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

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rangeley:

In accordance with your request, this department, represented by Mr. E. H. Shute, has completed an examination of the accounts of your town officials for the municipal year ended February 3, 1940.

Our report, herewith submitted, was prepared from your town records and, to the best of our knowledge and belief, properly reflects the true financial condition of your municipality as of the above date.

COMMENTS

TREASURER:

All receipts and expenditures were examined.

The cash balance was reconciled with the bank and the amount of \$1,658.12, as shown on Exhibit B, was apparently correct and on hand as of February 3, 1940.

All trust funds were examined and listed. These funds are all deposited in the Rangeley Trust Company.

TAX COLLECTOR:

The tax commitment was compared with the records of the Assessors and found to agree.

All receipts from the Treasurer and abatements were checked.

The balance of uncollected taxes, as published in the town report, appeared to be correct.

The excise tax account was checked and an amount of \$19.70, through error, had not been turned in. This amount will be paid the Treasurer.

GENERAL:

The records as kept by the Selectmen appeared to be in very good condition.

All appropriation balances are carried forward each year and taken into consideration in making the new appropriations.

It appears that the special loan of \$1,000 for school purposes was credited to the school account by the superintendent, but we did not credit this item as it would appear better practice for the voters to appropriate the amount necessary for schools.

It would appear that this loan was unnecessary, as without the credit, the total overdraft on schools was only \$198.64 at the end of the year, or an amount of \$2,926.21 expended during the year over the amount appropriated. The total expenditures included an unexpended balance of \$2,727.57 at the start of the year.

As the superintendent of schools was away at the time of the audit, we could not contact him, but the adjustment, if properly authorized, can be made at the time of the next audit.

With the exception of cash and trust funds, no direct verification was made of assets and liabilities.





REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Musical instruction in the Rangeley Schools is being given along the same lines as last year. There is an increase in the number of pupils availing themselves of the opportunity to play and sing in groups. Two piano classes are an innovation this year.

If there were more instruments available they could be put to use, as there are many pupils interested in music, but unable to purchase instruments.

The High School Glee Club presented a minstrel show on January 20, and plans are under way for a spring concert in conjunction with the orchestra.

Total number of instrumental pupils, 42.

Number of pupils in High School Glee Club, 30.

This year there are 12 boys from the seventh and 12 boys from the eighth grade taking shopwork. From the four High School classes, there are 21 students taking shopwork.

Taking our cue from the more progressive shops of the country, we are endeavoring to branch out from woodwork and give instruction in other lines such as sheet metal work, metal turning and spinning, photography, and electricity. During the past few weeks the teacher and advanced High School class have built a darkroom for photography and blueprinting in one corner of the machine room. Visitors are welcome. A few of the boys come in to work after school.

Now the country is being organized for DEFENSE, there is a vast increase in the number of vocational shops.

The enrollment of the Home Economics department for this year is 49 girls. Again, two-thirds of these are in the Junior High Division. In addition to their class work, the Junior-Senior group did some sewing for the Red Cross. Noon lunches which consist of one hot dish are being served during the winter term to approximately 95 students for 7 cents per week. Federal Surplus food like canned milk and oranges are also available in quantity free.

Repairs

The Boiler Inspector of the Travelers' Insurance Co. has made the following recommendations in regard to the High School Boiler:

1. The boiler should be given even support under it, in order to reduce the possibility of cracking, due to strains which are believed to be caused by uneven support.

This boiler could be raised enough to allow a cast iron base, furnished by the manufacturers, to be installed. This base would support the sections evenly.

2. The feed line which enters the rear section should be relocated to enter the return line a few feet from the boiler.

The Play space back of the High School has been leveled off. However, the two tennis courts have not been completed. These should be completed this spring and a good rock foundation installed. This will provide for drainage and play could start the first of April.

The gymnasium floor has been surfaced and looks fine. Now why not get after all the other floors in the two buildings. Not much of anything has been done on them for years.

An allowance of one per cent for repairs would be \$900. Any school system that does not allow one per cent for repairs should watch out.

The elementary school is an old building, 28 years old, and could stand a lot of modernization.

Finance

This year the average of School rates in the State is .013, while the average of municipal rates is .058. We see that Rangeley, with a School rate of .008 and a municipal rate of .043, is below the State average. The STATE BEING SHORT of money for schools, our State allotment this year was \$229.50 less than last year. If the Legislature does not do something for education pretty soon, the State School Fund will not be of much help. The income of the State School Fund shrunk \$495,000 in the last eight years. Demands upon the State School Fund have increased. Citizens should discuss the matter frankly with their representatives to the Legislature. The School Fund should be restored.

I wish to thank the School Board, Town Officials, parents and others who have worked for the education of the children.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools and Citizens of Rangeley:

The number registered in High School this year is 104 and the average attendance for the first term was 97.06. By classes there are 14 seniors, 27 juniors, 29 sophomores, 33 freshmen and 1 post-graduate.

We have had no teacher changes and but one change in the curricula. Business arithmetic replaces business training in the commercial course.

A comparatively new subject, called guidance, is being stressed by educators. In some schools it is made a full course but in many it is

given in connection with other subjects. We use the latter method. Slides and motion pictures are considered very useful in teaching guidance.

The extra-curricula activities, such as dramatics, speaking, music and athletics, are being carried on much as last year. The N. F. C. I. prize speaking will take place at Strong on March 13. The rule requiring boys to deliver orations and the girls to have humorous selections, has been removed. Selections of the grewsome type are not to be used but no other new rules have been made.

The athletic association was helped considerably last year by shares of tournament receipts of \$70.72 and \$69.50 from Farmington and Lewiston, respectively.

To the Selectmen of Rangeley:

DEAR SIRS:

Following is a brief report of the work done by the Union during 1940.

There were reported from Rangeley 45 cases of chickenpox, 156 cases of measles, 18 of pneumonia, three of scarlet fever, and 23 of whooping cough.

479 visits were made to the above and it is safe to say Rangeley will not have another outbreak of measles before 1944 or 1945 though probably there will be a few scattering cases before that time.

21 school visits were made and 242 pupils were inspected. 13 visits were made to inspect plumbing.

Town officials were called upon 30 times.

With the nurse 71 were vaccinated against smallpox, 78 were given toxoid to protect against diphtheria, 415 were Dick tested to find if they were susceptible to scarlet fever and 115 were tuberculin tested.

One individual attended the chest clinic held monthly at the Franklin County Memorial Hospital by Dr. C. D. Cromwell, Superintendent of the Central Maine Sanatorium.

Our engineer made 62 visits for plumbing inspections and eight visits for various sanitary conditions.

We regret that it will be impossible for us to serve as local health officer and as plumbing inspector after this town year is completed, but the addition of Androscoggin and Oxford counties to our territory makes this impossible, but we will both be available for consultation or emergencies. You still have one trained public health worker—the nurse—and we hope there will be a concerted move by the North Franklin towns and plantations to make sure that she is retained.

Our work in Rangeley the past several years has been made pleasant by the town officials and citizens alike for all have been most cooperative.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1940

To the Citizens of the Town of Rangeley:

I submit the report of the North Franklin County Nursing Service from January 1, 1940 to December 31, 1940.

A generalized program consists of Prenatal Visits, Infant Visits, Preschool Visits, School Visits, Home Visits, Morbidity Visits, Tuberculosis Visits, Home Visits to Crippled Children, Clinics attended for Crippled Children, School Child Inspections, Making appointments and selecting children for dental clinics, Group Education, and High School student Health Conferences.

Early in 1940 assistance was given the local doctor in throat inspections. Upon request of the teachers, a few eye and ear tests were made. Reports were sent parents when conditions were found abnormal. A conference was held with the faculty and plans formulated to follow-up children with defects, many homes of defective children were visited, the defects explained and parents urged to visit their family doctor, dentist, or oculist.

An acquaintance visit was made to the dentist and the dental problem was discussed with him. He specified he would like to make individual appointments with the children, rather than group, and this suggestion was passed on to the teachers.

As a result of a Scarlet Fever case early in the year, the nurse assisted the District Health Officer in administering 222 Dick tests. In the Fall another case developed and the same procedure was carried out. The Nurse assisted the District Health Officer in throat inspections and immunizations. The Nurse completed the Fall inspection of school children. Records and reports to parents will be completed and report sent.

Visits were made to the homes of children with defects to explain them and to urge them to visit their doctor, dentist, or oculist. One visit was made to the home of a sick child and a report made to the doctor. Visits were made to homes to discuss three crippled children. Eighty-nine visits in all have been made to homes and schools.

Attention is again called to generalized service offered. It is the tendency to ask for school service and forget that we prevent the defects which we find in the school child if we use the service for the prenatal patient, infant, and preschool child. This service is always available.

Following a conference with the local doctor several homes of Infants, and Preschool children were visited. The nurse and parent discussed child guidance, diet, Cod Liver Oil, fresh air, sunshine, rest, and protections against certain diseases.

The following schools received Seven Point awards: In the Village school 26 children qualified for the award and grades 4-8 received a 50% Dental Certificate; in the Elementary School 42 children received the award and grades 2-5 received a 50% Dental Certificate; in the Rangeley Town school 13 children received the award and grade 3 received a 50% Dental Certificate, 7 children in the Junior High school qualified for the Pin and Certificate.

The Early Diagnosis Campaign, a National Health Educational Service, was made available to our town. The High School was offered slogan material for the Contest and health pamphlets and posters were used. Bottle caps were available for use to milk dealers thus bringing the message of preventing tuberculosis into every home.

To the Citizens of Rangeley who make this service possible the Nurse is grateful.

Town Warrant

To E. C. Hinkley, a Constable in the Town of Rangeley, in the County of Franklin:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Rangeley, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Lodge Hall in said Town, on Monday, the tenth day of March, A. D. 1941, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

ARTICLE 1

To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2

To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3

To hear and act on the reports of town officers.

ARTICLE 4

To choose all other officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes, for the purpose of paying obligations of the Town; such loan or loans to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.

ARTICLE 6

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Education, as follows: High School, Common School, Supplies, Home Economics, Text-books, Repairs and Transportation.

ARTICLE 7

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Services of the County Nurse.

To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Charity, as follows: Town Poor, Aid to Dependent Children.

ARTICLE 9

To see what sum of money the Town will raise for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

ARTICLE 10

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Highways, as follows: Construction and Maintenance Town Ways, Cutting Bushes, Patrolling State and State Aid Highways, Third Class Maintenance and Winter Roads.

ARTICLE 11

To see if the Town will vote to accept the road as laid by the Selectmen, a copy of which is filed with the Town Clerk, beginning at the end of the present town way on Bonney Point, so-called, and ending at the entrance driveway to the summer home of A. W. Dannenbaum, also a branch of said way known as Lake drive, beginning at a point on said way and extending to the entrance to the Crawford Place, so-called.

ARTICLE 12

To see if the Town will vote to accept a town way for the laying and maintaining of a drainage culvert, beginning at the south side of Main Street and continuing to the shore of Rangeley Lake over the land of Leon Libby, a copy of which is filed with the Town Clerk.

ARTICLE 13

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Protection of persons and property, as follows: Fire Department, Street Lighting and Hydrant Rental.

ARTICLE 14

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Interest for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 15

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to redeem Bonds and Notes for the ensuing year.

To see if the Town will vote to set the salary of the following Town Officers, and to raise money for the same: Selectmen, Overseers and Assessors, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Other Town Officers, Supt. of Schools, Supt. School Committee and Night Police.

ARTICLE 17

To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for Unclassified Accounts, as follows: Abatements, Cemetery, Public Library and Municipal Insurance.

ARTICLE 18

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Advertising the Rangeley Lakes Region for the season of 1941, and how the same shall be expended, as provided by Chapter 5, Section 82, Revised Statutes of 1930.

ARTICLE 19

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the propagation and protection of fish in the Rangeley Lake Region under the supervision of the Rangeley Lake Guides Association, as provided by Chapter 5, Section 86 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

ARTICLE 20

To see what rate of discount the Town will vote to allow on taxes, and also raise and appropriate the money for same.

ARTICLE 21

To see if the Town will vote to set the date when Taxes will be due and payable and what rate of interest, if any, will be charged on unpaid taxes and the date after which said interest shall be charged.

ARTICLE 22

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of all tax titles acquired, or that may be acquired, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds for same. The property now held is as follows: Dellarma place, Hebert lot, Charles Ellingwood place, Val Robinson place of Oquossoc, and the Kenneth Spencer house in Rangeley Village.

ARTICLE 23

To see if the Town will vote to maintain an Information Bureau and if so, to raise and appropriate money for the same.

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Airport.

ARTICLE 25

To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to let a portion of the Town Office to Western Union for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 26

To see if the Town will vote to sell the Oquossoc School House and lot, or make any other provision for said property.

ARTICLE 27

To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100.00 more or less, for the observance of Memorial Day, to be expended by the American Legion, Rangeley Lakes Post No. 120.

ARTICLE 28

To see what action the Town will take regarding a suit filed by Cliff Hill for damage caused by screen at outlet of Rangeley Lake.

ARTICLE 29

To see if the Town will vote to raise \$121.41 more or less, for supplies furnished the E. R. A. job at the school house in 1935 and subsequent dates.

ARTICLE 30

To see if the Town will vote to build a new sidewalk on Pleasant Street between High Street and Dead River Road and, if so, to raise money for same.

ARTICLE 31

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repair of sidewalks, including the foot bridge at the lower end of Lake Street.

ARTICLE 32

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for a heating plant at the Town Office.

ARTICLE 33

To see if the Town will vote to have a hydrant installed near Patterson's Hillside Cottages.

To see what sum the Town will vote to raise for Guide Boards.

ARTICLE 35

To see if the Town will vote to have a night watchman on Richardson Street during smelting time, and if so, provide money to pay for same.

ARTICLE 36

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Miscellaneous Account.

ARTICLE 37

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for surveying Town Lines.

ARTICLE 38

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for removing snow from the sides of the streets where parking conditions require it.

ARTICLE 39

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to lease a location for a public dump and arrange for developing the same and to raise money for the same.

ARTICLE 40

To see if the Town will vote to trade the present school bus towards a new one, and if so, to raise and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 41

To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the improvement of the Upper Dallas Road, so-called, between the State Highway to the Rangeley-Dallas town line.
