# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Unity:

I hereby submit the following report on the condition of your Schools for the fiscal year 1937-38.

#### COMMON SCHOOLS

The total enrollment of the common schools is 121, of this number there are but 39 pupils in the three outside rural schools. It is costing \$40 per pupil in the rural school against \$25 in the Village graded school. It would seem to be most economical in the long run to consolidate all your schools in the village.

Mrs. Ward was elected to the Farwells Corner school. Mrs. Doris Mollison to the Woods school and Mrs. Fogg to the Worth school. The teachers in the Village grades remain in the same as last year. All these teachers are experienced and have proven very satisfactory.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

There has been a complete change in the high school staff this year. Mr. Crockett the principal came to us with 9 years experience and has proven an able administrator and teacher. Miss Fuller, assistant in the high school, while not having had any previous experience has proved to be an excellent teacher. These two teachers have been car-

rying on the work of three. This is the only high school in this section which has only two teachers, teaching the regular secondary subjects. Another teacher is needed badly. We are going to be handicapped another year in offering all the necessary subjects required to keep this school up to a grade A standard. An increase of 5 more tuition students and by putting the Agriculture and Home Economics teachers on a full time basis would more than pay the salary of another teacher.

#### HOME ECONOMICS

This year for the first time we have started a course in Home Economics. 28 girls are taking this course. This number will be increased another year. This is a full four year course.

Miss Anora Peavey an experienced teacher and a graduate of U. of M. was elected for the position. Besides her teaching she is Dean of girls and coaches girls basketball. This course will prove of great benefit for the girls of this community and for those that come here from surrounding towns. Unity H. S. is now the only school in Waldo County which offers both Home Economics and Agriculture. We should be proud that we are pioneering these practical courses to young people.

#### AGRICULTURE

The course in agriculture is now under the leadership of Mr. Braley a graduate of U. of M. Mr. Braley is Lean of Boys and coaches boys athletics. This course has been rearranged and the standard brought up to a higher level. There are about 35 boys taking this course.

#### REPAIRS

Our school buildings at present time are in fair condition, but there is much needed work to be done. This year we are had to put in a new septic tank and sewer. The ceiling in the main room of the high school has had to be strengthened.

I offer the following suggestions which should be carried out during the next two or three years.

- 1. Painting the high school this year.
- 2. Putting the remaining partition in the main room of the high school. This should be done for safetys sake as well as to bring the capacity of the H. S. up to 100 students.
- 3. The high school building will have to have a stee! roof by another year.
- 4. When this roof is fixed dormer windows should be put in on the east and west sides and the large attics should be finished off for class rooms. This would enable you to bring the 7 and 8th grades into the high school building and make it possible to consolidate all schools in the Village. This arrangement would save the Town \$400.00 per year, over present costs.

# WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Alton McCormick, a Constable in the Town of Unity, in the County of Waldo and State of Maine.

#### Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Unity in said County qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to assemble at the Lower Hall, Odd Fellow's Building in said Town of Unity on Monday the fourteenth day of March A. D., 1938 at ten o'clock in the forenoon then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for said Town for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Collector, Treasurer and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To choose by ballot three selectmen for said Town for the ensuing year.

- Art. 5. To choose by ballot three Assessors, for said Town for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To choose by ballot three Overseers of the Poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To choose by ballot one or more Road Commissioners or act thereon as they see fit.
  - Art. 8. To establish pay for Road Commissioner.
- Art. 9. To choose necessary School Committee for said Town for a term of three years.
- Art. 10. To choose one or more Constables for said Town for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To establish pay for labor per hour for men, horses and trucks.
- Art. 12. To see what method the Town will take in relation to Collection of Taxes for the ensuing year and to see if the town will vote to allow a rebate or discount on property taxes paid on or before certain date or dates and if so established such date or dates.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for rebate or discount on taxes.

- Art. 14. To see if the Town will by its vote set the time when its taxes assessed and committed for collection for the year 1938 shall become due.
- Art. 15. To choose a Collector of Taxes for said Town for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To choose a Treasurer for said Town for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To choose a Fire Warden for said Town for the ensuing year.
- Art. 18. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for each of the following purposes:
  - (a) For Salaries of Town Officers.
  - (b) For repair of Town Roads.
  - (c) For repair of Town Bridges.
  - (d) For cutting bushes on Improved Roads.
  - (e) For Snow Removal.
  - (f) For Street Lights.
  - (g) For Care of Cemeteries.

- (h) For Support of Schools.
- (i) For Library Reference Books.
- (i) For Industrial Education.
- (k) For Repair of School Buildings.
- (1) For Insurance on School Buildings.
- (m) For Lights and Power for Schools.
- (n) For the Support of Poor.
- (o) For Mother's Aid and Dependent Children.
- (p) For State Aid Road Patrol.
- (q) For Maintenance of Resolve Road.
- (r) For Miscellaneous Expenses.
- (s) For Maintenance of Third Class Road.
- Art. 20. To see what sum, if any the Town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads in excess of the requirements of Sec. 2, Chapter 132 P. L., 1935.
- Art. 21. To see what sum the Town will appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways and Bridges) under the provisions of Section 19 Chapter 28 Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Section 3 Chapter 229 Public Laws of 1937.

- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the School Committee to appoint a School Physician.
- Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deeds for such property.
- Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 from Annie Tilton of Troy. The income of said sum to be used for the perpetual care of the double lot of James Libby, Jr., and Charles Stroples in Pond Cemetery, so called.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to match a like sum to be furnished by the American Legion for the purpose of purchasing a suitable memorial to perpetuate the memory of the World War Veterans of the Town of Unity.
- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept twenty-five dollars from Carrie L. Miller of Lawrence to be put with the twenty-five dollars already received. The income of said amount to be used for the perpetual care of Francis Brooks Lot in Fowler Cemetery, so called.
- Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to close the Farwell's Corner School, so called.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to legalize baseball on Sundays.

- Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to recommend the road leading from Farwell's Corner, so called, to Thorn-dike Town line by way of Albert Tweedie's Home, as Third Class Road.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for trimming the shade trees in the Village streets.
- Art. 31. To see if the Town will vote to make it obligatory for those who have Town Orders to pay 25% or more of such orders to the Collector of Taxes.
- Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money to pay Town bills in anticipation of taxes collected.
- Art 33. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell and dispose of the OLD TOWN HOUSE, so called, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quit claim deed for such property.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town of Unity will accept from the estate of the late George W. Varney two hundred dollars. The interest on the same to be used for the care of the Varney Lot in the Friend's Cemetery and to help keep the fence in order around the yard.
- Art. 35. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 more or less for perambulating town lines.

Art 36. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of the Kelley School House, so called, on such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute a quit claim deed for such property.

Art<sub>ii</sub> 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in behalf of the Town of Unity to contract with some suitable party to remove the snow from our winter roads.

Art. 38. To choose any committee, hear the report of any and act thereon.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Selectmen's office from one o'clock until five o'clock P. M. on the three secular days preceding the Town meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
