## Report of Superintendent of Schools

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To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Unity:

Another fiscal year has passed and according to custom and the law of our state it gives me pleasure to submit this, my fourth annual report.

The classroom work has been excellent in every school. The pupils have taken hold of their work in a masterful way, and the teaching has been of a superior type.

The rural schools finished the spring term with the same teachers as last reported, but two resignations occurred at the end of the year, and Misses Waning and Berry were elected to fill the vacancies. They both have done splendid work and are liked in their respective schools.

Many times I have heard it remarked this year that Unity of all towns was fortunate in having such a splendid corps of teachers.

All grades are doing standard work, and only a very few pupils are below grade or will fail to make it this year. We have more according to age who are above rather than below.

Last spring term we had demonstrations given of the Palmer writing system by one of their expert penmen. She encouraged the teachers in working for the writing certificate. Miss Moulton took advantage of the opportunity and has received a certificate.

### REPAIRS

The high school building has been newly painted and the boiler room re-covered with plaster board.

Next year plans have been made to connect the Wood's school building with the shed and toilets. This will be the last to remodel.

### EPIDEMIC

The measles caused the Christmas vacation to be prolonged, but arrangements have been made to make up one week and to continue without a vacation so as to be through before warm weather, and in order that the boys can be of assistance



farming.

We especially thank our doctors for their aid in bringing a halt to the epidemic. We were fortunate that it was not more serious.

## Report of Principal of High School

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To the Superintendent, School Committee, and Citizens of the Town of Unity:

My second year at your high school has been more satisfactory than the first, and the first was very satisfactory. I am very much pleased with the advancements that have been made at the school and I wish to inform you that such would have been impossible without the co-operation of each unit of our school environment. If there is present any element of disrespect or lack of gratitude I am unaware of it.

The scholastic averages have been increased and automatically they are one of the elements that mark progress in the training and personal efficiency of each student. We have been handicapped by an extended Christmas recess—and by sickness since that recess, but I feel that our progress as a unit has not been curbed.

Since the beginning of the school year, September 1928, we have lost only three pupils from the school and they have been replaced by new ones. Incapability to do the work required, lack of chances for pupils to earn their board, and removal to other towns have been the causes, and only one of these are within our power to govern.

Our high school records are systematically filed from 1913 to 1929 inclusive and our reference and information systems well correspond to the systems of the best high schools. The principal's office is a well organized part of the school and from the foundation that was entirely lacking, a complete alumni bureau has been accomplished. Our reference library has been arranged in regulation style and rules for the borrowing of books are laid down to the pupil. Each young person enrolled at the school seems to be interested in their own progress and in the progress of the school as a body and as a result we find our rooms and books in good order, also more satisfactory rank cards.

Unity high school is well represented in the Waldo County Athletic League and athletic competition this year is built upon a basis of training and practice that must certainly stand the

student in good stead for years to come.

Expositorially I might state that a school teacher's job is a big one—one to which they must train themselves for success, one that only hours and years of experience can correctly mark with praiseworthy accomplishment. A teacher's success does not depend entirely upon themselves but upon the cooperation they receive from their pupils' parents, the governing committees, the superintendent and incidentally the church and community as a whole. Remember this, parents, if you will pardon my liberty, teaching in the elements and practices of art and science and philosophy begin and end at home. A school simply fills in those hours between your teachings, gives your children something to think about that by their own abilities and your moral support become highly beneficial.

Last year I asked you to make yourself acquainted with us—and your schools—this year I've waited—and only one visitor have we had from the ranks of parents.

This is your school—not ours—interest yourself in the property that is yours. We invite you to acquaint yourselves in the system of training which is in all probability your daughter's or son's preparation for the remainder of their lives.

Assuring you in all respects that Mr. Dolloff, Miss Groezinger, and myself appreciate the co-operation you have given us—and hoping for more active interest on your part, parents—I respectfully submit my report.

## Report of Instructor of Agriculture

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To the Citizens of Unity:

This report covering my second year as instructor of agriculture at Unity high school will deal with two major topics: the work of the past year, and the hopes of the future.

### THE WORK OF THE PAST YEAR

The projects which were carried by the boys in 1927-28 netted them as a whole one thousand ninety-four dollars and nine cents (\$1,034.09). The smallest project income was thirty-one dollars and seventy-five cents (\$31.75), while the largest was four hundred twenty-eight dollars and eighty cents (\$428.80). As usual the favorite projects were potatoes and beans and the unfinished projects for 1928-29 also favor those two. For next year's work we find a deviation from the past in the form of farm management projects and poultry projects.

Carrying on these supervised projects and the work connected with this department required two thousand two hundred and two miles (2,202) of travel by automobile which includes making over two hundred (200) visits to projects, 4-H club members, and farmers. Farmers from surrounding towns have solicited advice which is always freely given. Fifteen acres of potatoes were rogued during the summer.

In our "Herd Improvement" work we have had a total of thirteen cows on test which showed an average annual milk production of 5,931 and profit above grain costs of \$107.22. The high individual produced 7,149.4 pounds of milk with a profit above grain costs of two hundred twelve dollars (\$212.00). The low individual produced 3,682 pounds of milk with a profit above grain cost of only eighty-eight dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$88.98).

The stock judging team competing with the other vocational agricultural schools of the state, at Bangor fair, took third place at the contest, which is the same position that Unity high school has held for the last three years, and is indeed

gratifying. The Unity team placed as follows: Foster, 5th prize, \$3.00; E. Price, 13th prize, \$1.50; Bagley, 18th prize, \$2.50.

A 4-H Club, composed of both the boys and girls, was organized here last spring by Mr. Donahue, the county agent. Since I am the instructor of agriculture, I was asked to head the group. I was, with the help of Mrs. Trueworthy, whose leadership and patience will be lost to the club next year.

Demonstration teams from this club competed at Belfast during the summer for the right to go to Orono, there to compete for a trip to Springfield. None of our teams won the right to go to Springfield but they did gain a lot of knowledge for future use.

At the county contest at Belfast in the fall the Unity club took second place which is indeed an enjoyable position when it represented our first year in competition as a united group of boys and girls.

The excellency of the work of Maynard Stevens, William Farwell, Orman Gray, and Thelma Gerald in 4-H club work make them eligible for a trip to Springfield next fall among the one hundred and twelve from Maine.

During the summer I attended a course of instruction, especially arranged for vocational teachers, at Bangor high school. This was of one week's duration. It was also my privilege to travel over the state aboard the Maine Central special livestock train which toured the state early in August. Meeting the farmers all over the state and discussing their problems with them was an education in itself.

### HOPES FOR THE FUTURE

Dairying: I sincerely hope that the farmers of Unity will take advantage of the fact that this department, at a minimum cost, can conduct a herd improvement association, which would be of unrealized value to the farmer in dollars and cents. Dairying is the basis of the stability of agriculture, year in and year out, here in Unity. It can be made more stable by weeding out the "boarders" from the herds. They are the ones that reduce the profits. Daily weighing of the milk is the only true feeding guide and the only road to true herd improvement. May we be of service to you?

Interest in abortion is increasing every year. There is a way to rid one's herd of it and I would gladly discuss this important disease with anyone who is interested.



Poultry: We have had in the henhouse here at the school forty-nine Rhode Island Red pullets which have been trap nested since they started to lay. We have mated these pullets with cockerels; one from the Massachusetts Agricultural College, the other from U. of M.

Several of the boys are having poultry as their project for the coming year and it is hoped that all the eggs produced will be graded and sold under the seal of "Maine Special Eggs"—and a market developed in Waterville for this extra quality product.

4-H Club Work: The club has already organized and I expect the work will be equally as high grade as it was last year.

#### CONCLUSION

This second year's work I am sure has accomplished more than the first but there is still plenty to do which can only be accomplished by careful thought on your part as well as that of this department. I wish that you would voice to the proper authority any thoughts that you may have that you think would improve this part of the high school here in Unity.

## Town Warrant

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To Ira H. Parkhurst, a Constable of Unity, County of Waldo,  
Greetings:

In the name of the state of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Unity, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the town house in said town, on Monday, the 11th day of March, A. D., 1929, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1.—To choose by ballot, a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2.—To choose by ballot a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3.—To choose by ballot three selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 4.—To choose by ballot a treasurer for the ensuing year.

Art. 5.—To choose by ballot a collector of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 6.—To choose by ballot one or more constables for the ensuing year.

Art. 7.—To choose by ballot one or more fire wardens for the ensuing year.

Art. 8.—To choose by ballot a member of the supervisory school committee for the term of three years.

Art. 9.—To choose by ballot one trustee for the agriculture, Farwell benevolent and cemetery fund for one or more years.

Art. 10.—To choose by ballot all other necessary town officers.

Art. 11.—To see what method the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes, and to see if the town will allow a rebate or discount, on all taxes paid before a certain date, and if so establish by vote such date and the amount of such rebate or discount.

Art. 12.—To see if the town by its vote will set the date when its taxes assessed and committed for the year 1929 shall become due.

Art. 13.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the payment of rebate or discount on taxes and if so how much.

Art. 14.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of town officers' fees for the ensuing year.

Art. 15.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of poor for the ensuing year.

Art. 16.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 17.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 as a special appropriation to be used and expended on the Winship hill, so-called.

Art. 18.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 as a special appropriation to be used and expended on the road from town house to the Whitten corner, so-called.

Art. 19.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 as a special appropriation to be used and expended on the road from the iron bridge to the top of Vickery hill.

Art. 20.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year.

Art. 21.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of its state aid highway under the provisions of section 9 and 18 of chapter 130 of the public laws of 1916.

Art. 22.—To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid road as provided in section 19 of chapter 25 of the revised statutes of 1916.

Art. 23.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the improvement of the section of

state aid highway as outlined in the report of the state highway commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of roads and bridges under the provisions of section 18, chapter 25 of the revised statutes of 1916 or under the provisions of section 21, chapter 25 R. S., amended by chapter 258 P. L. 1917.

Art. 24.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for elementary and secondary schools including teachers' wages, fuel, janitor service, textbooks, reference books, school supplies and conveyance of scholars for the ensuing year.

Art. 25.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of school buildings for the ensuing year.

Art. 26.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for insurance and lights of school buildings.

Art. 27.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the teacher of agriculture in its high school for the ensuing year.

Art. 28.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for agriculture equipment.

Art. 29.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$330.00 to pay for lighting the streets as per contract with Central Maine Power Co.

Art. 30.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,100.00 to pay outstanding schoolhouse bond and interest.

Art. 31.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay bridge note of \$1,000.00 due August 22, 1929.

Art. 32.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$198.00 to pay interest on outstanding bridge notes.

Art. 33.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries for the ensuing year.

Art. 34.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the extermination of white pine blister

rust within the limits of the town, in co-operation with state and federal funds for the purpose.

Art. 35.—To see if the town will instruct the superintending school committee to elect a school physician.

Art. 36.—To see if the town by its vote will instruct the selectmen to take up the mortgage on the Geo. L. Whitten place, held by the City National Bank of Belfast and if so instruct them to hire necessary money for the term of one year.

Art. 37.—To see if the town by its vote will accept the sum of \$200.00 from the Arline B. Stevens estate, the income of which to be used for a perpetual care of the Joseph C. Stevens lot in the Whitten cemetery, so-called, opposite the Pond cemetery.

Art. 38.—To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money to pay town bills until its taxes are collected.

Art. 39.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for machine work on patrol road in conjunction with the state.

Art. 40.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$85.00 to match state department of health funds for the support of county public health nursing to continue work with mothers and children which is now being carried on entirely by the state department of health.

Art. 41.—To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to hire a tractor and if so raise money for the same.

Art. 42.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the state of Maine.

Art. 43.—To see if the town will vote to go 50-50 with Adams, Pelliter and Glines in building a concrete sidewalk in front of the new brick block, estimated cost to be \$150.00, and if so raise money for same.

Art. 44.—To see if the town will vote to build a gravel sidewalk from the corner by the new brick block to the grade schoolhouse and if so raise money for the same.

Art. 45.—To see what means the town will take to erect guide posts and guide boards within the limits of town.

Art. 46.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appro-

priate \$300.00 to be expended in draining and filling bad mud holes, beginning on Grady road, so-called, and continuing on R. F. D. route to J. B. Vickery's.

Art. 47.—To see what percent of a special resolve the town will vote to raise and appropriate to be used with said resolve as a joint fund for road construction on Waterville road, so-called.

Art. 48.—To see if the town will vote to pay necessary expenses of their road commissioner to attend annual highway school at the University of Maine.

Art. 49.—To see if the town will vote to abate the following taxes: Nathan Chase, \$5.20; Robert Cochan, \$3.00; Wm. Stevens, \$5.20; Mrs. W. M. Small, \$2.64; and Wm. Powers, \$4.40; all 1924 taxes and also 1925 tax, Charles Bowman, \$8.60.

Art. 50.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for school lavatory.

Art. 51.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay outstanding bills.

Art. 52.—To see if the town will vote to allow such bills and accounts as may be laid before them.

Art. 53.—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session one hour prior to said meeting for the purpose of correcting list of voters.
