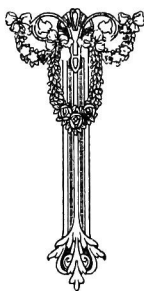

The New England Exchange does not allow a credit for this truck, it having only a 300-gallon capacity. I therefore recommend that a new 700-gallon pumper be purchased to replace this unit. The 1924 American LaFrance also needs to be overhauled, and I recommend a man from the factory do this job.

I wish to call your attention to the age of the air tank on the fire-alarm system. It is some 30 years old, and carries 90 lbs. pressure. I fee that it is unsafe, and recommend that it be tested by a competent hammer tester.

I further recommend that the Ladder Truck be equipped with new tires, as it is unwise to leave the present ones remain on too long. The tires on the other trucks should be changed also; but can probably carry us through this year.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

January 1, 1940

To the Board of Education and the Citizens of Presque Isle:

Because of the fact that our fiscal year now ends on December 31, instead of February 20, as in previous year, this report will cover statistics for forty-five instead of fifty-two weeks.

The total enrollment is the highest on record in the town of Presque Isle. It is of interest to note the increase which has taken place since 1919, or in 20 years. The common school increase has been 216 or 17 per cent, and the high school 221 or 57 per cent.

## School Curriculum

With the opening of the fall term the seventh and eighth grade pupils were transferred from Training School and Gouldville, to the new high school addition, making a six-year high school. During the past year a study was made of curriculums offered in other progressive schools of the State. A great deal of time and study was placed on the organization of these grades and a program worked out to correlate with the high school program, and give to our boys and girls not only the fundamental tool subjects, but as many cultural subjects as possible. Our curriculum for this group now includes English, Mathematics, Social Science, Literature, five times per week. Every student has one hour of Art, one hour of Physical Education, one hour of Music, one-half hour of Music Appreciation, and one hour of Health and Science. In addition to the above, opportunity is given for instruction in instrumental music. The teacher pupil load for these grades is in excess of forty. During the coming year it will be necessary to add one more teacher.

A new course in Home Economics was introduced in high school with a maximum enrollment of 100 girls. It was impossible to offer this to more than Juniors and Seniors. With the

addition of another teacher, it may be offered to Freshmen and Sophomores. I hope it may be possible in the near future to offer a course in manual training. We will then be able to have a curriculum to suit the needs of nearly all our boys and girls.

### Elementary Schools

With the removal of two grades from both town buildings, the congestion has been somewhat relieved, although many rooms still have forty or more pupils. A sub-primary group is now maintained in each building. The State Department of Education is insisting that this be installed in every town. It has been proven beyond doubt that the average child five years of age is not old enough to do regular first grade work. Our sub-primary pupils are promoted to the first grade just as soon as they are old enough to do the work of the grade. Departmental work is still continued in the fourth, fifth, and sixth grades at Gouldville, although it is questionable whether better results would not be obtained by reducing the amount of departmental work being done. During the coming year I am recommending that this be done. The work in both schools is of a high order. We are very fortunate in having excellent principals and a fine corps of teachers to whom the success of the schools should be credited.

Two rural schools, the Spragueville and Gardner, were closed this year and the pupils transported to other schools. Considering the fact that nearly half of our rural teachers are new, I consider that good work is being done in nearly every rural school.

New teachers at Gouldville, are: Mr. Francis Haskell, principal; Miss Dors Brewer, Grade III; and Miss Fern Snowman, Grade I. At the Training School, new teachers are: Miss Mildred Hilt, Grade V; and Miss Elizabeth Fairbanks, sub-primary. In the rural schools we have six new teachers: Miss Elizabeth Greenfield is at Sawyer, Miss Mildred Sutter at Hayden, Miss Madeline Sutter at Chandler, Miss Catherine Christholm at Butterfield, Miss Helen Brooks at South Presque Isle, and Miss

Margaret Gantnier at Whittaker. New teachers in the high school are: Miss Elizabeth Kelley in Grade VII; Mr. Leonard Page, Bookkeeping; Miss Geraldine Frasure, English; Mr. Dana Wallace, Mathematics; and Science; Mr. Edmund Maines, Physics and General Science; Mr. Donald Lewis, Music; and Miss Vera Brastow, Home Economics.

All of the new elementary teachers were graduates of the three-year normal school course and two of them have received their degrees from the State University. All of the teachers, both new and old, merit the high praise involved in saying that their attitude has been professional. Several of them attended summer school last year and eighteen elementary teachers are now taking a professional course once a week for credit.

#### Repairs and Construction

During the past year we have seen the high school addition completed and dedicated. This is a fine addition to our building and one in which every citizen should be proud. On September 18, the Maysville School was burned. At the urgent request of parents in that community, a new building was built and ready for occupancy on December 5. Extensive repairs were made on the Ross, Whittaker, and Hayden school houses. This included insulating the ceilings and painting. The Merritt and Jordan schools were painted on both inside and out, with minor repairs made. All the windows and casings of the high school building were painted with a marked improvement in appearance as a result. During the coming summer the Butterfield, South Presque Isle and James schools will need to be repaired and painted. The painting of the new Maysville school has been left for next summer. As soon as finances will permit, new heating plants should be installed. It will be necessary to do extensive repair work on the Gouldville building, including patching of plaster, painting, and the installation of new toilets in the girl's basement. A new stoker was installed in the Gouldville building which is giving a great saving on fuel. It is recommended that one be installed in



the high school next summer. There is no question but what it will pay for itself in a few years in fuel saving.

### School Costs

The popular saying that "Schools are Free" is not entirely true. It costs money to run schools and the efficiency of the schools is dependent to a considerable degree on the amount of money the citizens are willing to contribute towards their support.

The policy of the Superintendent and School Board has been to make the Presque Isle schools as efficient as possible by providing a program as far as possible to meet the needs of the boys and girls and administering it with economy with due regard to the community's investment in the project. A school system is a business enterprise and should be administered as economically as possible. Figures alone do not give a complete picture of school costs but considering the increased enrollment in the past ten years it is interesting to note the comparison of school expenditures which follow:

It is not perfect by any means, but will compare favorably with any in the State. We try to be progressive, but not radically so, always keeping in mind what is best for our boys and girls. The success of our school is dependent on the cooperation of a splendid group of teachers, many of whom have been in the system for a comparatively long period. I believe special tribute should be given to our high school principal, Mr. F. S. Cunningham, who has given his best to his school for nearly seventeen years.

Teachers who have served more than ten years in Presque Isle, are: Mr. Glen Chamberlain, 12 years; Miss Elsie Coffey, 11 years; Miss Marion Conant, 11 years; Miss Edith Fairweather, 20 years; Miss Anne Fillmore, 15 years; Mr. William Hanscom, 11 years; Miss Mildred Hilt, 10 years; Miss Delia Houghton, 10 years; Miss Anita Hunter, 10 years; Miss Marelina Ireland, 12 years; Miss Audrey McEachern, 13 years; Miss Cecelia Moreau, 11 years; Miss Ernestine McKay, 11 years; Miss Amy O'Roak, 12 years; Mr. Raymond Roderick, 10 years; Miss Phyllis Rolfe, 11 years; Miss Elizabeth Ruark, 10 years. Miss Amber Sutter, 14 years; and Miss Mary Shannon, 10 years. Although not a town employee,, but nevertheless connected with our school system, is Mrs. Margaret Preble, who will complete in June, fifteen years of efficient service as principal of the Training School. These long periods of service speak well for our school system.

In closing this part of my seventh annual report as your Superintendent of Schools, I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the members of the School Board, to the Town Manager and Council, and the other workers and citizens for their loyal support and cooperation in the cause of education in the schools of Presque Isle.
