To Ermon L. Toothaker, a Constable in the Town of Rangeley, in said County,
Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Rangeley qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said town, on the second day of March 1908. at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles. to wit:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To hear and except reports of Town Officers.
- ART. 3. Choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing,
- ART. 4. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the support of Common Schools for one year ensuing.
- ART. 5. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the support of Free High School for the year ensuing.
- ART. 6. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the purchase of text-books for ensuing year.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for repair of schoolhouses for the year ensuing.
- ART. 8. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the support of poor, for the year ensuing.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will raise for repairing highways for the year ensuing.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for repairing bridges for the year ensuing.
- ART. 11. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" upon the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907 relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the State aid for highways for the year 1908.
- ART. 12. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart, for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town, such a some of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of \$110.50.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for breaking Winter roads for the year ensuing.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay interest on town bonds.
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to build and repair sidewalks in Rangeley Village for the year ensuing.
- ART. 16. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay for the observance of Memorial Day, and how the same shall be expended.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise for the Library.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to pay for a street sprinkler, for the year ensuing.

- ART, 19. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to advertise the town as a Summer Resort. X
- ART 20 To see if the town will vote to have the taxes collected the same as last year, so far as discount and interest are concerned; and if so, how much money, if any shall be raised to pay discount on the same. X
- ART. 21. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will raise to pay insurance. X
- ART. 22. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay the Rangeley Water Company for the use of water for the year ensuing. X
- ART. 23. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay Town Charges for the year ensuing. X
- ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to buy wire fence to use in fencing the highways in certain places where the snow drifts, and if so how much money shall be raised to pay for the same. X
- ART. 25. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise toward building a new bridge across the Lake between the Steam Boat Wharf and the Rail Road Station near Rangeley Lake House. X
- ART. 26 To see if the town will vote to pay for fighting fire on the Carry Road at Oquossoc in the Summer of 1907. X
- ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to accept the town way as laid out by the selectmen, leading from the end of the town way near Hotel Barker and ending at land owned by Samuel Weiss on East shore of Mooselookme-guntic Lake, record of which was filed with the the Town Clerk on Feb. 22, 1908.
- ART. 28. To see if the town will vote to accept the town way as laid out by the selectmen leading from Pleasant Street to Center Street in Rangeley Village, record of which was filed with the Town Clerk Feb. 22, 1908.
- ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as made out by the Selectmen, Clerk and Treasure.
- ART. 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meet- ing.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS REPORT.

To the School Board and Citizens of Rangeley:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report of the school of Rangeley.

The high standard of the schools has been maintained, Whooping Cough has caused a severe interruption in the fall term but when all the lost time has been made up at the end of the year, the usual amount of work will have been completed by nearly all.

By removal of families from the Wilbur school district but very few scholars remain that could not as conveniently go to the village school, and get better advantages.

To secure competent teachers, I have had to pay larger salaries, this is due partly to increase in price of board and partly to scarcity of good teachers. I have now raised the salary of the janitor. It is still too low.

In my last report — I recommended raising \$350 for repairs, \$300 was raised and the sudden giving out of the furnace in the village school building caused an unexpected expence of over \$50 repairing these, so the most of the repairs inside the building had to be omitted. In next summer vacation, the inside finish and desks ought to have a coat of varnish.

A few changes have been made in text-books and course of study. Paper cutting and folding has been added to the course in drawing in the primary schools, a small history has been put into the intermediate school, a new text-book on the subject has been introduced in the grammar school, physiology has been taken from the sixth grade and put into the seventh, the large geography has been taken from the seventh and eighth and put into the eight and ninth grades.

These changes make the course of study more complete and better adapted to the age of scholars. Ten years ago verdicle writing which originated with scientific minds in Germany swept over this whole country. I became converted to this system and I think it is as good now as it was then but the Medial slant, is nearly vertical writing, has taken its place almost everywhere. Not wishing to appear too conceited and persistent in opposing so general a movement, I have introduced the Medial slant writing in the first and second grades, with the idea that these as they advance and those who come after them, shall be taught this system; I do not think it would be wise to try to make the older scholars give up a system in which they have been well established and take up a new system.

The high school ought to have a better attendance; the instruction and

course of study are of a high order. There is some immediate need in its equipment.

The state superintendent of schools. Payson Smith, in passing judgment on the high schools approves of its conditionally as a "standard high school," and be made the condition that if it is to continue to rank as a "Standard High School," it must have a well equipped laboratory.

Perhaps it will be remembered that the only chance to seat the high school is in the room that was planed for a laboratory.

Two scholars graduated from the school last year having completed the course in a highly commendable manner, and two more will graduate next June who intend to enter college next fall.

The school improvement league of the intermediate school has purchased a splendid set of maps and have quite a sum left in its treasury.

They have raised about thirty-five dollars during the first year.
