SCHOOL REPORT.

The following report of the schools of the town, for the year ending March, 1894, is respectfully submitted.

The resources and expenditures are to be found in the Selectmen's report.

SCHOLARS.

The whole number of scholars in town April 1, 1893, was 397. The number in the village 165; the number out of the village 232. Number attending school, summer, 244; fall, 229; winter, 221. Average, summer, 26; fall, 194; winter, —

In each of the thirteen common schools there have been three terms of ten weeks each, with the exception of the Grammar School, which had a summer term of eleven weeks, the preceding winter term having closed sooner than was anticipated because of sickness.

The High School year consists of thirty-two weeks,

TEXT BOOKS AND MAPS.

The schools have been well supplied with excellent text books and other school supplies. Wall maps of the Hemispheres and of the United States have been placed in the Primary Schools and in many of the ungraded schools where their need was particularly evident. These maps are well executed and correct to date. They are very valuable aids to those commencing the study of geography.

REPAIRS.

But little has been expended during the year, for repairs. The school houses are for the most part in good condition. Such repairs as were necessary have been made as soon as the need became known.

The schools have enjoyed a good degree of prosperity during the year. Especially have the summer and winter terms been pleasant and profitable. The attendance during the fall term was less in several schools owing to the prevalence of fevers.

The teachers, without an exception, have worked diligently and faithfully and have succeeded to a good degree in interesting and encouraging their pupils. The village schools especially, are to be congratulated upon their corps of able and experienced teachers. The High School, under the efficient instruction of Mr. Pennell, has made steady progress. The attendance during the fall and winter terms was somewhat increased by the admission of a class from the Grammar School.

Our Grammar and Primary Schools have made marked improvement. Special attention has been paid to elementary training more regard to thoroughness of work than to extent of surface.

Among the teachers of the ungraded schools many new names will be noticed.

In order to keep these schools up to as high a standard as possible such changes have been made as seemed neces

sary to attain that end. In the selection of these teachers, many of whom came from other towns. I have been very fortunate. In no case has an incompetent teacher been employed during the year.

Many of these schools are so small that it is rather difficult to obtain teachers of experience who are willing to teach them, most well-qualified teachers perferring larger schools even at the same compensation. If two or more of these smaller schools could be combined and placed under the care of an experienced teacher, the scholars would be benefited. both by association in larger classes and by more efficient instruction.

Schools have been taught throughout the town as shown by the following statistics.

UNGRADED SCHOOLS. SCHOOL NO. 1.

SPRING TERM
