490 feet of Hose; with 4 Torches, and the necessary number of Spanners.

CITY HOSE, No. 2.

Located in the same House with Engine No. 3.

This Carriage has 475 feet of Hose; with 2 Torches, and the necessary number of Spanners.

AMERICA HOSE, No. 3.

Located under the same roof with Engine No. 1.

This Carriage has 600 feet of new Hose; 2 Lanterns; and the necessary number of Spanners.

BUCKET CARRIAGE — FIRE COMPANY No. 4.

Located in the same room with Hose Carriage No. 3.

This Carriage is constructed to carry 56 Buckets ; 12 Canvass Bags ; 8 Axes ; 2 Torches ; and a Street Chain.

It was in charge of Fire Company No. 4 ; but the Company is now disbanded.

CITY LADDER CARRIAGES, NOS. 1 AND 2.

Located in Spring Street, near South and Centre Streets.

These Carriages are furnished with 7 Ladders ; 4 Hooks ; 25 Axes ; 5 Crowbars ; Ropes and Chains for demolition, and 2 Sails for the protection of buildings ; with a Harness to each Carriage.

LADDER CARRIAGE IN CHARGE OF FIRE COMPANY No. 1.

Located on Congress Street, near Washington Street.

This Carriage is furnished with 2 Fire Hooks ; 4 Ladders ; 12 Axes ; 4 Crowbars ; 2 Torches ; and a Street Chain.

In addition to the above, there are belonging to the Department, 61 Fire Buckets, in a servicable condition ; 10 spare Axes ; 25 spare Spanners ; and Caps and Trumpets for the Board of Engineers ; and 5 sets of spare Hose Screws.

RESERVOIRS.

The whole number of Public Wells and Reservoirs under the care of the Fire Department, is twenty-two, and they are located as follows, to wit :

7. Federal street, opposite the Baptist Church—Well.
8. Wilmot, near Congress street.
9. Corner of Cumberland and Chesnut streets.
10. Union, near Middle street.
11. Junction of Congress and Middle streets, at the City Hall.
12. Corner of Free and Centre streets.
13. Danforth, near Fore street.
14. Cumberland, near Green street.
15. Congress, near Casco street.
16. Congress, near High street.
17. Corner of Spring and South streets.
18. Corner of State and Danforth streets.
19. Corner of Spring and Winter streets.
20. Bracket, near Pine street.
21. Temple street—large Well, under Maxwell's Store.
22. Foot of Wilmot street, on tide water.

All the above are in good condition, except No. 5, which will not retain the water during the ebb of the tide; and No. 22, which is now entirely full of sand, and which was useless from the beginning, through faulty construction.

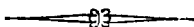

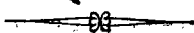

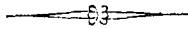
