# School Report

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## **To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Unity:**

It is with pleasure and a degree of pride that I submit this, my ninth annual report of your schools together with the financial statement.

We have had the same force of teachers for two consecutive years, which has been very beneficial to the rural schools where they have shown a marked improvement in scholarship.

Your schools speak for themselves. A high standard is maintained throughout the grades yet it is very seldom that a student fails. I know that it is natural for parents to enjoy having their children stand well in the grade, but I can not understand why they feel so badly when he fails to make the grade, because when this happens that child becomes the leader in the grade to which he is demoted. To all I report not a single hopeless child in the grades.

A child who enters school at the age of five is ready to graduate from high school before he is seventeen, and this is just the time when he should be in school especially if a little slow. Too many rate the future success of their child by his school rank. I once heard Jacob Riis say, "I always stood next to the head of my class when in a circle." Upon examination you will find that many who distinguish themselves are those who work

hardest.

Upon examination of our financial standing you will see that we have kept within our appropriations. To do this it necessitated a large cut in salary which your teachers accepted graciously. Quite a large amount of tuition remains unpaid, but next year the tuition will not be as much as it is based on the cost per capita. This means that we cannot maintain our schools thirty-six weeks on the same appropriation as last year. I believe that everybody is satisfied that the teachers should not receive any less than at present.

### REPAIRS

A few necessary repairs that our limited means would warrant have been made namely new steps at the grade building to safeguard your children and repair work in the laboratory to take care of waste water.

It will necessitate a large appropriation this year as both buildings need shingling and too the high school building has begun to spread at the eaves and in order to safeguard the money already in the building it should receive immediate attention.

### HIGH SCHOOL

For three consecutive years the same corps of teachers has been in the school, and their work is very satisfactory both in the class room and outside activities. We have every reason to be pleased with the achievements of the school in scholarship and morals.

We have had more parents to visit our schools this year than usual, but I make this call for more. We welcome you and urge that you visit with your children and observe the work they are doing. It is in this way only that you can come to appreciate the teaching service they are receiving.

In closing I wish to thank all for the support they have given their schools, and take this opportunity to solicit their continuance and trust that you will understand that a larger amount is necessary in repairs than ever before.

I assure you that your committee have given not only special attention to our problems but have taken time to investigate and have considered all sides.

To the teachers for the loyalty to our profession, and for the splendid manner in which you have gone about your work, after taking a cut in salary, is recognized by all.

In closing, I wish to express my sincere thanks to the committee for the keen interest they have displayed and for their unwavering support.

# Town Warrant

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**To Alton McCormick a Constable in the town of Unity,  
in the County of Waldo, State of Maine.**

**Greeting:**

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Unity, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Lower Hall, Odd Fellows Building in said town on the 12th day of March, A. D., 1934 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose by ballot a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose by ballot a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To choose by ballot necessary Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 4. To choose by ballot one member of the School Committee for a term of three years.
- Art. 5. To choose a Road Commissioner and establish pay for same.
- Art. 6. To choose all other necessary town officers.

- Art. 7. To see what method the town will take in relation to collection of taxes for said town for the ensuing year and to see if the town will allow a rebate or discount on all property taxes paid on or before certain date or dates and if so establish such date or dates.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the payment of rebate or discount on taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will by its vote, set the time when its taxes, assessed and committed for collection for the year 1934 shall become due.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of town officers.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of town roads, bridges, and cutting bushes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for plowing snow on the improved and unimproved roads in town or act thereon as they see fit.
- Art. 13. To establish by vote the price of labor per hour for trucks, horses and men employed on town roads.
- Art. 14. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of State Aid Highway under the patrol system.

- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 to be used in conjunction with the State on patrolled road.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$330.00 for lighting the Village streets in Unity Village as per contract with the Central Maine Power Company.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Cemeteries.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay on Meadow Bridge Note and Well Notes.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art. 20. To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission (in highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.
- Art. 21. To see what sum if any the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with

the provisions of Chapter 271, Public Laws 1931.

- Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Elementary and Secondary schools including teachers' wages, fuel, janitor service, textbooks, reference books, supplies, tuition and conveyance of scholars for the ensuing year.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of school buildings for the ensuing year.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for school lights and insurance on school buildings.
- Art. 25. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 26. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Teaching Agriculture.
- Art. 27. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for agricultural equipment.
- Art. 28. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Laboratory Supplies.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to accept \$100.00 from the estate of Virginia B. Gerry to be held in trust and the interest of said sum be used for the perpetual care of the family lot in Pond Cemetery containing the graves of Joseph Mitchell, Almira Mitchell, Horace Mitchell, and his wife Hattie Mitchell.

- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$257.00 for salary of Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for purchasing snow fence, if so, how much.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$483.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of third class roads or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of third class roads.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$240.00 for the repair of Special Resolve Road as provided by law.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to make it obligatory for men who work on the road or sell material for same to pay a certain part of their town order to the Collector to be applied on their taxes, if so, how much?
- Art. 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to convert the Kelley School-house into a dwelling house.
- Art. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay the town's part of any Federal Project we may have approved.
- Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to pay town bills until taxes are collected.

Art. 38. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session one hour prior to said meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
