School Report

To the Citizens of Topsham:—

I herewith submit my second annual report of the public schools of Topsham under the district formed by the union of Topsham and Brunswick.

The conditions for a prosperous school year have been favorable. There have been few severe storms to interfere with regular attendance, and infectious diseases have not been sufficiently prevalent to cause the closing of any school, or to retard greatly the regular work. The Superintendent has endeavored to keep in close touch with the teachers in relation to their work, to observe carefully the physical conditions surrounding pupils and teachers in the various school rooms, and to furnish as promptly as possible the proper equipment necessary for successful teaching.

SCHOOL HOUSES

At the last annual town meeting there was raised for repairs and supplies a sum somewhat larger than the amount usually raised for those purposes. The greater part of this money has been spent upon the rural school houses, and the school officials believe it has been wisely expended.

At the Brick school house new doors and transoms have been installed and minor repairs made.

At the Foreside a new out-building has been built, new desks and chairs and a teacher's desk purchased for the school room, the ceiling whitened, and the underpinning pointed.

At Middlesex the ceiling was whitened and the underpinning repaired. At the Branch district, a new out-building has been built, and other improvements added.

At the Haley school house a new sill was placed under one end of the building, new doors hung, and a new outbuilding built.

In the Alexander district, a new wire fence has been built around the school lot.

At Pejepscot it was found necessary to install a new furnace, repair the out-building, finish off a new cloak room and partition off a part of the main hall for a recitation room.

At Topsham Heights a new stove was placed in the recitation room and a portion of the roof shingled.

At the High School building, a new concrete walk has been laid from the street to the entrance, new grates have been added to the furnace, a portion of the building has been painted and various minor improvements added.

The school houses have all been thoroughly cleaned and the usual number of general repairs made.

Three new out-buildings have been built at an expense of about \$175, and the coming year at least three new ones should be built. The out-building at the average country school house is often a disgrace to a civilized community, and a menace to good morals. With old delapidated buildings but little can be done in the way of improvement, but with a perfectly new closet, efforts to keep the place in a neat and sanitary condition are more easily successful. Each new closet is divided into two separate sections, the doors are locked at night by the teacher, and are unlocked by the teacher in the morning. Frequent inspection is given by teacher and by superintendent, so that any attempt at defacing the property may be checked at once. New closets are urgently needed at the Alexander district, at Middlesex and at Cathance.

THE HIGH SCHOOL

Several changes have been made in the teaching force since the report of last year. During the summer vacation the school board received the resignation of Ralph M. Small, who had served as principal for the previous school year. Mr. Small left Topsham to accept a position as teacher of Latin in the Fall River, Mass. High School. At the same time the assistant, Miss Geneva Carpenter, resigned to accept a place as assistant in the Freeport, Me. High School.

The principalship left vacant by Mr. Small was filled in September by the election of Daniel F. Koughan of Bath, a member of the class of 1908, Bowdoin College. Miss Thetis S. Questrom, a graduate of Wellesley College, class of 1908, was elected as assistant. Both these teachers still hold the positions to which they were elected, and both are doing efficient work. The attendance has increased both in numbers and in regularity, the discipline is excellent, while the courses offered and the amount of work accomplished will compare very favorably with other institutions having the same number of teachers.

The High School is still rated by the State as in the A class, but if it is to remain there, it may be necessary in the near future to employ an additional assistant.

The new laboratory built last year admirably serves the purpose for which it was intended, and a course in chemistry has been given during the year. A set of new International Cyclopaedia has been added to the reference library, and the school is now well supplied with text books.

VILLAGE GRADED SCHOOLS

Miss Grace Frow, now Mrs. George Earl, who served for two terms as principal of the Grammar School, resigned at the end of the winter term, and her place was filled by the election of Miss Marion G. Strout, a graduate of Gorham Normal School, class of 1908. Miss Ethel Allen has continued as assistant during the year. Both Miss Strout and

Miss Allen are conscientious teachers and have been highly successful in their work.

Miss Viola Adell and Miss Clare P. Hussey have continued as principals of the Intermediate and Primary departments, and they have maintained the same high grade of service that has characterized their work in the past. In the intermediate department two different assistants have been employed during the year. In the winter term assistance was given by Miss Eleanor Powers, and in the fall term the place was held by Miss Alma White. The assistant gives but a part of the day to this work.

Last Spring, through an invitation from the Saturday club, a joint exhibition was given in Brunswick town hall by the village schools of Topsham and Brunswick. The object was to give, as far as possible, examples of every day grade work, and each grade of the Topsham schools was represented. Papers were displayed showing number work, language lessons, spelling and dictation exercises, while some of the upper grades sent examples of modelling, map drawing and designing.

In addition to the exhibit, Topsham children took a prominent part in the entertainment which consisted of songs, drills and recitations. A very large number of visitors attended the exhibition and there were many expressions of appreciation of the excellent character of the work shown by the Topsham children. Teachers and pupils deserve praise for the successful accomplishment of an undertaking which involved a considerable amount of hard work.

REDUCTION OF GRADES IN VILLAGE SCHOOLS

In the report of last year reference was made to a reduction in the number of grades in the village schools of Topsham and Brunswick. For many years the two towns have maintained ten grades preparatory to entrance to the high school. As there are now no cities and few towns in New England which maintain ten grades, it seemed advisable to arrange our grade work to correspond with that in

other places. A dropping out of an entire year made necessary the revising of the entire grade program. the summer vacation a new course of study was prepared by the Superintendent, and it was at once introduced at the beginning of the fall term in September. The new course was by no means regarded as a finality. Teachers were urged to report imperfections which they found after actual trial in the class room. The teachers have cordially co-operated with the Superintendent and all indications point to the complete success of the plan. about the saving of an entire year on the part of pupils in the grades, and the saving of a considerable expenditure of money on the part of the town. Grade pupils schools of Topsham and Brunswick are now pursuing practically the same work, and a change from one school system to the other may be accomplished without examination.

The schools of Pejepscot have been graded in accordance with the new course of study, and the work there is substantially the same as that accomplished in the village.

Rural Schools

The schools at the Foreside, Alexander, Haley and Mallett districts have been under the charge of the same teachers during the entire year, but changes have been made in all the other districts. A reference to the detailed statistics given in another place will show what these changes have been.

The town has lost by resignation four teachers who have rendered the town efficient service for several years. These are Miss Grace Clifford, now Mrs. Samuel Cobb, who served for two years as principal of the Pejepscot grammar school; Miss Elizabeth Waltman, now Mrs. Horace Whitney; Miss Edith Carr for five years principal of Pejepscot primary; Miss Anna Barron, for nine years principal at the Heights school, and Miss Janette Purington, teacher at Cathance.

Attention is called here to the rapid growth in the

For several years after the new schools at Pejepscot. building was erected, all the pupils were accommodated in one room, and one teacher had no difficulty in attending to the needs of the school. Now three teachers are employed, nine grades are maintained and the total enrollment for the year is 76. While a section of the hall is now being utilized as a recitation room, this arrangement should A suitable recitation room not be regarded as permanent. should be added to the south side of the building. are no reasons for believing that the attendance at the Pejepscot schools will be less in the future than at present, and the probability is that the atendance will be even larger than it now is. The present teachers at Pejepscot are doing good work and are receiving the hearty co-operation parents.

While a large portion of the boys and girls in the rural schools are prompt and regular in their attendance, there are others who are too busy with outside matters, or are too negligent to do their duty in this direction.

This hindrance to satisfactory work exists also in the village but it is more noticeable in the country districts. Parents can lend no better aid to teachers, school officials and to the children themselves, than by a determined effort to remedy this prevalent hindrance to school progress. Tardiness becomes easier each time it is allowed to occur. While under certain circumstances, by reason of bad weather conditions, illness, distance or home duties, tardiness or absence may seem necessary; in a great majority of cases they are inexcusable

SIGHT AND HEARING TEST

The law requiring the examination of the sight and hearing of pupils in the public schools has been complied with in Topsham and the results are as follows:

Number of children examined 412 Number of children with defective sight 28 Number of children with defective hearing 8 Number of parents notified 16

As was the case last year, teachers were instructed not to be over-critical in their examinations, and to report to parents only such cases as seemed to demand immediate attention. The results obtained justify the existence of the law.

Brunswick Public Library

For two years the teachers and school children of Topsham have had the privilege of using the Brunswick Public Library. The librarian reports that more than one hundred boys and girls have taken out cards and that a very large proportion of the cards are in active use. Now and then the matter of establishing a public library in Topsham is discussed by interested citizens, but while the use of an excellent library can be obtained for so reasonable an expenditure of money, it hardly seems advisable to establish one in Topsham. Its support would form an additional burden upon the community, and it would of necessity be in all respects inferior to the one maintained in Brunswick. The School Board recommend the appropriation of the same amount as was raised last year for the continuation of the library privilege.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Last year, on account of the increased amount received from the State, the sum raised by the town for common schools was over two thousand dollars less than was raised the preceding year. A reference to the report of the various departments will show that no school account has been overdrawn, and that there is a substantial balance left to the credit of the school department as a whole.

There is an apparent deficit in the high school account, but this is because no money has been received the past year from the State. From this source there is now due \$375. Had this amount been received, there would be a considerable balance to the credit of the high school.

There will be no need of increased appropriations the present year if the amount to be paid by the State equals the sum received last year.

The recommendations for school appropriations made by the School Committee for the coming year, have been carefully considered and are as small as seems consistent with true economy and the best interests of our school system.

CONCLUSION

Each year of school administration should show some improvement over the preceding year, and the Superintendent believes that in some respects a substantial advance has been made in the schools of Topsham during the year of 1910. There has been an increase in the number of pupils registered and in the average attendance. The physical conditions at many of the school houses have been greatly improved. The teachers employed have exhibited an increased enthusiasm which has been gratifying; the work has gone on with an unusual absence of friction between teachers and pupils, and an absence of complaints on the part of the parents.

The Committee and Superintendent invite a frank and free criticism of school methods and school management, and promise the citizens of the town that every effort will be made to remedy unsatisfactory conditions.

The Superintendent wishes to express his renewed obligations to the teachers for their cheerful co-operation, and to the members of the School Committee for their cordial support in his efforts to carry on his work of supervision.
