## Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Presque Isle:

According to custom and the school laws of the State of Maine I submit herewith my second annual report as Superintendent of your schools. I have included in this report such statistical information as would seem to be of interest and value.

Our aim this year has been to make our schools second to none in efficiency. This can be accomplished only through the wholehearted cooperation of all concerned. The teaching staff has worked together very harmoniously. Early in the fall all elementary teachers were divided into groups for the purpose of formulating a uniform course of study for all subjects and improving teaching methods in each subject. This will continue to be our major task at teachers meetings until the end of the year. This work should be a distinct benefit to our school system in making our teaching, especially in rural schools, more uniform. Too much praise cannot be given the teachers in all schools for the spirit in which they have undertaken this work.

The work in nearly all the schools has been handicapped due to epidemics of measles, whooping cough and chicken pox. Although we have had the best of cooperation from town and E. R. A. office, many children have been absent from school on account of clothing. The average attendance for the first half year has been very low. Out of a total enrollment of 1937 the average attendance has been 1632.33. In spite of this the cost per pupil of an average attendance has been only \$48.45 for a fiscal year of 39 weeks, from February 20, 1934 to February 20, 1935. Although this average cost is somewhat higher than the previous year, we must bear in mind that schools were in session only 32 weeks in the fiscal year 1933-34 and many bills had to be carried over into this present year. Comparison of costs per pupil since 1928 shows the cost per pupil for present year about \$9 less than the average for the past six years.

During the spring of 1934 two federal nurses spent considerable time in Presque Isle checking undernourished children. As a result of this and through the generosity of the local Red Cross, Rotary Club, B. P. W. and citizens, funds were made available to care for needed tonsil, teeth and eye cases. The local dentists gave freely of their time and examined all children in the town schools and did much corrective work at a minimum cost. The local doctors and opticians have given their services to many needy cases for which school officials are very grateful. We have been able to have a school nurse during the winter months paid for from Federal funds. She has been of great assistance in checking diseases during our epidemics. I hope the time is not far distant when we may have a regular school nurse trained in public health work. I feel it would pay for itself in terms of healthier children.

Music in the elementary schools is being very capably handled by Miss Elwell. The absence of a music supervisor during the previous year was a distinct loss and it has taken considerable work to bring music back to its proper place. The supervisor spends two days each week in Gouldville and three days in the rural schools. This is one course which broadens the outlook of the child and carries over into adult life.

The work in the high school has been unusually efficient due to the excellent work of Mr. Cunningham and his faculty. Citizens of Presque Isle should be proud of their high school and its excellent corps of teachers. Only three vacancies occurred and these were filled with teachers of experience. In selecting teachers to fill vacancies the welfare of the boys and girls has been given first consideration. It has been our aim to have teachers of high ideals in addition to their scholastic qualifications. The agricultural department, with a registration of 35 boys continues to prove to be one of the most practical courses in our school curriculum. Lack of space prevents our including statistics from an excellent report by the instructor, Mr. Barnes. The work in physical education has been continued along the same line as last year. We hope to correlate this work more closely with



health instructions in the schools. The band has shown excellent improvement under the capable direction of Mr. Jenkins. The course of study has been changed slightly to make work more practical. A course in World History has been introduced for Sophomores to take the place of Ancient and Modern History. U. S. History is given to Juniors and a course in Government for Seniors. Clubs have been organized giving each pupil a chance to take part in some extra-curricula activity.

With very capable principals and teachers in both Gouldville and Training the work accomplished has been of a high order. Both schools have cooperated in every way to make our work more efficient. Due to the congested condition in the first grade it was necessary to add another teacher at the Training school. This has helped the situation in this grade, but the overcrowded condition in the other lower grades in both schools seriously handicaps the teacher. An additional teacher is needed in Gouldville as soon as financial conditions will warrant it.

I am particularly pleased with the excellent work being done in nearly all the rural schools. Our rural pupils, as far as possible, should have the same advantages as our town pupils. With good teachers and proper equipment they can. We should aim to improve our rural schools until this condition is realized. Very few changes occurred in the teaching staff. All new teachers added were normal graduates and well prepared for their work. Miss Brown, the rural helping teacher from the State Department, spent one week in Presque Isle working in the rural schools with good results. The first rural school exhibition was held in the High School in June with excellent interest. Another will be held this June in connection with rural school graduation.

Through projects approved by the C. W. A. and E. R. A. extensive repairs were made with all labor and some material furnished. The total expense to the town was slightly over \$2,-000. Hayward, Jordan, James, Spragueville, Whittaker, Ross, South Presque Isle, Sawyer, Hayden Butterfield and Reach schools were thoroughly repaired. Nine rural schools were painted on the outside and twelve on the inside with minor repairs

on Pomeroy, Glidden, Merritt and Gardner schools. The interior of Gouldville was completely painted two coats and plaster repaired. Weather stripping was placed on all windows at Training school, bulletin boards made, blackboards repaired, windows puttied, and radiators repaired. At the high school the gymnasium was renovated, new seats made and interior painted two coats. A new drain was placed in the coal pit, boilers cleaned and repaired, a pressure reducing valve installed on water main, two lower halls painted, four classrooms painted, new shelves placed in stock room, all windows puttied and painted. In addition the high school and Gouldville grounds were leveled and two tennis courts nearly finished.

Our next project should be installation of proper heating plants in our rural schools. I would recommend that one or two be cared for each year until they are taken care of. Several rural schools are almost impossible to heat under present arrangement.

Teachers and pupils deeply appreciate the interest and effort of the local library committee and the librarian, Mrs. Akeley, in making available proper reading material for all elementary pupils. Through the generosity of this committee every rural school has been loaned fifty of the best books available. State Library sets have been furnished Gouldville as well. The committee working on the improvement of reading appreciate the assistance of Mrs. Akeley.

In conclusion I wish to take this opportunity of expressing my appreciation for the cooperation of town officials, school board, teachers and citizens in making this a successful and pleasant school year. Believing that proper education of our boys and girls is of major importance, it is my sincere desire that we use every effort to keep up the efficiency of our schools.

# Warrant

---

To R. A. Junkins a Constable in the Town of Presque Isle, in the County of Aroostook and State of Maine. Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of said Town of Presque Isle, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Perry Theatre, in said Town of Presque Isle on the eighteenth day of March 1935, at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To elect a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Report as printed.
- Art. 4. To elect all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest at the rate of six per cent per annum on all taxes remaining unpaid after October 15, 1935, and eight per cent on all taxes remaining unpaid after January 1, 1936.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will fix a time when taxes will be due and payable.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote that Poll Taxes shall be due and payable on the first day of May, 1935, and the commitment of the list of poll tax payers shall be made to the Collector prior to that date.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Councilors and Treasurer of the Town to obtain temporary loans for the Town from time to time during the coming year, to be paid out of money raised by taxation, such loans not to exceed in the aggregate at any one time the sum of ONE HUNDRED

FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$140,000.00) and to make, execute and negotiate in the name of the Town a note or notes therefor such time and term as to them seems advisable, and also to renew from time to time as to them seems necessary, the whole or any part of such notes given.

- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for General Government, as follows: Council and Assessors, Town Manager, Town Clerk, Town Auditor, Moderator and Officers' Expense.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Protection of Persons and Property, as follows: Police Department, Fire Department, Fire Inspector, Building Inspector, Insurance Premiums and Hydrant Rental.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Health and Sanitation, as follows: Public Dump, Vital Statistics, Anti-Tuberculosis Association, Health Officer and Milk Inspector.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways, Sidewalks and Bridges, as follows: Maintenance and Equipment, Winter Breaking, Road Commissioner, Third-class Patrol, Street Lights.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote "YES" or "NO" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid, as provided in Sec. 20, Chapter 23, Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art. 14. To see what sum of money the Town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provision of Sec. 19, Chap. 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provision of Sec. 3, Chap. 175, P.L. of 1933.

- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the road as laid out by the Councilors and Road Commissioner for State Aid. (The Parsons and Old Fort Fairfield Roads.)
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Charity, as follows :Town Farm, Poor off the Farm, Mother's Aid and Children's Guardian.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Education, as follows: Common School Teachers, Common School Janitors, Common School Fuel, Common School Conveyance, Common School Text-books, Common School Supplies, High School Teachers, High School Janitors, High School Fuel, High School Text-books, High School Supplies, Repairs, Superintendent, Office Expense and Committee, Physical Education, Music, Compulsory Education, Equipment, Agricultural Course and Interest on School Fund.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Interest.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Free Public Library.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Improvement of Cemeteries.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Abatements.
- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Maintenance of the Municipal Building.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be deposited as a Sinking Fund.
- Art. 25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$300.-

00) to be deposited as a Sinking Fund for Rural School Houses.

- Art. 26. To see what sum, if any, the Town will recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to state aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P.L. 1931.
- Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the action of the Special Town Meeting of September 17, 1934 whereby the Town voted to raise and appropriate the sum of THREE THOUSAND DOLLARS \$(3,000.00) to be spent in connection with E.R.A. Projects.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of TWO THOUSAND FOUR AND 2-100 DOLLARS (\$2,004.02) used in connection with E.R.A. funds expended on the C'eaves Road, Parkhurst Road, Phair Junction Road and Spragueville Road.
- Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of THREE THOUSAND NINE HUNDRED TWO AND 63-100 DOLLARS (\$3,902.63) for Material used for Relief Projects.
- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of SIXTEEN THOUSAND FORTY-SEVEN AND 8-100 DOLLARS (\$16,047.08) to pay balances of the Overdrawn Accounts.
- Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money in excess of SEVEN HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$700.00) tax assessed against the Presque Hotel Company for the purpose of paying said tax for the ensuing year.
- Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money in excess of TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS (\$25.00) tax assessed against the Presque Isle Airport for the ensuing year.



Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Town Ordinances regulating the Traffic and Parking of Vehicles.

Sec. 1. That Hall street, a one way street shall be reserved for Trucks, and Teams engaged in Public Trucking and shall park along the South side of the Street at an angle of 45 degrees.

Sec. 2. That Teams engaged in Public Trucking, all Trucks with a registered capacity of over 1000 lbs. be prohibited from parking on Main street from Blake street to Academy street and on State street from the Concrete Bridge to Second street.

Sec. 3. Parking on Main street from a point opposite the Northern Entrance to the B. & A. Station to State street shall be in a double row at an angle of 45 degrees from the centerline of the Street, and a single row on each side of the Street along and parallel to the curb, with a 15 minute parking limit for Vehicles parked parallel to the curb.

On Main street from State North to Church street parking in a single row in the center of the Street at an angle of 45 degrees, and in a single row on each side of the Street along and parallel to the curb, with a 15 minute parking limit for Vehicles parked parallel to the curb.

On Main street from Church street North to Blake street cars to be parked at an angle of 45 degrees from the curb on the West side of the Street parallel to the curb on the East side.

On State street from the B. & A. R. R. crossing to Main street Vehicles will park on the South side of the Street parallel to the curb and on the North side of the Street at an angle of 45 degrees to the curb with a 30 minute time limit.

On State street from Main street to Second street park-

ing will be on both sides of the Street at an angle of 45 degrees to the curb.

- Sec. 4. All Town Ordinances or provisions relating to the Parking, that are inconsistent with the aforesaid portions are hereby revoked and repealed.
- Sec. 5. That section (10) article (41) (1931-32) the word (all) be substituted for the word (motor) so that the section shall read "and all Vehicles shall enter said street only by its Northern intersection with Main street and shall leave said street only by its Southern intersection with Main street.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Curfew law or ordinance.  
That no person under the age of Fifteen shall loiter or remain for the purpose of loitering on any public street, highway, sidewalk, alley, store, platform, or in any public place within that part of Presque Isle included within the corporation limits of the Presque Isle Fire Department after the hour of nine o'clock in the evening each day, under a penalty of not less than one or more than five dollars for each and every offense.
- Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000.00) for Repair Parts for the Linn Tractor.
- Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to Authorize the Council and Town Manager to purchase a Truck or Tractor, using the ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000.00) and the amount allowed for the Linn Tractor toward the first payment, the balance to be extended over a period of four years.
- Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of ONE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$1,500.00) to purchase the York Grader.
- Art. 38. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise, to be expended and used for advertising the

natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine and of the Town, the same to be expended through the Arden County Council.

- Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to permit within its limits any outdoor recreational or competitive sport or game, except boxing, horse-racing, air circuses or wrestling, between the hours of one o'clock P. M., and seven o'clock P. M., on Sunday in accordance with Chapter 245 of the Public Laws of Maine, 1933, known as "The Sunday Amateur Sports Law."

The Councilors give notice that they will be in session at the Municipal Hall in said Town of Presque Isle, the fourteenth, fifteenth and sixteenth days of March, 1935, at nine o'clock in the forenoon for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
