the town appropriated only \$200, for this account last year instead of \$300 as has been the custom for years, and the one hundred dollars which should have gone to this account, as usual, was added to the Town Farm account, making the appropriation for the Pown Farm, four hundred dollars instead of three hundred dollars, which has been the amount of the appropriation for that account for years.

During last year, Arthur W. Ricker, son of Frank Ricker, living at Lisbon Falls, was sent, by the court, to the Reform School during minority.

This adds one dollar per week to the expenses of the Poor out of the house account, and we have paid Lisbon, so far, fifty one dollars for the Ricker boy's support at the Reform School.

There is due from the Lewiston. Brunswick, and Bath Electric St. Railway Co. \$93.35, which is one half of the amount expended in 1898 on bridges, and \$33.34, which is one half the amount expended in 1897 on the two bridges in our village, making the total amount due from the company \$126.69 which added to the balance as shown in the Highway account would give \$464.34, as the actual balance to the Highway account at this time.

During the summer an agreement was made between the L. B. & B. Electric Ry. Co. on one side and the towns of Lisbon & Topsham on the other side, as follows, viz: That the Electric Ry Co. should use the abutments of the old bridge between Lisbon and Topsham, and should build thereon a steel bridge 24 feet in width, also that the bridge should be raised 2 feet higher than the old bridge, that said Co should plank said bridge, that the snow cleared from the R. R. track should at once be removed by said R. R. Co. That all repairs hereafter to be made upon said bridge etc, should be at the joint expense of said town and the said R. R. Co, the said Co. bearing one half the expense and should the abutements be destroyed, said Co. shall bear one half the expense of replacing the same.

That the towns of Lisbon and Topsham should, each pay the Electric R. R. \$150, when said steel bridge was completed.

Later, arrangements were made between the L. B. & B. R. R. and the selectmen of Topsham, by which arrangements said R. R. should pay the Town of Topsham, \$150.00 for damages done by that company to the highways of this town, between Oliver White's house and the Lisbon line.

At the annual Town meeting in March 1898, the town voted to appropriate \$500 00 for the purpose of adding a piece to the old school-house, where the Selectmen's and School Committee's offices were.

After thoroughly considering the matter it was decided to add 25 feet to the length of the building.

It was found, upon investigation, that the old building could be moved back 25 feet and a new piece put on front, at a less expense to the town than would be if the partitions of the offices were all taken down and moved to the rear of the building, since most of the lumber of the partitions would thus be destroyed and necessitate its being replaced by other lumber.

Accordingly the old building was moved back and it was then found that all the old underpinning would have to be rebuilt.

In addition to that the old building had to be shingled and clapboarded. A new chimney, also, had to be built from the ground up, on account of insurance.

There was only one way that this could all be done without overdrawing the account, and that was to cut short the piece to be added to the Hall, some eight or ten feet.

This was out of the question if the town intended to use the Hall for town meeting purposes, as, in that case, it would not be large enough in which to hold our annual town meetings and other gatherings.

For these reasons the Hall was built as originally planned and is, without doubt, none too large for the purposes intended by the voters of the town.

The amount expended on the old part would equal what has been overdrawn on the account.

I have examined the accounts of receipts and expenditures presented by the Selectmen as Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor for the Town of Topsham for the year to Feb. 1st, 1899, and find them correctly kept, and properly vouched for.

The accounts of the Treasurer, Wm. R. Hildreth, I have examined and found correct.

Road Commissioner's Report.

At the annual town meeting in March, 1898, Two Thousand Dollars was appropriated for Highways and Bridges. There was \$100 appropriated at a special town meeting, the previous fall, for repairs on Lisbon Bridge and \$100, for repairs for the long bridge which amounts have been credited this year to the Highways and Bridges account, making a total of \$2200, for use this last year, minus the sixty nine and seventy two one hundredths dollars, which was overdrawn at the beginning of 1898, which left \$2,130.28. It was also voted at the 1898 March meeting that the unpaid bills of 1897 on Highway account should be also paid from this past year's appropriation.

Under the Law I was compelled to give a bond for the faithful performance of my duty as Road Commissioner.

The question which there faced me was, how much money would I have to expend during the year of 1898.

I found, on inquiring at different times, that bills of the previous year were being paid throughout the year, and have been paid up to Jan. 14th, 1899, and so I never knew at any one time during the year how much money I had at my own disposal until now, the 1st of February, 1899.

It has proven, finally, that eleven hundred and sixty five and eighty-five one hundredths dollars has been paid on account of 1897, including the \$69.72 overdrawn at the beginning of this year.

This left \$1,034.15 (including the \$200, raised at the special meeting in the fall of 1897 spoken of above) as available for this year, but still leaving me in the dark as to just how much there would be until the financial year was closed. There has been expended, during this year, just past, \$696.50 leaving a balance of \$337.65 at this time to the Highway and Bridges account.

There is due from the Lewiston, Brunswick and Bath Electric Railway Co., \$93.35 which is one half of the amount expended on the bridge between Topsham and Brunswick during 1898, by this town.

I learn that there is also due from the same company, \$33.64 which is one half of the amount expended on the bridges in the village during 1897.

Adding these two amounts to the balance on the Highway account, mentioned above, and it equals \$464.34 which is the amount actually unexpended from the Highway account to date, towards paying the present winter snow bills.

All bills have been itimized and an account of each man's time kept, according to Law, and I respectfully refer to the Highways and Bridges account in another part of the Town Report, for amounts paid different persons for labor and materials.

School Report.

There were 533 scholars in town on the First of April 1898, between the ages of 4 and 21 years.

During the past year the schools, as a whole, have been successful and the teachers and scholars have done good work. Very rarely have complaints, against teachers been made to the Committee or Superintendent, and in almost every case, differences were adjusted and satisfactory arrangements or changes were made.

Parents should, at all times, feel free to make known to the Committee, facts which are liable to work against the interest of the Schools as, in this way, changes may be made or mistakes corrected which, otherwise, might cause much trouble and waste of time and money.

It often happens, however, that complaints come so late that corrections cannot be made without changing the teachers, when, if the particular matter had been spoken of in season to the Superintendent, or some member of the committee, suggestions might have been made quietly to the teacher, in the spirit of kindness, and all would have been well.

It seems to be only justice to the teachers to mention here another phase of this question viz: That the parent should not be too zealous in making complaints against teachers. They should be sure they are right before taking a decided stand against teachers.

Great injustice is often done to teachers by someone who has made complaints to the Committee, stronger than the facts will warrant. But we are pleased to say that these cases have been few and far between.

If parents would feel free to talk with teachers and explain the peculiarities of their children's dispositions and

capacity to learn, much would be gained for the child's advancement, and this brings to mind the importance of the teachers calling upon and getting acquainted with the parents of the children under their care in school. Also the advantage of having parents visit the schools, and, by encouraging words, make the teacher feel that half her burden has been lifted from her shoulders and, out of gratitude for the kindness and interest shown her, make her resolve to apply herself, with renewed energy, to the work before her.

At the present time there are eleven schools in session in this town, besides the High School.

The Goodwin school has been closed during the year. At the time the School Committee had its meeting last spring, there was only one scholar in that District, beyond the school house. It was therefore deemed best by the committee to close that school and let the scholars this side of the school-house, attend the Pejepscot school. As arrangements were made by the Selectmen when the Lewiston, Brunswick & Bath St. R'y was granted permit to lay its tracks in our town, to transport scholars and teachers for a two cent fare, it would not seem to be policy to run a school in Goodwin District unless there was quite a large number of scholars.

For, as it costs only 4 cents per day to transport the scholars to and from the schools in other districts, quite a large number could be transported before the expense would amount to as much as it would cost to hire a teacher and purchase fuel etc., for that school there.

This school, however, is suspended by law, without any action of the committee, and can only be reinstated by a vote of the town,

The School in the Haley District was suspended by the Committee at the beginning of the present winter term.

There were only eight scholars attending that school last term and, as two of those moved away, arrangements were made to transport the remaining scholars, in that

scholars presented themselves as members of the entering class, it was found necessary to add still other seats until finally all available space in the school room was occupied and it was found necessary to place five desks in the recitation room.

This building is well supplied with maps, charts and globes, and in this connection it is proper to state that, during the Fall term, Mr. F. C. Whitehouse presented the town with a very fine Globe for the use of the schools, which gift is much appreciated by the other members of the School Committee, the Superintendent and teachers.

It is very pleasing to the Committee and Superintendent that so large a number of scholars from outside the village are taking advantage of the course of instruction given in our High School.

At present there are 32 Scholars from outside the village attending.

The first class, which will be graduated the coming June numbers 14 pupils. In all probability, a class will enter the coming fall, larger than the one to graduate.

The School Committee and Superintendent are much pleased to note the excellent care which, has been taken of the school house and the various rooms, desks and equipments. Much credit for this is due to the teachers, but it must not be forgotten that a large share of this state of affairs is due to the manly and ladylike qualities of the scholars themselves.

The School property in town is in excellent condition and our citizens may well feel proud of the condition of the School houses and surroundings.

Many of our school houses are supplied with the latest improved desks, throughout the town, and there is only one school house in use in town that is not supplied with slate blackboards.
