Town Warrant.

To George M. Esty, a Constable of the Town of Rangeley, County of Franklin. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Rangeley, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town, on Monday, the sixth day of March next, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon to act on the following articles to wit:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools for the ensuing year.
- ART. 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of a Free High School.
- ART. 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking Winter Roads.
- ART: 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair State Road.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of text-books and school supplies for the ensuing year.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairing schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on indebtedness.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on town debt.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for building and repairing sidewalks.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

- ART. 15. To see if the town will vote to pay a discount on taxes paid on or before certain specified dates and if so how much money shall be raised to pay said discount.
- ART. 16. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes not paid on or before Jan. 1 following the commitment of said taxes and if so how much.
- ART. 17. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the Library.
- ART. 18. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay town charges.
- ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to pay a sum of money annually equal to the amount of the taxes assessed by said town on the property and franchise of the Rangeley Water company, in consideration of being granted water for public drinking fountains, watering troughs, school buildings and other municipal buildings and for street sprinkling purposes, for and during the term of twenty years.
- ART. 20. To see if the town will vote to erect a schoolhouse in the village of Oquossoc and how much money shall be appropriated for the same.
- ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the Municipal Officers, Treasurer and Town Clerk.
- ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to build a Snow Roller for use in breaking roads, and if so how much money shall be appropriated for the same.
- ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Assessors to include in their inventory and tax all rowboats and canoes valued Fifteen Dollars or over.
- ART. 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town Hall at 12.30 o'clock in the afternoon on the day of said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

We recommend that the town raise sufficient money to build a snow roller, as one is not sufficient to roll all the roads in town and the one which we now have is not quite heavy enough to do good work. We also recommend that the town take some action in regard to disposing of the unused school building in the village. We would also suggest that four per cent discount be allowed on all taxes paid before the first day of July following the assessment and two per cent on all taxes paid before the first day of October following the assessment, as by that method our money would come in nearer the time when it is needed to pay the bills.

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

To the School Committee and Citizens of Rangeley:

I have the honor to submit herewith my report of the schools of Rangeley for the year ending Feb. 24, 1905:

The progressive policy followed by the town for the last few years has resulted in schools that will compare favorably with any in the county.

The education of youth is by far the most important work of a community. More and more it affects the success of the individual and the prosperity and safety of a free country. The schools should have the best possible physical conditions, material equipment, teaching ability and moral support. Improvements always cost something but they are worth all they cost.

High School.

It is to be hoped that an increasing number will take advantage of this valuable course of study. It prepares the scholars for college or sends them out better fitted to appreciate the good things and to overcome the difficulties in life. So far there have been students in the first three years of the course only. Next year there will be scholars in all the four years of the course. This will require at least twenty recitations a day and as each recitation in High school work requires at least thirty minutes of time, the teaching force will need to be increased if satisfactory results are to be obtained in the school. The school is very much in need of apparatus for the work in the sciences. At least \$100 should be raised for this purpose.

Graded Schools.

The village schools are well graded and provided with excellent courses of study. Each term's work prepares the scholar forthe next and the scholar needs to be in school at the beginning of the year and all through the year if he is to advance in the school.

Rural Schools.

Scholars should and can be fitted in the rural schools to enter the High-school. To do this well and do justice to the younger scholars, the teacher's time should not be taken up with studies that properly belong to the High school course. These schools should have a course of study and more should be done to make them attractive and efficient.

Expenditures.

We have been obliged to overdraw the appropriation for the common schools for the following reasons: An excellent sub-Primary school has been maintained during the school year; the cost of fuel has been much in excess of what it has ever been before; a janitor for the village schools has been employed who has put the most of his time into taking excellent care of the building and the fires; in response to the needs of Oquossoc, free conveyance has been furnished to scholars from that part of the town to the Quimby school during the last half of the year, at a cost of \$1.50 a day; and about \$50 less has been received from the state.

The appropriation for text-books and supplies has fallen short of the absolute needs of the schools but an equal appropriation may answer for the coming year.

The appropriation for repairs was ample, an equal amount should be appropriated next year.

That we raise for High school, \$400.

That we raise for apparatus, \$100.

That we raise for common schools, \$1,400.

That we raise for text-books, \$200.

That we raise for repairs, \$100.
