

DISTRICT No. 1. GEORGE H. THEOBALD, AGENT.
Whole number of pupils in District, 558.

HIGH SCHOOL.

Seping Term. Mr. Stanley H. Holmes and Mr. Harry L. Jewett, both of Augusta, Principals. Salary of former \$100 per month, of latter, \$95 for Spring and Fall terms, Winter term \$100. Miss Mary Bickmore of Waterville, Assistant. Salary, per week \$10. Whole number of pupils, 33; average 30. Term, 10 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teachers. Whole number of pupils, 37; average, 34. Term 13 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teachers. In progress.

At the close of the first week of the Spring term, Mr. Holmes who had had charge of the school for the two years last past, resigned the principalship for a more lucrative one, and Mr. Harry L. Jewett, a graduate of Colby University, Class of — and a teacher of experience, was engaged to fill the vacancy. Mr. Jewett entered upon the discharge of the duties of his position the following Monday, and since then the school has been under his direction. During this time Miss Bickmore as assistant has rendered valuable aid. In short, under their judicious and harmonious direction, your High School

has well maintained its former good reputation and thus continues to rank with the best, both with its English and Classical studies. Hence it may still be regarded as justly claiming the interest and pride of the citizens of the town whose children are alike entitled to the superior advantages which it affords. At the close of the Spring term a class of eight graduated, with much credit to themselves and hono. to the school, as follows: Misses Lucy Florence Hagar, Nellie Caro Thomas, Classical Course: Florence Annie Flagg, Alice Ionia Voter, Myra Foster Hopkins, Nellie May Ames and Messrs Perley Fay and David Costellow Ames, Jr., English Course.

FIRST GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

Spring Term. Miss Etta S. Jack, Richmond, Teacher. Whole number of pupils, 36; average, 38-8. Term 12 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Whole number of pupils, 50; average, 45-4. Term 13 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. In progress.

For the sixth consecutive year the 1st. Grammar school has continued under the charge of Miss Jack. As her success and ability have again and again been noticed in former, reports, suffice it to say, that during the entire year, she has manifested all the interest of former years, in the welfare of her school, and by the aid of her increased experience and practical knowledge of how to obtain the best and most desirable work out of a limited time, has been able to advance her pupils in a more thorough and satisfactory manner than during a like period heretofore.

SECOND GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

Spring Term. Mrss Mary E. Thurlow, Richmond, teacher. Whole number of pupils. 50; average, 43. Term 12 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Whole number of pupils, 42; average, 39. Term 13 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. In progress.

Miss Thurlow is a trained and thorough teacher, being a graduate of Farmington Normal school. She has had several years of successful experience to aid her in her present work. Her work is always done with that zeal and enthusiasm which makes success certain. Hence under her direction and persistent efforts her pupils make uniform and commendable advance.

FIRST CENTRAL INTERMEDIATE.

SPRING TERM. Miss Bertha A. Boynton, Richmond, Teacher. Whole number of pupils, 48; average, 45. Term 12 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Whole number of pupils, 67; average, 62. Term 13 weeks.

WINTER TERM. In progress.

Since she has had charge of this school Miss Boynton has well earned the reputation of being a successful teacher. With rare tact, she succeeds to a marked degree in gaining the confidence and respect of her pupils, and thus is better enabled to command their ready obedience and inspire them with a desire to rank well in their studies. For the first six weeks of the winter term, on account of illness, Miss Boynton was unable to fill he position. During this time the school was taught, for the most part, by Miss Alice Pushard and Miss Julia C. Richards, and thus the necessity of closing or having no school for a time, which might otherwise have arisen, was obviated. Both these young ladies are graduates from the Richmond High School, and this experience of first attempt, will doubtless aid them much in future school work if they should desire to teach. At the beginning of the seventh week Miss Boynton was able to take charge of the school, and it is to be hoped that her work will meet with no further interruption.

SECOND CENTRAL INTERMEDIATE.

Spring Term. Miss Loretta E. Parks, Richmond, teacher. Whole number of pupils, 49; average, 40. Term 12 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Whole number of pupils, 58; average, 50. Term 13 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. In progress.

This school has remained under the charge of Miss Parks, whose long and successful work in the past, through your yearly reports and otherwise, is too well known to need pointing out in detail in order to be appreciatively understood. Her work during the present year has been fully as creditable and successful as hitherto in all respects. Like the spring and fall terms respectively, the winter term is being well taught, and gives abundant evidence of the union of good feeling and co-operative effort that continue to exist between the teacher and her pupils.

PRIMARY SCHOOL.

SPRING TERM. Miss Hattie Jackson, Richmond, teacher. Whole number of pupils, 54; average, 43. Term 12 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Whole number of pupils, 39; average, 31; Term 13 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. In progress.

For more than four years past Miss Jackson has had charge of the primary department of our central village schools. Constantly adding to her past experience only serves to fit her for better work in each succeeding term. It is no easy task to teach a primary school aright. It is acknowledged by those educators who have given the work of primary schools their most careful attention, to be a serious error to suppose that any person is capable of teaching a primary school. On the contrary, these same interested and careful observers are unanimously agreed that only a few persons are truly and really fitted for or adapted to this work; and further, that only the best teachers should be employed to fill these positions, for the training of children during their first five or six years of school life is of the utmost importance.

Two events of the year which were especially due to the energetic and patriotic efforts of the pupils and teachers of the four schools taught in the new school building, are worthy of special mention. The first was a "Flag Raising," which took place Friday, May 1st, 1891. A large number of people were present, and the occasion proved to be one of great interest to all. Remarks were made by the Supervisor and C. D. Newell, Esq., after which the flag was raised aloft amid the hearty cheers of all. Music by a quartette, in which the children joined, military drill by the pupils of the four schools, and lastly, recitations by the children,—there being some three hundred of them present,—added not a little to the interest of the not unimportant ceremony.

The second event was the purchasing of a bell by the papils for the new school building, which was placed in the belfry and now daily calls the pupils of these same schools to their work.

NORTH INTERMEDIATE.

Spring Term. Miss Laura H. Williams, Richmond, Teacher. Whole number of pupils, 32: average, 27. Term 12 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Whole number of pupils, 25; aver age, 22½. Term 13 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. In progress.

This school is both primary and intermediate in its grade. This of course necessitates more work on the part of the teacher in order to secure the proper advance of all. At our visits we found Miss Williams, who is a trained teacher, actively engaged in her work. Her pupils were carefully and correctly taught the rudiments or first principles of an education. This is of the utmost importance in all primary and intermediate schools. Miss Williams is an earnest and faithful teacher.

SOUTH INTERMEDIATE.

Spring Term. Miss Alice G. Ring, Richmond, teacher. Whole number of pupils, 51; average, 44. Term 12 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Whole number of pupils, 43; average, 37. Term 13 weeks.

WINTER TERM. In progress.

The mixed character or grade of this school is too well known to require detailed notice at present time. During the spring and summer terms, and four weeks of the winter, the school was under the charge of Miss Ring, this being her sixth consecutive year in this same position. Owing to sickness, Miss Ring felt it to be her duty to resign her position for the remainder of the term. Fortunately, the agent was able to secure the services of Miss M. Etta Reed. Miss Reed is a graduate of the Farmington Normal school, class of '87, and is already known as a teacher of experience and success. Hence, I need only to add that under her direction the school is progressing in a creditable and satisfactory manner.

DISTRICT No. 2. FRANK RANDALL, AGENT.

Number of pupils in District, 16.

Spring Term. Miss Annie L. Call, Richmond, Teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$4.00 per week. Whole number of pupils, 15; average 13. Term 9 weeks.

FALL TERM. Miss Adele Umberhind, Richmond, Teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$3.75 per week. Whole number of pupils, 14; average, 14. Term 10 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$4.75 yer week. Whole number of pupils, 13; average, 10. Term 7 weeks.

Both Miss Call and Miss Umberhind have made their first attempt at teaching in this school, the former teaching the spring term, and the latter the other terms. Early in the term Miss Call had her school well in hand, and by her aptness to teach gave encouraging promise of success. Like favorable indications were also apparent at a comparatively early time in the fall term, the school being now under the charge of Miss Umberhind. The maintaining of the necess-

sary discipline was perhaps more laborous than teaching. The teachers, however, were not to be discouraged, and each did her best to make her school orderly and industrious. Hence, all the circumstances considered, both were fairly successful.

DISTRICT No. 3. DANIEL WEBBER, AGENT.

Number of pupils in district, 18.

Spring Term. Miss Nancy V. Marriner, Brunswick, teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$7.00 per week. Whole number of pupils, 15; average, 14. Term 8 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$6.00 per week. Whole number of pupils, 14; average, 12. Term 8 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Herman H. Knox, Milton, Maine, teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$5.00 per week. Whole number of pupils, 17; average, 15. Term 8 weeks.

The spring term was well and successfully taught by Miss Marriner. During the fall term the school was also under her charge. At our respective visits during both terms there was evidence of good work on the part of all, and commendable advance in the various studies. Besides the usual common English branches, writing included, there was a class of one in algebra and two in physiology. Under the direction of Mr. Knox the advance of the pupils in their different studies during the winter term was fairly good. In addition to the studies taught in the fall term, Mr. Knox had a class of one in bookkeeping. Mr. Knox is a member of Bates College, and has already won a good reputation as a scholarly student.

DISTRICT No. 4. W. K. BUKER, AGENT.

Number of pupils in district, 22.

FALL TERM. Miss Lida Maxwell, Bowdoinham, teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$4.50 per week. Whole number of pupils, 8; average, 6. Term, 9 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Miss Flora M. Brown, Litchfield Corner, teacher. Whole number of pupils, 8. Term 13 weeks.

There was no summer term. The fall term was well taught by Miss Lida Maxwell. The school being small, the teacher could and did devote more time and effort to each one. Thus the pupils of her school were enabled to do more and better work. The same remark is equally applicable to the winter term, which has been taught by Miss Flora Brown in a very successful manner. Miss Brown is both scholarly and experienced, this being her ninth term. All her work gave evidence of careful and correct teaching. Penmanship had not been neglected. The written work of the pupils in book-keeping showed that commendable care had been bestowed upon the penma ship as well as upon the correctness of the work. The class in United States History merit special mention.

DISTRICT No. 5, GEORGE E. ALEXANDER, AGENT.

Number of pupils in District, 30.

SEPING TERM. Miss Mary E. Woodward, Richmond, Teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$4.00 per week. Whole number of pupils, 17; average, 13-5. Term 9 weeks.

FALL TERM. Miss Costella E. Rogers, Litchfield Plains, Teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$5.25 per week. Whole number of pupils, 14; average, 12. Term 9 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. Wages same. Whole number of pupils, 15; average 13. Term 5 weeks.

The summer term was taught by Miss Mary E. Woodward. This being Miss Woodward's first attempt, and also, in her own district, your Supervisor was not without more or less anxious solicitude as to results. Taking all the circumstances into consideration, Miss Woodward is to be commended for the amount of good work accomplished. The fall term was successfully taught by Miss Costella E. Rogers of Litchfield, who had previously taught several terms in town, and who for this reason is well known to all as ranking high

as an active and thorough teacher. Miss Rogers taught the winter term with like good success for five weeks, at the end of which period she was obliged on account of illness to close the same. This was much regretted by all.

DISTRICT No. 6. L. C. LEWIS, AGENT.

Number of pupils in district, 64.

Spring Term. Miss Amy E. Albee, Wiscasset, teacher. Wages excluding board, \$6.00 per week. Whole number of pupils 45; average, 37. Term 10 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$7.00 per week. Whole number of pupils, 39; average, 33. Term 12 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. Wages same. Whole number of pupils, 37; average, 30. Term 11 weeks.

This school has been in charge of Miss Amy E. Albee of Wiscasset, during the entire school year. Coming to us as a teacher of successful experience, it was but natural for the district, as well as your Supervisor, to anticipate good and profitable work. At first visit we found that both teacher and pupils had arready settled down to hard work, with the evident purpose of making the most out of the time allotted for the term. Miss Albee, recognizing the absolute necessity of good discipline in order to make certain good and profitable work, already showed a determination to establish and maintain the same. The work thus so well and favorably started went steadily on throughout the entire school year. Besides all the common English branches ordinarily taught in our public schools, penmanship included, United States history, algebra, bookkeeping, physiology and geology were respectively well taught, all the pupils engaged in these studies passing their examinations during the year in a very creditable manner. On the 28th of May there was a flag raising, the first and only one that has taken place in any rural district in town thus far. The occasion was a very enjoyable one. A large and interested crowd of parents and citizens had come to witness the proceeding. The raising of the flag was followed by a short speech by the Supervisor, music by the Richmond Band, and an interesting military drill by the pupils of the school, under the direction of their teacher. Finally, a collation was served in the school-room. Thus we thought it not amiss to record one of the most interesting and perhaps important events in the history of this school. The progressive spirit by which the parents and citizens of this district are inspired, is soon, so I am informed, to be further manifested by removing the present and somewhat antiquated seats and benches, and putting in their places the most approved modern school furniture.

DISTRICT No. 8. GEORGE UMBERHIND, AGENT.

Number of pupils in District, 30.

SPRING TERM. Miss Cora Maxwell, Litchfield, Teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$5.75 per week. Whole number of pupils, 24; average, 21. Term 9 weeks.

FALL TERM. Same teacher. Wayes \$8.00. Whole number of pupils, 23; average 19. Term 13 weeks.

Miss Maxwell is well known to many of our citizens as being a teacher of experience. She is a thorough and persistent as a teacher, while as a diciplinarian, though not severe, she is firm and exacting. The work of the spring term throughout was very satisfactory and creditable alike to both teacher and pupils. Like commendable work was also done during the fall term. Thus it will be seen that this school, for doing good work and maintaining its reputation for good deportment, ranks with the best in town.

DISTRICT No. 9. CHARLES REYNOLDS, AGENT.

Number of pupils in district, 16.

STHMER TERM. Miss Costella E. Rogers, Litchfield Plans, teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$5.00 per week. Whole number of pupils, 9; average, 8. Term 8 weeks.

FALL TERM. Miss Annie L. Call, Richmond, teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$4.00 per week. Whole number of pupils, 13; average, 11. Term 7 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$4.50 per week. Whole number of pupils, 13; average, 11. Term 7 weeks.

Under the direction of Miss Rogers the spring term was a profitable one. At all my visits I found that good, thorough work was being done. The pupils were exceptionally orderly and studious. Miss Rogers was never lacking in zeal and energy, and was always giving her best efforts to the responsible work of her position.

Miss Annie L. Call, whom we have spoken of before in this report, taught the school during the rest of the year. It will be noticed that she had a larger attendance during both terms. This was owing to new pupils coming into the district. As Miss Call had the experience of but one attempt to aid her, it was with much pleasure that at first visit I found the school so well started as to give promise of a pleasant and profitable term. The result of both terms' work was in accordance with our anticipations.

DISTRICT No. 10, GEORGE CURTIS, AGENT.

Number of pupils in Dietrict. 22.

SUMMER TERM. Miss M. Etta Reed, Richmond, Teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$5.50 per week. Whole number of pupils, 17; average, 16. Term 9 weeks.

Fall Term. Mlss Alice L. Randall, West Harpswell, Teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$5.50 per week. Whole number of pupils, 13; average, 11. Term 8 weeks.

WINTER TERM. Same teacher. Wages, excluding board, \$6.00 per week. Whole number of pupils, 17; average, 12. Term 8 weeks.

A very pleasant and profitable term was taught by Miss M. Etta Reed. Miss Reed is a trained teacher, as has already been stated in

this report. Besides the common English branches, penmanship, physiology, geology and botany were taught. The recitations in these studies were very interesting, and evinced thorough and careful work on the part of teacher and pupils.

The Agent was fortunate in securing Miss Randall of West Harps-well to teach the other terms. Miss Randall is a pupil of the Farmington Normal School, and has had considerable experience, having taught six terms before coming here. She was quite at home in the school-room, and proved to be an efficient teacher. Writing received due attention. The class in physiology did well. In short, no pupil or study was neglected or overlooked.

There were only two terms of school during the year, both of which were taught by Miss Minnie Totman. Under her management the work of the two terms was fairly successful. Miss Totman has now taught four terms, hence she is ranked as a teacher of experience.

Having given the work of your schools in detail, it may not be amiss for me to direct attention to a few requirements which seem necessary to the obtaining of more and better work in the schools. For while, on the whole, your schools may be said to have advanced as rapidly as could reasonably be expected, yet it is evident that there is still room for improvement. Even were all the schools in town in the best possible condition, as well as adequate to the room demanded, and were the best free text books supplied to them all, still, in order to improve on the past excellent record, it will be necessary to exercise the utmost care in selecting and employing teachers. To have good schools we must have good teachers and, other things being equal, trained and experienced teachers are the best. But it is not always a fact that the trained teacher is most enccessful To be a good teacher one must possess a fair share of natural ability for the work, or, in other words, an aptitude for teaching. This includes the power to enforce good discipline in any school.. These qualifications generally are inherent, and are rarely

to be acquired, even with the aid and assistance of our Normal Schools.

The necessary qualifications of teachers of your primary schools have already been alluded to and need not be repeated. They are, I judge, equally applicable to the first five or six years of a child's school life, whether that time be spent in a graded or ungraded school. Hence, in selecting teachers, agents should remember what essential qualifications are needed, not only to instruct correctly the more advanced pupils, but also to mould aright the plastic minds of

the young.

Punctual attendance on the part of all the pupils is another important requisite to the general advancement of school work. If pupils are present only two or three days a week they not only lower the average of attendance, but increase the labor of the teacher and hinder the progress of the school. This being true, it is easy to see that where absenteeism is unnecessary it becomes a gross injustice to pupils who are punctual in their attendance. It therefore cannot be too forcibly impressed upon the minds of parents and guardians, that to do away with this positive hindrance to school work it is incumbent on them to see that their charges are punctual in their daily attendance. Indeed, the enforcement of this rule should be strictly adhered to. The first and best interests of a child, save its health, demand that it shall have the full benefit of our public schools; and this can only be secured through the co-operation of whoever has the child in charge.

The free text book system adds to the efficacy of your schools, all of which are at present well supplied with necessary books. change of old books for new has been made in a few instances, and new ones added to those in use; as the wants of the several schools have demanded. For the amount of expenditure for the same, see Town Report.
