TOPSHAM, MAINE, February 22d, 1890.

The Auditors of the Town of Topsham have examined the accounts of receipts and expenditures presented by the Selectmen, as Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, for the year, to Feb. 1st, 1890, and find them correctly kept and properly vouched.

The accounts of the Treasurer, Edwin M. Brown, have been examined and found correct. His statements show in condensed form the transactions for the year.

#### SCHOOL REPORT.

In submitting this brief statement of the schools of Topsham, the Supervisor, regrets exceedingly, his inability at this time to make a more extended report.

#### SCHOLARS.

The whole number of Scholars in town, April 1st, 1889, was 403. The number in the village 189. The number out of the village 214.

The financial standing of the schools up to February 1st, 1890, may be found in the Selectmen's report.

In the Common schools there have been three terms of eight weeks each, with the exceptions of Nos. 3, 8 and 12, No. 3, is entitled to one week more, and No. 12, to five week more.

The High School has had three terms. Spring term, 7 weeks, Fall 10, Winter 12, Total 29.

This school has been well managed, and those attending have had excellent opportunities for improvement, but it is to be regretted, that the attendance has been so small.

Of the other schools I cannot speak in detail. I think, however they have been generally satisfactory. The greatest disadvantage to their success is the lack of funds, with which to employ first-class teachers.

The Free Text Book system comes into effect next August, and according to an estimate made by the direction of the State Superintendent 400 dollars will be required for that purpose, which sum I would recommend the town to appropriate.

In conclusion I desire to again express my sincere regret, that I have been unable to do more for the interest of the schools.

#### WARRANT

#### For Annual Town Meeting,

#### March 3, 1890.

- To Edward H. Phinney a Constable of the Town of Topsham in the County of Sagadahoc, GREETING:
- In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the Inhabitants of the Town of Topsham qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the Agricultural Hall in said town, on the third day of March A. D., 1890, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To choose three Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, a Constable and Collector of taxes, a Supervisor or three Superintending School Committee, two or more Auditors, and all other necessary town officers.

ARTICLE 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote for the support of Common Schools, Free High School, Highways and Bridges, the Poor in and out of the Alms House, the Abatements, and to pay Notes for Interest and Coupons, Miscellaneous expenses, the support of the Fire Department, and all other necessary town charges or to act on any matter relating to the same.

ARTICLE 5. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote for the support of Electric Lights, or to act on any matter relating to the same.

ARTICLE 6. To see what salary the town vote to pay the Town Treasurer.

ARTICLE 7. To see what time the taxes of the ensuing year shall become due, at what time interest shall commence if any, what rate of interest shall be charged, to see what rate per cent. we shall pay our Collector, and to act on any matter relating to taxes.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sum of money if any the town will vote Emily J. Whitten for injuries received at the foot of Winter street Hill, from being run into by boys sliding. ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to buy another road machine and what sum of money, if any, shall be raised for the same.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to tax the owners of dogs, one dollar for each dog owned the first day of April, 1890.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to abate the list of taxes returned by J. O. Meserve through his Attorney, Barrett Potter, as uncollectable.

ARTICLE 12. To see what instructions the town will give the Selectmen regarding Shad Island and the Electric Light Station.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the town will vote to accept the bequest of Mrs. Caroline Einos, of two hundred dollars, in trust, the interest thereof to be appropriated to the care of her burial lot in the Cemetery.

ARTICLE 14. To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to appropriate for a sinking fund.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell at public or private sale, all Non-resident Real Estate, bought by the town for non payment of taxes, redemption period having expired,

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to authorize and direct the School Committee, or Supervisor, to make such changes in the School books now used in town as they may deem expedient.

ARTICLE 17. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the purchase of School text books.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to hire the room adjoining the Selectmen's office, and fit it up for a lockup the expense not to exceed fifty dollars.
