School Report

To the Citizens of Topsham:

I herewith submit my first annual report of the public schools of Topsham under the new district formed by the union of Topsham and Brunswick. On account of my previous experience in connection with the High School and as Superintendent, I was able, six months ago, to take up the without the disadvantages work again which would have been encountered by a stranger. A personacquaintance with nearly all the teachers. al some of whom had been my pupils, and а thorough knowledge of the wishes and policy of the School Committee, were of great assistance to me in beginning my work here as a district superintendent.

There is in this report more of detailed information concerning the schools than it has been customary to give in years past, but it is taken for granted that the citizens of the town are sufficiently interested in their schools to warrant this extra attention to details.

TEACHERS

With the exception of the High school, but few changes have been made in the teaching force during the year. Cecil L. Butler resigned at the end of the Spring term as principal of the Grammar school after two years of service. The vacancy was filled by the election of Miss Grace Frow, a graduate of Gorham Normal school, class of 1908. In September, Miss Sarah Drew was appointed to take the place of Miss Mildred Qu'll at the Alexander school, and during the fall term Miss Florence Tarr substituted for Miss Mary Giveen at the Brick school. All the other positions have been filled by the same teachers as last year. Again it seems advisable to call attention to the value of special preparation on the part of those who intent to make teaching a profession. Maine has some of the best Normal schools to be found in the country. Tuition is free and the course but two years in length. Every High school graduate who intends to teach should avail herself of the opportunity to secure Normal training, and thus fit herself to become a better teacher than she could otherwise become and make herself worthy a higher salary than the untrained teacher can command.

SCHOOL HOUSES

With the exception of the building of a laboratory in the High School building, no extensive repairs or alterations have been made on any of the school houses during the past year. A number of minor repairs and improvements have, however, been made. At Topsham Heights, the recitation room which was built last year has been painted and several needed improvements added. New stoves have been purchased for both the Branch and the Alexander schools. It will be necessary to purchase several new stoves the coming year, as some of those now in use are not serviceable.

New seats and desks should at once be placed in the room at the Foreside. The old-fashioned plank seats in use there are uncomfortable and inconvenient. They are especially uncomfortable for the younger pupils, as many of them are not able to reach the floor with their feet when sitting upon the seats. Several new out-buildings should be built next year, and repairs are required at the Alexander the Branch, the Middlesex, the Haley, and the Cathance districts, and also at Pejepscot.

HIGH SCHOOL

A class numbering sixteen was graduated last June from the High school. The class decided to take a trip to Washington, D. C., during the Spring vacation, and for that

reason graduating exercises were not held at the end of the Spring term. The following pupils were granted diplo-Eunice Irene Adams, Berneice Erma Barker, Hazel mas : Fannie Barker, Eva May Bradbury, Gladys Hall Brown, Bernard Ashley Cromwell, Mildred Robbe Johnson, Hazel Mae Mallett, Harold Adams Pennell, Doris Elenora Rackley, Annie Louise Roberts, Agnes Elizabeth Tarbox, James Obadiah Tarbox, Florence Ellen Tarr, Mary Ellen Utecht, Hazel Frances White. Several changes have been made in the teaching force during the past year. The position of principal was held during the Spring term by William W. Fairclough, Bowdoin 1908. During the summer he resigned to accept a position as teacher of modern languages at Hebron Academy. His place was filled in September by the election of Ralph M. Small, Bowdoin 1907, who still continues in the position.

Miss Mabel E. Norcross, who had served as assistant for four years, resigned in July, to take a position in the Hallowell High school. Her place was taken by Miss Geneva Carpenter, a graduate of Smith College 1909.

Our high school is now thoroughly provided with text books, has a well equipped laboratory for teaching physics and chemistry; a competent teaching force, and there is every reason for believing that the quality and quantity of work accomplished will compare favorably with that of any high school of equal size in the State.

HIGH SCHOOL LABORATORY

The high schools of the State are divided into three grades or classes, and these are designated as Class A, or standard high schools, Class B, and Class C. This division into three grades is based upon the course of study, the number of teachers employed, general equipment, length of the high school course and the amount of money expended. Topsham High school has been for several years in the A or Standard class. In order that the school might remain in this class it was found the present year that there must be provided a laboratory, and such laboratory equipment as would be approved by the State Educational Department. As there was no appropriation made by the town for this purpose, the school officials were obliged to pursue one of three courses; either call a special town meeting and ask for a special appropriation, or allow the school to drop to the B or 2d class, or try to build a laboratory from the regular re-After careful consideration it was depair appropriation. cided to adopt the third alternative, and work was begun on the laboratory in August and the room completed before the beginning of the fall term in September. We now have in the basement of the High school building a good laboratory. well equipped and suitable for meeting the college entrance requirements in both physics and chemistry. The room is supplied with running water, is well heated and has accommodations for individual work for a class of average size. All this has been paid for out of the regular appropriation for repairs and supplies, and in consequence that account is slightly overdrawn.

REDUCTION IN NUMBER OF GRADES

For many years Topsham has maintained in the village schools ten grades preparatory to entrance to the High school. As a child cannot legally enter school until he is five years old, unless he manages somewhere to skip a grade he must of necessity be fifteen before entering the High school, and nineteen at graduation. There are now few cities or towns in the country which maintain ten grades, and it would seem advisable for Topsham to arrange its course of study to correspond with the time usually spent in grade work in other places.

The conditions in the primary school the present year seemed favorable for uniting two of the grades. This has been done, and a course of study covering nine years instead of ten is now in preparation by the Superintendent. Probably this course of study will go into effect at the beginning of the next school year in September. It will be seen at once that this change, if successfully carried out, will mean a great saving of time on the part of pupils and a saving of many dollars each year to the town.

The same condition in regard to number of grades has existed for several years in Brunswick, and the same change to nine grades instead of ten will go into effect there next September. The schools in both towns will then be using the same course of study, and the pupil moving from one town to the other will find his proper place at once in the class for which he is fitted.

BRUNSWICK PUBLIC LIBRARY

At the last annual town meeting the sum of fifty dollars was raised for the purpose of securing for the school children of Topsham the use of the Brunswick Public Library. The librarian reports that 97 boys and girls of Topsham have taken out cards, and many of the pupils in Topsham schools have expressed to the Superintendent their appreciation of the opportunity afforded them to secure a wider range of reading. It would seem wise for the town to continue the privilege for another year.

SIGHT AND HEARING TESTS.

Chapter seventy-three, section six of the school laws of 1909 read as follows:

The school committee of every city or town shall cause every child in the public schools to be separately and carefully tested and examined at least once in every school year to ascertain whether he is suffering from defective sight or hearing or from any other disability or defect tending to prevent his receiving the full benefit of his school work, or requiring a modification of the school work in order to prevent injury to the child or to secure the best educational results. Tests of sight and hearing shall be made by the teachers or by the school physicians. The committee shall cause notice of any defect or disability requiring treatment to be sent to the parent or guardian of the child and shall require a physical record of each child, to be kept in such form as the state superintendent of public schools shall prescribe after consultation with the State board of health.

The law has been complied with in Topsham and with the following result.

Number of parents notified	32

While parents are not obliged to take notice of the reports in regard to sight and hearing sent by school officials, it is found by experience that in the majority of cases some action is taken which results in an improvement in the child's physical and mental condition.

The law seems to be a wise one, and will result in a higher standard of efficiency in the public schools.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

It will be seen by a reference to the appropriations recommended by the School Committee, that for common schools only one thousand dollars is asked for the present year, instead of thirty-five hundred raised the previous year—a reduction of twenty-five hundred dollars. This great reduction is made possible by reason of recent State legislation and on account of the balance left over from last year.

Under the terms of Chapter 177 of the Public Laws of 1909, a State tax of one and a half mills is to be assessed annually upon all the property of the State for the support of common schools. The fund raised by this new tax will be additional to the common school fund hitherto provided.

The fund made available by the new law will be dis-

tributed to cities and towns on the following basis: onethird according to the number of scholars, and two-thirds according to the valuation as fixed by the State assessors. While it is not possible at this time to state with absolute accuracy the amount Topsham will receive from the State in January 1911, it will be at least eighteen hundred dollars more than was received from the last apportionment. This will make possible a corresponding reduction in the amount to be raised by the town the present year for common school purposes.

On account of the unusual demands at the High School the repair and book accounts are over-drawn, but it will be noticed that the school expenditures as a whole show a considerable balance on the credit side. On account of the great reduction in the appropriation required for common schools, the school officials feel justified in asking for a slight increase for repairs, books and supplies to offset the overdraft in these two acounts.

The increase in the amount asked for repairs is due to the fact that the school officials realize the urgent need of more comfortable, sanitary and attractive accommodations for the children who attend the rural schools. Several of the rural school houses are in great need of thorough renovation and as the village building is now in a good condition, a large part of the repair appropriation made the present year should be used in the country districts.

CONCLUSION

It should be remembered that a satisfactory condition of the public schools depends upon the active co-operation of parents, teachers, pupils and school officials. Each of the four factors must contribute its share or there will be a failure to secure a high degree of efficiency.

During the year the schools, as a whole, have been maintained with little friction, and in most cases substantial indications of progress are evident. The Superintendent wishes to express his appreciation of the spirit of friendliness manifested by the teachers, and the cordial support given him by the members of the school committee in all his efforts to promote the interests of the schools.
