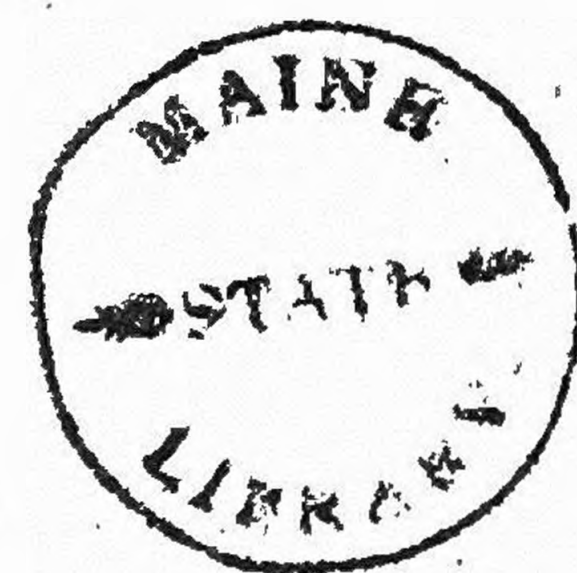

TOWN WARRANT

*To William Tomlinson, a constable in the town of Rangeley, in the
County of Franklin,*

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Rangeley, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town, on the fourth day of March, A. D. 1918, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1

To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2

To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3

To hear reports of town officers and take action thereon.

ARTICLE 4

To choose all other town officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 6

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of a Free High school for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 7

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of text-books for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 8

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 9

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay for apparatus for the schools for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 10

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 11

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 12

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of bridges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 13

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking winter roads for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 14

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the interest on town bonds for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 15

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to build and repair sidewalks in Rangeley village for the ensuing year, and how the same shall be expended.

ARTICLE 16

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day, and how the same shall be expended.

ARTICLE 17

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Library association for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 18

To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes, and if so, how much, and how much money shall be raised to pay discount.

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ARTICLE 19

To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay Rangeley Water Company for the use of water for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 20

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 21

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay the expenses of office for the selectmen for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 22

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 23

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 24

To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided by section 18 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

ARTICLE 25

To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$800 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18, chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

ARTICLE 26

To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State and State Aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of sections 8, 17, 26, 27 and 28, chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

ARTICLE 27

To see what action the town will vote to take upon section 21, chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916, as amended by section 5 of chapter 258, Public Laws of 1917, which provides for towns making additional appropriations and receiving additional aid and a bonus; and what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or instruct the selectmen to hire, if any, for said purpose.

ARTICLE 28

To see how much money, if any, the town will vote to raise to pay on town debt.

ARTICLE 29

To see if the town of Rangeley will vote to adopt the following by-laws or ordinances:

Ordinance No. 3. For the prevention of bicycle riding, sliding or coasting on the sidewalks; also the standing of teams, and the driving of teams on the sidewalks except to cross and re-cross them.

Be it enacted by the legal voters of the town of Rangeley at the annual town meeting held in said town on the fourth day of March, A. D. 1918,

That it shall be unlawful for any person to ride a bicycle on the sidewalks within the limits of Rangeley Village Corporation; that it shall also be unlawful for any person to slide or coast on the sidewalks within the limits of said Rangeley Village Corporation; that it shall also be unlawful to leave teams standing upon the sidewalks, or to drive teams on the sidewalks except to cross and re-cross; and any person found guilty of a violation of this ordinance shall be liable to a fine not exceeding ten dollars, to be recovered by complaint, for the use of said town of Rangeley.

This ordinance shall not take effect until the same has been published at least one week in some newspaper printed in Franklin county and posted at least one week in two public and conspicuous places in said town of Rangeley.

A return of such publishing and posting, as aforesaid, shall be made by the selectmen, and recorded in the office of the town clerk.

Ordinance No. 4. For the prevention of dumping of waste into Haley Pond and stream leading therefrom.

Be it enacted by the legal voters of the town of Rangeley at

the annual town meeting held in said town on the fourth day of March, A. D. 1918,

That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to dump waste of any kind onto the ice or into the water of Haley Pond and the stream leading from Haley Pond to Rangeley Lake; and any person found guilty of a violation of this ordinance shall be liable to a fine not exceeding ten dollars, to be recovered by complaint, for the use of said town of Rangeley.

This ordinance shall not take effect until the same has been published at least one week in some newspaper printed in Franklin county and posted at least one week in two public and conspicuous places in said town of Rangeley.

A return of such publishing and posting, as aforesaid, shall be made by the selectmen and recorded in the office of the town clerk.

ARTICLE 30

To see if the town will vote to elect one or more fire wards, as required by chapter 108 of the Public Laws of 1913, and to take any action relative to the same that the town may vote.

ARTICLE 31

To see if the town will vote to maintain a municipal fuel yard, if so, what sum of money will be raised for same and how shall it be expended.

ARTICLE 32

To see if the town will vote to pay W. A. Tibbetts an amount equal to one-half the estimated damage caused him the summer of 1917 by water from the road and culvert flowing down to his pile of coal and washing it wholly or in part away, if so, to proceed to raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 33

To see if the town will vote to secure any additional land to be used for cemetery purposes, and if so, how much money shall be raised to pay for same.

ARTICLE 34

To see if the town will vote to have the streets in Rangeley village sprinkled, and if so, to raise money for same, or take any action relative thereto.

ARTICLE 35

To see if the town will vote to have monuments set at any or all of the angles on Main street, Rangeley village, if so, how many, and proceed to raise money for same.

ARTICLE 36

To see what action the town will take relative to the disposition of school building on the west side of Kennebago road, formerly known as district No. 4.

ARTICLE 37

To see if the town will vote to purchase a service flag, and if so, how much money shall be raised to pay for same.

ARTICLE 38

To see if the town will vote to move the watering-tub from its present position near the church to a more suitable place, if so, to take action relative to selecting a site and raising money for moving same.

ARTICLE 39

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the town hall at 12.30 o'clock in the afternoon on the day of said meeting.

Report of School Department

To the Superintending School Committee of Rangeley:

Gentlemen:— The following is the report of the schools for the fiscal year ending February 1, 1918. It is the second report since the formation of the Rangeley School Union.

In the report of last year the attention of the voters was called to what seemed to be at that time certain definite needs of the Rangeley schools. These needs have not been met. In this report we shall confine our attention to the changes and progress for the year; the financial situation, and the considerations for another year.

At the opening of the fall term we found almost a complete change of teachers in all our schools. Miss Cousins and Mrs. Swicker are the only ones to enter upon a second year of service. Such radical and wholesale changes are not as a rule to be desired. In many instances these changes were due to higher salaries paid in other schools.

Progress in our elementary schools has, for the most part, been very encouraging. We are still using the State Course of Study for our school work. We have been promised a revision of the plan of work. The new course anticipates the completion of the elementary grade work in eight years instead of nine as now in use in Rangeley. If the new State schedule is adopted it will mean a decided readjustment of our work. With this in view it might seem advisable to admit to our High school next September the most advanced children from our present eighth grade.

Our teachers have come to us filled with the enthusiasm of recent Normal school training. There is no room for argument, here or elsewhere, on the question of engaging, as a rule, full Normal women for our schools. Considerable care was exercised last summer in making the selection. The results, on the whole, justify this measure

of caution. We have been disappointed only in those cases where we could not read the "personal equation" of a candidate until she was actually at work in the school.

Our program in music training in the schools has been interrupted. The work was well organized and was going on splendidly and every effort is now being made to obtain the largest measure of results possible. It might be well to be on our guard lest we expect too much from this department for some time to come. The work is new to most of our children, but time ought to crystalize our conclusions that the expenditure for this most desirable form of school activity is justified.

Our High school, under the present management, seems to have taken on a measure of new life in many ways. A wholesome school spirit is manifest; a splendid attempt has been made to direct and control the various school activities confining them to periods of intermission when the loss of regular school work shall not be interfered with.

Sometime last year a Public School Association was formed but there are so many war activities in the community, and so much need for conservation of fuel, together with loss of electric lights, that the organization has not been active during the present year. We are hoping as warm weather approaches the influences of the society may again be felt.

The continuous work of the committee during the year has been broken by the untimely death of one of its members, Hon. Eugene I. Herrick, who has served his community with an unusual degree of public spirit. Mr. Harrison B. Amber was appointed by the school board in accordance with statutory requirement, to complete the time to the annual town meeting in March, 1918.

CONSIDERATIONS FOR 1918

Probably there is no one educational necessity on which so many people express so many vague notions as in the consumption of fuel. Is there any one who can say with absolute certainty that coal will be available for another year? It was by an unusual piece of good fortune that we were able to purchase last year a little more than forty tons of hard coal. And you do not need to be told that the rigor of this Arctic winter has made heavy inroads of coal bunkers everywhere.

From January 16 to February 10, a period of 26 days, we have consumed 3.2 cord feet of wood per day, under one boiler, except on Saturdays and Sundays when no fires were maintained by using wood. Slightly more than 300 pounds of coal were consumed per day under the other boiler for this period of time. From the opening of school in September to the closing time in June is a period of 273 days. Suppose we deduct for a moment the first eight weeks of the fall and the last eight weeks of the spring, also three weeks of vacation time. We then have left a period of 140 days. But this time may be still further decreased because of the light fires carried on Saturdays and Sundays. Let us call it for the purpose of discussion 120 days when it would seem reasonable to suppose that heavy fires would be needed. If wood only is available, then for this period of 120 days, for both boilers, at least 75 cords of wood will be needed. At the present quotations of \$11.00 per cord it totals \$825.00. But there is still left a period of 153 days to be considered, twenty-one days of which are in winter vacation time. If \$275.00 would seem to be a reasonable estimate for the cost of fuel for this period of 153 days then we have the astonishing total of \$1,100.00 for fuel for the large building. Add to this \$150.00 for fuel for the Town Hall and the Oquossoc school. The wood for the Quimby school has already been purchased. If \$300.00 of the above amount should be charged

to the High school we have left an approximate requirement of \$950.00 for common school fuel.
