OQUOSSOC SCHOOLHOUSE

During the past summer this building was moved to a new and higher location. In the old location water would stand under the building.

The basement of this building is now large, dry, and adapted to various uses. It has a box stove and when desired, flush toilets and a furnace can be added. Small manual training projects can be carried on in this basement. It is also suitable for a playroom.

HIGH SCHOOL LABORATORY

Under the old E. R. A. six laboratory tables were constructed but the money gave out before we were able to finish the tables. The tables lack tops, sinks, waste traps and plumbing connections.

Soapstone tops, china sinks and lead traps would make the best job. Such equipment would cost \$350. Owing to the action of acid on the tops some top that

will resist acid is best. If the tops were made of shel-stone or hardwood of course the cost would be less. Changing the water would be extra. Labor would be extra.

Some sort of gas is necessary in the chemical laboratory. Now the pupils use alcohol lamps. Canned gas that comes in tanks (Pyrofax) would fill the bill. I imagine we could get a couple of tanks for \$75. Refills would probably cost \$12.

HIGH SCHOOL LIBRARY

Quite a number of book shelves have been added to the rear of the study hall in the High School building. State regulations require that at least \$50 be spent for reference books annually. In the absence of larger appropriations perhaps some arrangement might be made with the local library to purchase certain books which might be checked out by an assistant in the high school. Books are the working tools of the students. The public library is of great benefit to the students.

FEDERAL NURSERY SCHOOL

It seems to be more established that federal aid for schools shall become a function of our government.

This year we have two full time teachers, a full time cook and a full time nurse. Their salaries are paid by the Government and \$60 per week is thus brought into town and in addition \$17.50 per week is spent for groceries. The head nursery teacher acts as buyer for the Treasury department and is required to give bond. A number of people have told me that they are greatly in favor of the nursery school though at first they were somewhat disinterested. The children in the nursery school receive their noon meal free and they have the benefit of excellent nursing care. If you will take the trouble to talk with

some of the mothers who have large families and little cash they will tell you that the nursery school is a great lift.

KINDERGARTEN

Some of the prominent women in Town have asked me to find out the essential facts necessary to establish a kindergarten. I have gathered the following information:

1. What is the desirable number of children for one kindergarten teacher to have charge of?

In public school systems 20-25 per teacher.

2. Age of entrance to kindergarten?

Four years—five years, more than four—as there is now a distinct curriculum for four-year-olds that is different from that for five-year-olds.

3. Usual hours during which kindergarten is in session.

From 9 A. M. to 11.30 A. M.

4. Rough estimate of cost of equipping a kindergarten room.

You can equip it in a fairly good manner for about \$500.

5. How much per week do kindergarten teachers usually receive in small towns?

Kindergarten teachers should receive the same salary as other elementary or secondary teachers of the same training, experience and ability.

Of course when you talk about desirable things in education you run into the problem of cost and taxes.

An endowment fund of \$50,000 would solve the kindergarten problem very nicely. This might well be given by some friend of education who would thus secure an exemption from his income tax. Greenville, Me., solves its kindergarten problem in this way. It is worth thinking about.

VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

Manual Training

Several interested parents have asked me about the cost of establishing a manual arts course.

\$1,000 would buy the necessary equipment to equip a manual training shop for 15 pupils.

The pay of manual arts teachers runs from \$720 to \$2,750, of which about half would be paid by the State.

Agriculture

The pay of agricultural teachers varies from \$1,000 to \$2,750 and the subsidy is approximately 2/3 of the salary of the teacher.

The necessary equipment for an agricultural department would cost \$500 and it is necessary that some sort of shop building be provided.

\$50,000 would endow a manual training department and this sum might be given by some friend of education or it might be obtained by putting a modest sum at interest for a term of years.

TAXES AND THE SCHOOLS

We have a rather nice balance in the elementary school account this year. This is due to the fact that we were able to get in some overdue tuition from another town. The cost of education per capita for high school pupils the past year has been \$75. The elementary pupil per capita cost has been \$45.60.

It is no great trouble to get money for schools as all the parents want their children to have a good education.

“To the taxpayer who urges the schools to go back to the three R’s, schools have a right to say:

“ ‘When you go back to the wood-burning stove, when you tear out your electric lights and go back to the coal oil lamp, when you rip out your telephone, resurrect your horse and buggy and scrap your automobile, when you

junk your cash register and your adding machine, then we will go back to the three R's and not until then. For one is as absurd and as impossible as the other.' ”—Fred Charles, Chief Editorial Writer of the Buffalo Times.

This year the average of school rates in Maine is .01171 and the average of municipal rates is .05535.

The municipal rate for Rangeley this year is .049 and the school rate is .00896.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintending School Committee:

The registration in the high school for the fall term was 123, ten of whom were tuition pupils. The average attendance was 113.

The number by classes was as follows:

Seniors,	28
Juniors,	25
Sophomores,	24
Freshmen,	42
Post Graduate,	4

There was one change in teachers at the beginning of the year. Miss Margaret Young, a graduate of the University of Maine, was secured to take the place of Miss Dean in the home economics department. Pupils in the course show much interest in the work.

In 1934 and 1935 "Cooperative" tests were given the seniors in Maine high schools, as a means of comparing the work of the various schools. These tests were made out by the University of Maine in cooperation with the State Department of Education. All schools were urged to take the tests but none were required to do so. The results of the tests were reported by grouping the schools according to size. In 1934 Rangeley placed seventh in

its group of forty-three schools. In 1935 they were better than the average and made second place in science in a group of twenty-five schools.

For the school to continue in good standing it will be necessary to complete the installation of the chemistry tables that were built last year through one of the work projects. A supply of gas and gas burners should be provided. For several years only the minimum amount of money has been used for laboratory supplies.

To comply with the standards set by the State, more books and other reading material must be provided for the school library. Courses such as social science cannot be given properly without material from reference books and magazines that are up to date.

Local and county contests in one-act plays and prize speaking have been planned. Prizes are offered for winners in all contests.

The athletic program is much the same as last year. There is approximately one hundred fifty dollars in the treasury of the athletic association but this will be needed before the end of the year when expenses are much more than receipts.

The idea of having a sports program is to make it an important school activity that takes the place of no regular school work but an activity that will benefit all who wish to take part. Some may think that too much time is spent on athletics but records show that those who participate regularly have grades several points higher than those who do not.

The school is fortunate in having so many good supporters and appreciates the interest shown by the attendance at games and the work done to provide a better athletic field.

REPORT OF UNION HEALTH OFFICER

To the Selectmen of Rangeley:

Dear Sirs:

Following is a brief report of my activities in Rangeley during 1935.

There were reported 39 cases of German measles, seven cases of pneumonia and 97 of whooping cough. 143 visits were made to the above.

90 individuals were vaccinated against small pox, 45 were given toxoid to prevent diphtheria and 31 were tested to find if they had been protected against diphtheria.

12 school inspections were made.

Three water supplies and two food handling establishments were investigated.

Similar work is being carried on in nearly all of the towns and plantations of the county as well as in two towns and plantations adjoining the county and is made possible by the cooperation of the State, under whose supervision all our work is carried on, and the towns and plantations together with temporary financial aid from the Commonwealth Fund.

Communicable diseases do not recognize town lines but by a union of towns it is possible to have centralized a much more complete and prompt report of cases and therefore we are in better position to protect the health of all.

REPORT OF COUNTY NURSE

To the Citizens of the Town of Rangeley:

In February 1935, two days were spent reinspecting children and assisting them to qualify for Seven Point awards.

I hereby submit a report from February 1, 1935 to February 1, 1936. A Child Welfare Clinic was held with the help of Dr. Moulton and Dr. Coburn, twenty-three children being present. Many calls were made on physicians, Red Cross chairman and first selectman to see about needed corrections of defects in children. The nurse assisted at the tonsil and adenoid operation of four children found defective.

Home visits were made regarding dental corrections and arrangements made with Dr. Penny for the corrections.

Routine school inspections were made in the fall and a teachers meeting attended to discuss the corrections needed.

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the purchase of text-books for the ensuing year for schools.

Article 10

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Home Economics for schools for the ensuing year.

Article 11

To see if the town will vote to raise \$300 for completion of the Laboratory Tables at the New High School.

Article 12

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repairs to school buildings for the ensuing year.

Article 13

To see if the town will vote to raise \$200 for repairs of basement ceiling in the Elementary School.

Article 14

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for transportation of High School scholars.

Article 15

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for insurance on school buildings.

Article 16

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to continue the service of the Cooperative Health Union, health officer.

Article 17

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the services of a County Nurse.

Article 18

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Welfare Account for the support of the poor, for the ensuing year and to cover deficit for 1935, and how same shall be expended.

Article 19

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Mothers' Aid for the ensuing year.

Article 20

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Library Association for the ensuing year.

Article 21

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the improved sections of Third Class Highways for the ensuing year.

Article 22

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for cutting bushes on State, State Aid, Third Class and Town Highways for the ensuing year.

Article 23

To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Article 24

To see what sum of money the town will appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 173, Public Laws of 1935.

Article 25

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for patrol and maintenance for the ensuing year.

Article 26

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for breaking winter roads for the ensuing year.

Article 27

To see if the town will vote to designate a portion of the summer road money to be used for improving the Indian Rock road, so called, with tar or gravel or both.

Article 28

To see if the town will vote to designate a portion of the summer road money to be used for improving the Oquossoc Streets with tar or gravel or both.

Article 29

To see if the town will vote to designate a portion of the summer road money to be used for improving the Bonney Point road with tar or gravel or both.

Article 30

To see if the town will vote to designate a portion of the summer road money to be used for improving Cottage Avenue with tar or gravel or both.

Article 31

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair and maintenance of highways for the ensuing year.

Article 32

To see if the town will vote to continue the price of \$6.50 per hour for the use of the tractor and plow whenever it is used outside the town of Rangeley.

Article 33

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the Rangeley Fire Department.

Article 34

To see if the town will vote to purchase fire equipment and, if so, to raise the money for the same.

Article 35

To see if the town will vote to install a hydrant near the residence of Virgil Lamb.

Article 36

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair and extension of sidewalks for the ensuing year.

Article 37

To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money to pay balance of citizen's note.

Article 38

To see if the town will vote to employ a night watch, uniformed, during the period of June 15th to September 15th, and, if so, to raise money to pay for the same.

Article 39

To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 to pay the Town Bond which falls due July 1, 1936.

Article 40

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on town bonds, temporary loans and outstanding notes for the ensuing year.

Article 41

To see if the town will vote to pay a discount on taxes and, if so, how much, and how much money will be raised to pay discount, also to see if the town will vote to collect interest on unpaid taxes after October 1, 1936.

Article 42

To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay the Rangeley Water Company for the use of water and hydrants for the ensuing year.

Article 43

To see how much money the town will vote to pay the Oquossoc Light and Power Company for road and bridge lights, also for municipal purposes for the ensuing year.

Article 44

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 45

To see how much money the town will vote to raise to pay Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 46

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for advertising the Rangeley Lakes Region for the season of 1936, said sum to be expended by the Rangeley Lakes Publicity Association.

Article 47

To see if the town will vote to raise, not exceeding \$500, for the transportation and distribution of fish in the Rangeley Lakes Region, under the supervision of the Rangeley Lakes Region Guides' Association.

Article 48

To see if the town will vote to raise \$200 for advertising the Rangeley Lakes Region, as a fishing and hunting resort, said sum to be expended under the supervision of the Rangeley Lakes Region Guides' Association.

Article 49

To see if the town will vote to raise money for the installation and, or maintenance of, public toilets in Rangeley Village.

Article 50

To see if the town will vote to provide new voting booths for elections at the fire house and, if so, to raise money for the same.

Article 51

To see if the town will vote to provide blanket insurance for members of the fire department and, if so, to raise money for same.

Article 52

To see if the town will vote to pay the hospital and doctor's bills of William Boulter, resulting from an accident which occurred at Whip Willow Farm fire, and to raise money for same.

Article 53

To see if the town will vote to pay the bill of George Webber for services at the Oquossoc Light and Power Company Hearings.

Article 54

To see if the town will adopt the following resolution: Viz, "Whereas the budget for the Town of Rangeley makes the tax levied a source of complaint for many residents as well as the non-resident tax payers, and whereas it is essential that every precaution be taken to keep the expenditures down to the lowest possible level and whereas the responsibility for the amount of money spent does and rightly should be upon the whole body of citizens; Therefore be it

"Resolved, That every town has and should have the right to decide for itself in a legal assembly as to what course of action it will take concerning every matter of importance, and therefore all matters of business in which the town is involved financially or morally should be presented to the voters for their approval before any definite action is taken: Also that the execution of such decisions should be carried out by Town Officials or such Committees as the town may appoint.

"Be it further resolved, That any method of attaining desired results by self-appointed Town Officials is uneth-

ical, deprives the town of its right to determine for itself how and for what purpose money be spent, and should be discouraged in every possible way.”

Article 55

To see if the town will vote to install a street light on Cross Street between the residence of Abram Ross and Kennebago Road and, if so, to raise money for same.

Article 56

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay on town notes.

Article 57

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for W. P. A. projects.

Article 58

To see if the town will vote to transfer to the miscellaneous account, in order to close them out, the following overdrafts:

Wood Account, \$195.44; Lake Shore Road Account, \$64.09; Cross Street Road Account, \$24.03; Third Class Road, \$12.42; Total, \$295.98, and the following balances:

Bonney Point Road, \$18.87; Pleasant Street Account, \$2.73; Guide Boards Account, \$16.56; Total, \$38.16.

Article 59

To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for further improvements at the Oquossoc Schoolhouse.

Article 60

To see if the town will vote to have Daylight Saving Time.

Article 61

To see what action, if any, the town will take in regard to discontinuing the Grammar School (Upper Grades) at Oquossoc and transporting the pupils to Rangeley.

Article 62

Inasmuch as there appears to be conflicting opinions as to what the water rental is or should be due the Rangeley Water Company, and also as to what constitutes a reasonable rate for the water used and inasmuch as there seems to be some confusion caused by the merging of the two contracts originally made by the town and Rangeley village corporation in 1925, to see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen of the town to take such steps as are necessary to have such rate for hydrant rental and all water used for municipal purposes established and approved by the Public Utilities Commission of Maine.

Article 63

To see if the town will authorize the assessors of the town for the ensuing year to obtain competent authority and engineer if necessary, to assist them in arriving at a fair and equitable valuation for purposes of assessment of taxes on property of Oquossoc Light and Power Company and of the Rangeley Water Company.

Article 64

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at Oakes and Badger's Hall, at 8.30 o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.
