STATE OF MAINE.

To Leon D. Haley, a Constable in the Town of Rangeley, in said County, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Rangeley qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town, on the Fifth day of March, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- FIRST.—To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- SECOND.—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- THIRD.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools for the year ensuing.
- FOURTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the support of a Free High School for the year ensuing.
- FIFTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the purchase of text books for the year ensuing.
- SIXTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the repairs of School Houses for the year ensuing.
- SEVENTH.—To see if the town will vote to maintain the school in the Quimby District, so-called.
- EIGHTH.—To see if the town will vote to maintain the school in the Wilbur District, so-called.
- NINTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the support of poor for the year ensuing.
- TENTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for repairing highways and bridges for the year ensuing.
- ELEVENTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for repairing the State Road for the year ensuing.
- TWELFTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for breaking winter roads for the year ensuing.

THIRTEENTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay on town debt.

FOURTEENTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay Interest on indebtedness for the year ensuing.

FIFTEENTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to build and repair sidewalks in Rangeley Village.

SIXTEENTH.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay for the observance of Memorial Day.

SEVENTEENTH.—To see if the town will vote to build or buy a Snow Roller, and if so, how much money, if any, shall be raised to pay for the same.

EIGHTEENTH.—To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the Library.

NINETEENTH.—To see if the town will vote to have the taxes collected the same as last year, so far as Discounts and Interest are concerned; and if so, how much money, if any, shall be raised to pay discount on same.

TWENTIETH.—To see what action the town will take regarding a school-house lot at Oquossoc.

TWENTY-FIRST.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for Insurance.

TWENTY-SECOND.—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to buy Apparatus for the schools.

TWENTY-THIRD.—To see if the town will vote to grade the School-house lot at Oquossoc; and if so, how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay for the same.

TWENTY-FOURTH.—To see if the town will vote to build an addition to the Village School Building; and if so, how much money, if any, shall be raised to pay for the same.

TWENTY-FIFTH.—To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise to finish paying for the School-house at Oquossoc.

TWENTY-SIXTH.—To see if the town will vote to repair the Town House, and if so, how much money, if any, shall be raised to pay for the same, and how said money shall be expended.

TWENTY-SEVENTH.—To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise to advertise the Town of Rangeley as a summer resort, and how the same shall be expended.

TWENTY-EIGHTH.—To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay town charges for the year ensuing.

TWENTY-NINTH.—To see if the town will vote to purchase a public watering trough and drinking fountain; and if so, how much money, if any, shall be raised to pay for the same.

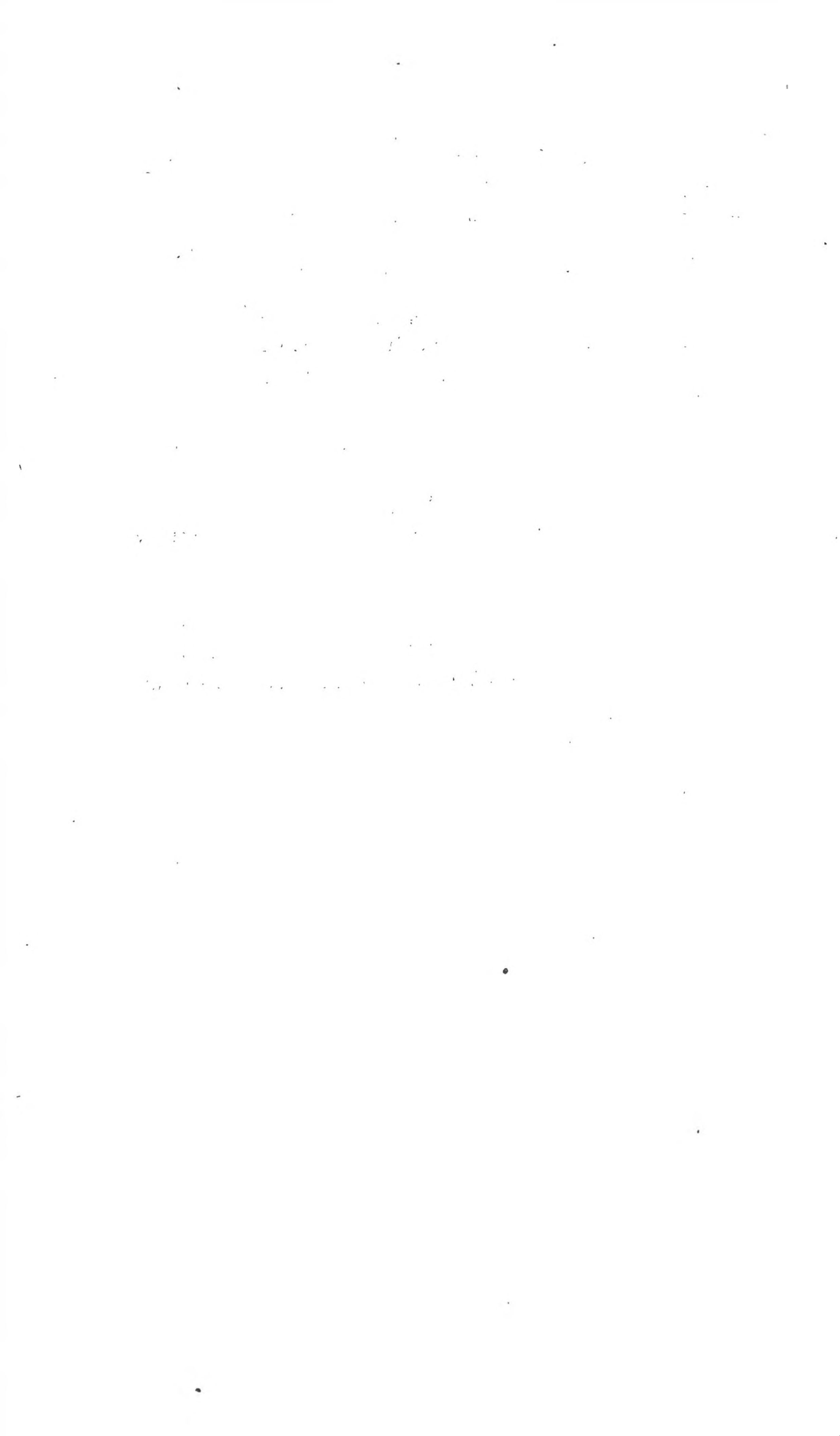

D. 1906.

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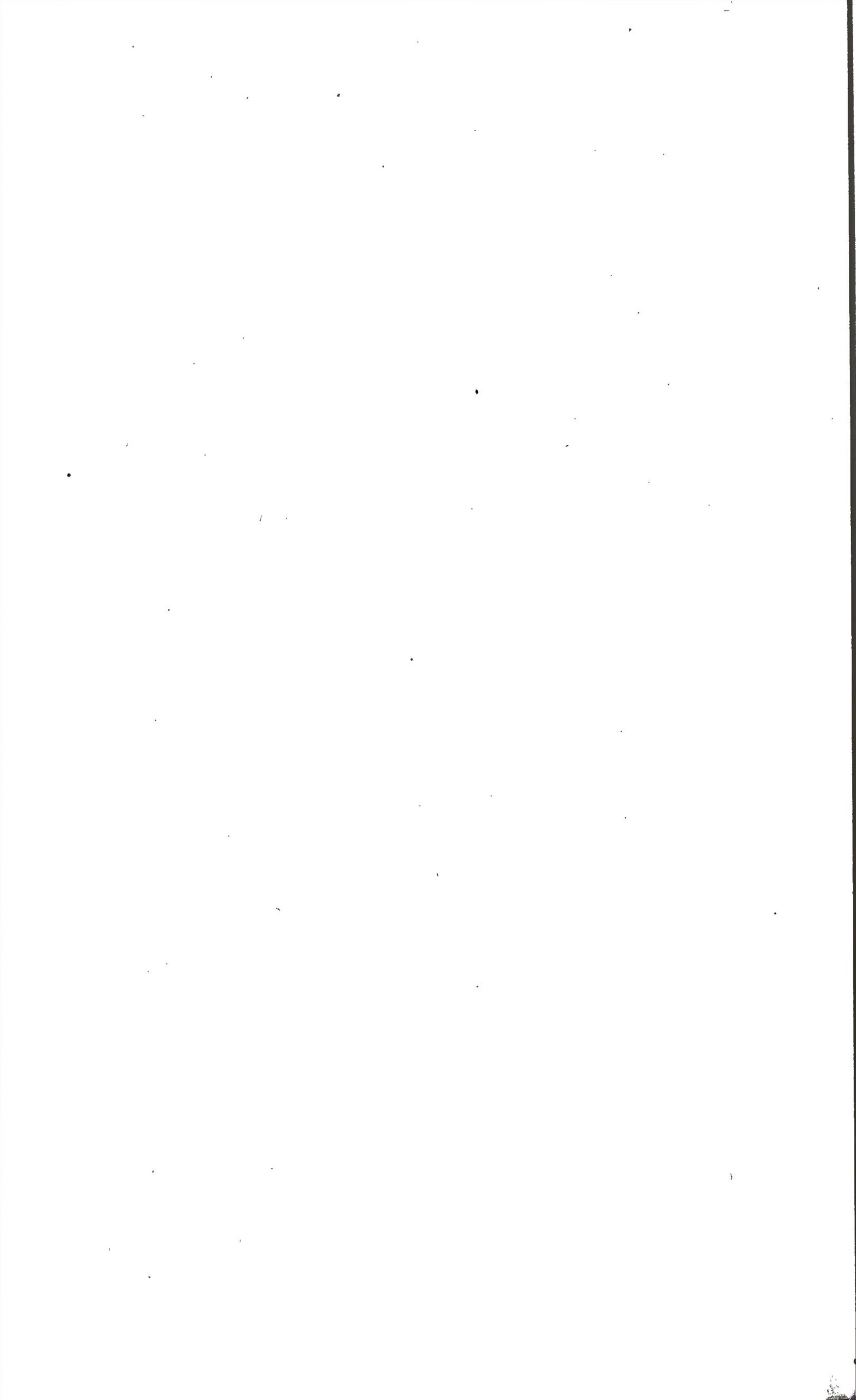

REPORT OF SUPT. OF SCHOOLS.

Excellent conditions have prevailed throughout the schools for the past year. To an unusual extent the different elements interested in the schools have worked together harmoniously. The teachers have been well fitted for their positions and they have been very faithful and successful in their work. Excellent order has been the rule in all the schools. All the school buildings are in excellent repair and have attractive interiors. All the schools have been furnished with globes, and nearly all with maps.

The High and Grammar School Improvement League has held semi-weekly literary meetings, and has expended over ninety dollars for their schools, having purchased an organ, books to the value of thirty dollars, and together with the Intermediate School Improvement League, a nice lawn mower. The last named League has also done much for the school and held regular meetings.

The White School Improvement League has painted the interior of the school-room, purchased a clock, twelve good books and a book case. The Quimby School in a similar way has been furnished with a flag. The citizens of Oquossoc have generously given their school a bell and a flag. The Village schools have improved their lawn and set out twenty-six shade trees.

But some conditions can be improved. I can not conceive of a teacher who does not earnestly desire that all her scholars shall do well, whoever they are; but her best efforts are often defeated by the indifference of scholars or parents, poor attendance, or some other adverse condition. I have received many just complaints from several of my teachers, who say that they cannot get good school work from scholars whose thoughts for days before and whose energies for days after some long midweek social or entertainment have been so drawn upon that they do not have the ability or the ambition to do much of anything in school. This is something for parents and scholars to think seriously about.

The attendance in the Wilbur School, also the Quimby School, has fallen so low that by the law of the State they must be discontinued, unless there is a special vote of the town to continue them. Transportation to some other school, when it can be obtained, is the best solution of the difficulty.

The school lot at Oquossoc has not been graded, and is in bad condition for a school.

More room is needed for the Village schools. Present indications show that by another year, at least twenty scholars in the Intermediate and Primary grades will lack accommodation. The High School has no school-room except what was intended for a laboratory. The present arrangements of the Primary rooms has been unsatisfactory in many ways. They should be put into one with a wadrobe, and a wing added to the building in which to put a Primary school and the High School.

The increasing duties of the Subprimary and High School assistant's position will make the work too much for one teacher to fill both, longer than the rest of this year. I would recommend that an assistant be obtained for the High School who can teach music in all the Village schools.

The principal of the High School is also Master of all the schools in the building. He is so engaged. His position is paramount. Not only the conditions of his own school, but to a large extent those of the other schools, especially those pertaining to the grounds, basement and halls, depend first of all on him. He is every scholar's teacher in the building. A strong master can do a great deal to brace up the weak places in all the other schools; but a weak master is pretty sure to make all the schools in the building a failure. My policy has been to bid as high as I can for good teachers, and after I get good teachers to keep them as long as I can. To keep Mr. Bradford a second year I had to raise his salary. If he is to be retained another year his salary will have to be raised again. Lack of space prevents my making any special mention of other teachers. But I will say that they have received encouragement to do their best. They have welcomed helpful suggestions, if there have been any, and have shown unusual devotion to their work.

The town has responded well to the needs of its schools; but

the growth of the schools, the increasing needs, the scarcity of good teachers, and the fact that the teachers' expenses have increased and will increase to keep pace with other things, will necessitate a still larger expenditure for the coming year. I would recommend that the town raise for

EXPLANATION.

\$172.50 was expected from the State for High School for last year (1904) more than had been received at the time of the last report. For some reason only \$134 was received. For this last year \$245, instead of \$250, has been received. We shall try for an explanation. I was told by the State Superintendent that we would receive \$250 for each year.

An unexpected drain was made on the Repairs account to put water into the Village school building and fit the building at Oquossoc.
