COMMENTS

CASH

All receipts as recorded were examined and found to have been deposited in the bank currently as summarized on Exhibit B.

Expenditures were made by check from properly authorized warrants, supported by invoices and payrolls on file, as summarized on Exhibits B and D.

The cash balance was reconciled with the bank as per detail shown on Schedule 1.

TAXES - PROPERTY AND POLL

The 1942 tax commitment was found to be in agreement with the Assessors' records. The balance due on this commitment is supported by a list of unpaid taxes taken from the records of the Tax Collector as summarized on Schedule 2.

The unpaid prior years' taxes are also summarized on Schedule 2.

Payments received on tax liens appeared to have been applied against the proper items and those still remaining unpaid are summarized on Schedule 3.

EXCISE TAX

The excise tax was verified with the triplicate copies of receipts as follows:

TRUST FUNDS

The trust fund investments were examined and are shown on Schedule 6. All income withdrawn appeared to have been properly expended and the balance was left on deposit.

GENERAL

A test check was made of paid invoices and payrolls and as far as our examination went, they appeared to be proper charges and correctly recorded.

The records of dog licenses issued by your Town Clerk indicate collection in the sum of \$174.30, which amount was paid to the State Treasurer.

We again recommend that proper appropriations be made at your annual town meeting and all balances, except those necessarily carried forward by statute, be lapsed to Net Surplus or Net Deficit at the end of each year.

It is quite apparent that insufficient appropriations are being voted each year and that a careful study should be made so that a proper budget can be prepared and voted on at your next town meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

FINANCE

This year the average of School rates in the State is .014 and the average municipal rate is .057.

Again Rangeley Plantation, Salem, Coplin, Temple and Sandy River are the only towns in the County who have a Lower School Tax rate than Rangeley. In Wilton the Tax for Schools is almost double the Rangeley School Rate. Farmington and Phillips have a much higher rate.

In 1930 \$23,481.65 was raised for Schools. In 1942 \$18,493.10 was appropriated. In 1943 \$17,580.70 was appropriated for Schools.

All this in a period when wages of factory workers, pulp operators are at the highest point in History.

A good welder can earn \$100 a week and even a low paid pulp workman gets at least \$50 a week.

Money has been coming into Town steadily for shipyard wages and War Pulp products and lumber. The lumber operators can perhaps solve their Labor problem with War Prisoners etc. However no one would advocate using War Prisoners for Teachers I hope.

Many articles ordinarily used in the Schools are now not available for Schools.

The Electric stoves are many years old and should be replaced when available. The sewing machines have been subjected to years of usage by different students and War organizations. The typewriters should also be replaced when available. \$1,000 is needed for new equipment as soon as the material is available.

The State Legislature made available to Rangeley \$1,204.03 more this year than last year. This is for the purpose of raising teachers salaries to a higher level. It would seem unfair to me to take this money to still further reduce the Town Debt or lower the Tax rate.

When milk begins to be shipped outside the State they raise the rate per quart a half cent at different times. It's the same thing with teachers when they go out the state they raise the wages to try and keep them.

Of course you can go without milk if you want to and you can go without teachers if you want to. However, most people prefer to eat and most people want their children educated. For many years I have advocated a decent wage for Teachers and I think we have had excellent teachers of professional ability and character. If the years of excellent Schools and good teachers have made their impression on the public I am glad.

However, if the parents wish to do without teachers and teach the children in their homes I don't know what I can do about it.

In general I think we have had good support for Schools. People know they can't take their money "when they go" and some people if they don't have children of their own adopt some.

A year or so ago we had a surplus on our Coal pile. This year coal is more difficult to obtain and we do not have that surplus or hardly our normal requirements. Next year a more than normal amount of coal will be necessary.

Any amount spent for local taxes can be deducted from the Federal Income Tax.

REPAIRS

The front section of the boiler at the High School sprung a leak. The back section leaks a little. The Board thought it better to be on the safe side and ordered a front and rear section. These have been received and are ready if the boiler becomes unusable.

Various minor repairs have been made.

Outside of the basketball the children do not have many winter activities. The Street Electric lighting system should be extended back of the High School. A couple of poles at either end of the skating rink would do the trick. For various reasons including load and meter expense this extension should not be added to the lights inside the building.

Some painting needs to be done when men and material are again available.

The Boiler Inspector has again recommended "The feed line which enters the rear section of the H. S. boiler relocated to enter the return line a few feet from the boiler".

The concrete surface of the High School Gym looks rather shabby. However I don't know just what can be done about it as the surface is irregular.

EDUCATION AND THE WAR

Townspeople will notice the Honor Roll of Rangeley High School Students in the Armed forces. Mr. Ralph Norton, the Industrial Instructor, is now serving in the Armed forces. Due to the shortage of teachers the School shop is now closed. According to National Law Mr. Norton is entitled to his job on his discharge from the Service. The shop will be kept open if a properly qualified substitute is obtained. We may hope some discharged Service man may be secured as substitute in the shop. Some Gorham man may perhaps be secured.

Mrs. Alta Kempton resigned her position as Music Instructor to be near her husband in the Service. Due to the critical shortage of teachers it has not been possible to fill her position. The position will be filled as soon as a properly qualified person can be found.

Owing to a reduction in the Town appropriation last year and the number of scholars the School Board eliminated temporarily two teachers in the Grade School. Just now we are working with a reduced staff of four teachers, two regular teachers and two special teachers.

We have 43 pupils taking work in the Home Economics Department. Miss Rita Churchill, the Home Economics teacher, left her position which paid \$1,300 to accept a position at Bridgton Academy which paid \$1,800. Substitutes from the Normal School are now carrying on the teaching.

The Government helps out with the School Lunch and contributes four cents a meal toward the cost of the lunch. About 50 are enjoying the Hot Lunch every day.

Teachers have been asked to help with almost every branch of the War Effort. Rationing, War Saving Stamps, Salvage and many other lines of War Effort have been engaged in by the teachers without any compensation whatever.

200,000 teachers have left their positions since Pearl Harbor. Students in the Normal Schools and Colleges have dropped 60 per cent below 1940. Only 25 students graduate from the General Course at Farmington this next June.

INFLATION has occurred. Living costs have risen. Flour is now worth \$12 to \$14 per barrel. Good shoes \$9 or \$10⁻a pair. A good wool blanket is now worth \$15.

Parents should make an effort to retain their present teachers. New ones are not readily available. There are still some schools in the state that have been closed since last September for want of teachers.

A word to the wise is sufficient.

EDUCATION AND THE WAR

Rangeley High School now has 63 Graduates in the armed forces. There are also 49 students in the armed forces who have been in partial attendance at Rangeley High School. The grand total is 112.

A suitable Honor Roll will be erected in Rangeley High School. The students have participated in the various Salvage drives and have purchased War Bonds and War Savings Stamps.

Men in the Service like to get mail from home and this is as it should be. I hope the Service men get a lot of mail from home.

Letters I have received from Service men state they appreciate what education they received in Rangeley High School and whatever happens that could not be taken away from them.

It's the "Home Town youngsters" who have the active part in this War and are doing the fighting.

After home it's the High School the boys strike out for when on leave.

EDUCATION AND THE WEATHER

When we have a severe storm or an extreme spell of cold weather someone will call up and say "Any School today?"

To get our State Money we are required to keep 180 days of High School.

We began High School a week late last fall to accommodate the hotel people. We lost School by two severe storms. Therefore the time has to be made up and if we lose too much time it's late into the summer.

The Schools will run to accommodate those who live near the School and to get our State Aid. When the weather is too bad for little children the parents should exercise their judgment and keep the children at home. The same is true for High School children who live far away.

Children coming down with Flu or severe colds should stay at home to avoid exposing others.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF HIGH SCHOOL

To the Citizens of Rangeley:

Fifty-two girls and twenty-eight boys were enrolled in High School during the fall term and were classified as follows: nineteen seniors, eighteen juniors, twenty-one sophomores, and twenty-two freshmen. The average attendance for the term was seventy-one.

Providing teachers for the year has been a problem. Miss Sadie Corey, a graduate of Nasson College, replaced Miss Mitchell as teacher of commercial subjects. Miss Churchill, teacher of home economics, resigned in October and Miss Louise Bryant substituted in the department for several weeks. Miss Elizabeth Purkis has been engaged to fill the position for the remainder of the year. The manual training department has been closed because no instructor was available.

The school curricula has been changed but little this year. Radio code is given as a pre-induction course for boys of the senior and junior classes. In addition to this, some senior boys have been taking solid geometry and trigonometry.

Physical education, as requested by the State Department, is required of all boys and girls who can pass a doctor's examination. Prescribed exercises would help some, who have poor posture or certain other physical defects, if done regularly at home.

For athletics, we had baseball for a time in the Fall and will have the regular schedule in the Spring. Since the basketball season is long this sport is stressed more than any other. Receipts from basketball games have to support all athletics.

The Army-Navy Qualifying Tests for the A-12 and V-12 Specialized Training Program will be given at the High School on March 15. Boys of the senior class and graduates between the ages of 17 and 20 are eligible to take the tests. Those selected will be given special training at colleges and universities, at government expense, to provide technicians and specialists for the Army and Navy.
