

BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT.

Gentlemen:

The Board of Health respectfully submits its report of transactions for the past year.

Of the numerous petitions presented to the Board we have taken action upon six.

Only four cases of typhoid fever have been reported by the physicians, and in each case the necessary precautions were taken by order of the attending physician, and confined to the patient first taken.

The Board has been of no use in quite a large number of cases from the fact that there is no system of sewerage, without which it is impossible to remove some nuisances which exist in a mild form.

Owing to the general use of the water system the ground has to absorb a large amount of water from sinks and water closets, which will in a short time, in the opinion of the board, make the more thickly settled portion of the village very unhealthy, and unless something is done in the way of sewerage the Board will be obliged, in order to protect human life, to compel the construction of drains to carry off the waste water previously mentioned.

We again strongly recommend and urge that the town take action for the building of some sewers, especially on Main and Front streets.

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SCHOOL REPORT.

Whereas, the annual report of our town has grown to be quite a pamphlet, containing last year sixty-four pages, twenty-four pages of which were covered by the school report, and there has been from year to year an amount of matter printed in the school report that avails nothing toward benefiting our schools, and in reality is only an attempt to please rather than exhibit plain facts; therefore, several of our citizens having the good of our school system at heart, have importuned your Supervisor to make up a report less bulky and still show essentials. This is our apology for coming before you with a report somewhat different from the usual form.

Our schools, as a whole, have during the past year been fairly prosperous. In no case has there been an entire failure. Parents, teachers and pupils have, in a majority of the schools, co-operated to make the school work what it should be. Without this co-operation we cannot have full success. We would impress upon the minds of parents the importance of frequently visiting the schools where their children are, and learning by personal investigation what kind of work is being done, and by their presence and encouraging words stimulate the pupils to greater efforts, and thus become a great help to the teacher. Too many times parents put too much dependence in what is said outside of the school-room, and very often judgment is rendered contrary to what would have been if all the circ instances were known.

In general, the district agents have during the past year signified a desire to co-operate with the Supervisor in the matter of hiring teachers, and hire only those who were fully qualified and who has experience which would warrant a profitable school. There is a tendency to pay better wages, which means better schools. We have gone on too long putting those who were not qualified to teach into our schools, simply because we could hire them for a small salary, or because they needed the money. There are but few employers who will hire workmen who are incapable, simply because they are in need of the wages. Should we hire and put into our schools to teach our children, to mould their young minds, those who will teach them incorrectly through ignorance? We say nay. And we think there is a moral wrong committed by a Supervisor who puts his name to a certificate stating he has examined and found such a person qualified to teach, when he knows the party is not qualified. Let us have teachers who are qualified and successful in the work, and then be willing to pay such wages that they can afford to teach.

The smaller schools have received the past year more money than has been their custom, and have had longer schools, beside paying to better salaries.

The text books were found to be in very poor condition. Many were entirely unfit for school use, therefore, exchanges were made in Readers, Spellers, Arithmetics, Geographies, and a part of the Elementary Grammars, that part which were in poor condition. Other text books are so much worn that they must soon give place to new ones, either by buying new or exchanging.

In District No. 7 there was no one to attend school, therefore no money was apportioned to the district.

As it would be much more convenient for Clarence Black to send his children to No. 11 school than to No. 5, I would recommend that he be set off from district No. 5 and annexed to No. 11.
