DISTRICT NO. 1.—E. F. Elliott, Agent. The summer school was commenced by Miss Folsom of Locke's Mills. At the close of the first week the teacher left on account of sickness. No summer term.

Fall term of eight weeks taught by Miss Josie Martin. Miss Martin has taught several terms in town, proving herself an efficient teacher. Her mode of teaching ranks well.

The winter term was in charge of Miss Susie Graham. Miss Graham is a graduate of Kent's Hill, a fine scholar and an excellent teacher. The scholars showed marked improvement in their studies.

DISTRICT No. 2.—Fred Barker, Agent. Summer term taught by Miss Alice Putnam who has taught several successful terms in this district before. She maintained her former reputation as a good teacher.

The fall and winter terms were under the care of Miss Luna Abbott a teacher of experience. Last year I called Miss Abbott a model teacher. The same can now be said of her. Any district that is fortunate enough to secure Miss Abbott's services are reasonably sure of a first-class school.

DISTRICT No. 3.—Amos S. Austin, Agent. Seldom if ever is more and better work done in summer and winter terms than has been done in this district, under the charge of Miss Isabelle Elliott, who is one of our best teachers.

DISTRICT No. 4.—R. D. Wyman, Agent. The summer term was under the care of Miss Bertha Wyman. This teacher brought to her work the experience of former teaching, sufficient to say, that she maintained her reputation as a first-class teacher.

The winter term was taught by Mr. Joseph Putnam of Peru. At my first visit I was well pleased with Mr. Putnam's manner of conducting the school. His object seemed to be that every scholar should thoroughly understand all they passed over. On my way to visit the school near its close, I learned that the teacher left the day before, on account of sickness. A full report of the school I cannot give, but learn from the scholars it was a good one.

DISTRICT No. 5.—H. E. Hutchins, Agent. Summer term taught by Miss Mamie Hutchins. This was Miss Hutchins' home school yet she managed it well, showing tact and judgment. It was a profitable school both to teacher and scholars.

The winter term was well managed by Mr. J. L. Hutchins of Andover, this being his second attempt at teaching. The examination at the close of the school was satisfactory. I predict for Mr. Hutchins a bright future as a teacher.

DISTRICT No. 6.—Henry Caldwell, Agent. Both summer and fall terms were taught by Miss Jennie Blodgett with good results, and at each visit I found the school perfectly successful. I congratulate Miss Blodgett as a sucsessful teacher.

Winter term, M. A. Howard, teacher. Mr. Howard is one of those genial teachers who plainly have the interest of their scholars at heart, and are willing to labor for good results. The attendance during this term has been good and a large variety of work done.

DISTRICT No. 7.—F. H. Bartlett, Agent. The summer school was in care of Miss Annie Hodgdon. This is a very pleasant school to teach. Some of the pupils in Dist. No. 1 took advantage of the summer term. The teacher succeeded finely with her school.

Miss Lucy Lufkin, a graduate of Kent's Hill and a nice scholar taught the fall term. Miss Lufkin labored faithfully for the interest of her pupils and succeeded remarkably well.

Miss Josie Martin, teacher of the winter term. The appearance of the school at the close fully justified my expectation of a profitable term.

District No. 8.—R. C. Dolloff, Agent. Summer term taught by Miss Luna Dolloff of Gray. This was Miss Dolloff's first attempt at teaching. Although well qualified to teach this school, and also interested in her work, at our second visit it was very evident that she lacked other qualities which are very essential for an instructor of youth.

A fall term was commenced by the same teacher. After careful investigation, I concluded the school not a profitable one, so closed it.

Winter term taught by Mr. John Howe. Mr. Howe is a teacher who is interested in his work and labored hard for the good of his school. His order was not as good as it should have been, otherwise he proved to be an able and competent teacher.

DISTRICT No. 9.--George Blanchard, Agent. Summer term was taught by Miss M'Ora Edmunds, of Roxbury. Miss Edmunds is an energetic worker and the pupils made fair progress.

A fall term of six weeks was taught by Miss Annie Hodgdon, who proved to be the right teacher in the right place. Some of the scholars just entering their teens seemed to think they were too old to obey the rules of school, consequently they got a taste of corporal punishment, which offended their mamas and they kept their dears from school and tried to start a little blaze, but the wood would not burn, all ended in smoke.

Winter term, Mr. Ernest Farnum, teacher. Ernest is a young man not yet of age but for scholarship a full grown man. The school is now in session and if the scholars do not learn it is their own fault or the fault of their parents in not having their scholars attend the school regularly.

DISTRICT No. 10.—Fred A. Porter, Agent. This is a small school with only one term for the year, taught in the fall by Miss Susie Putnam. This was Miss Putnam's first term and she did well. This school was hardly large enough to test Miss Putnam's full ability as a teacher. I have reason to believe she would be equally as successful in a larger school.

DISTRICT No. 11.—B. B. Wyman, Agent. This is another small school with only one term taught in the winter by Miss Cummings of Sumner. Miss C. is an experienced teacher having taught forty terms, and does not grow weary in well doing. A profitable term.

DISTRICT No. 12.—R. E. Martin, Agent. Miss Sarah Martin taught both summer and fall terms. Miss M. is a good disciplinarian and thorough in her method of instruction. The scholars made commendable progress.

Miss Jennie Martin had charge of the winter term. That Miss M. has been, is now and will be among our best teachers is not too much to say nor predict.

DISTRICT No. 13.—F. S. Delano, Agent. Miss Cyretha Glover had charge of the summer term. The fact that she has been employed to teach this school several terms is ample proof of the estimation of her labors by the parents and scholars.

Winter term was taught by Mr. E. H. Spofford. Mr. Spofford is not so young in years as he is in experience as a teacher, this being his first attempt at teaching. With experience I think he will make a successful teacher. At my last visit only five scholars were present and they did not show that progress in their studies that they ought to have shown.

A fall term of eleven weeks in the Roberts Neighborhood taught by Miss Cyretha Glover was money well expended. Dudley Roberts, Agent.

GENERAL REMARKS.

It gives me pleasure to say to the citizens of Rumford that the schools in town for the past year have been very prosperous. serious complaint has been heard from scholar or teacher, which justifies the opinion that all have borne their parts faithfully. It has been a pleasure to me to witness the enthusiasm shown by the scholars in the examinations and to note the marked advancement made in the various studies. There has been thirty-one terms of school the past year, twenty-six of them have been taught by teachers of our own town. I would renew my recommendation of last year to employ home talent while we have a good supply. Sickness has had a tendency in some of the winter terms to lessen the general average attendance, otherwise it has been very good. I regret the registers do not show a larger number of visits by parents and citizens, as I deem the school-room the correct place to get a true knowledge of our schools and to see how their money is being expended and their children instructed. I have endeavored the past year to do my duty faithfully and impartially without regard of fear or favor and doubtless I have incurred the censure of some citizens by so doing.
