

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Superintending School Committee and the citizens of Unity.

I hereby submit the following report on the condition of your schools for the fiscal year 1938-1939.

COMMON SCHOOLS

The total enrollment of the common schools is 145. This is an increase of 24 over last year. This increase has made for a very crowded and unsatisfactory condition in the Village School. If this condition continues we shall be forced to make certain changes to meet the new demands. Let me call your attention to the fact that it costs the taxpayers \$44.16 for each pupil going to our rural schools, while the cost is only \$24.60 for each pupil going to the village graded school. Economy in money alone warrants your serious thought towards consolidation.

New elementary teachers this year are, Margaret Dalzell, Farwell Cor. Avis H. Smith, Farwells Cor. Lillian Libby, Worth; and Rachel Libby, Wood.

HIGH SCHOOL

The high school this year has a total registration of 83 students. There will be a slight increase in this number another year. It is impossible for two teachers to handle a school of this size, and teach the necessary subjects as we will have to another year, so we find it necessary to add another teacher to the staff, to teach the secondary subjects. Certain regulations make this imperative if we are to maintain a class A standard school. A plan has been worked out so that we may have this added teacher at no extra cost to the taxpayers if the recommendations of the school committee are carried out.

Mr. Crockett is Principal for the second year, and Margaret Higgins is taking the place of Miss Fuller who resigned. The school is in good shape and maintaining a high standard of scholarship in spite of the heavy load thrown upon the teaching staff.

HOME ECONOMICS

This is the second year we have had this course, and already it has more than shown its value. 30 girls or 72% of all the girls in school are taking this course. Next year this number will be increased still more. We can not ignore the demand of such a large percentage of our students for a course of this kind. Miss Elizabeth Mitchell a U. of M. graduate teaches the course. She is proving to be an excellent teacher and a help to our community.

MANUAL ARTS

The School Committee and the Supt. recommend substituting a course in manual arts in place of the agricultural course. An article is in the warrant to be acted upon at town meeting to effect this change. A careful survey has been made in regards to making this change.

Results of the survey show the following:

1. There is little interest in the agriculture course itself.
2. The enrollment in the course has decreased the last two years.
3. Only 5 boys out of the 24 now taking the course are potential farmers.
4. Out of the 75 boys who are now enrolled in the elementary schools of this town, 26 can be said to live on farms, of this number not over 10 are potential farmers or an average of about 1 per year who might benefit by taking agriculture.
5. The cost of this course for the few who will benefit from it is hardly sound economy.

Some things in favor of a Manual Arts course:

1. The 75% of the boys in school, and all of the boys in

the 7th and 8th grade who will take this course should be carefully considered.

2. 98% of our boys and girls are dependent upon their high school training to establish themselves in life.
3. It seems evident that we should train these young people in some occupational trade to which they are best adapted, in order that they may take their rightful place in the community.
4. Training is given in the following trades. Carpentry, Metal Working, Auto Mechanics, Electricity, Concrete, Leather and Printing.
5. This course would include those in the 7th and 8th grades as well as the high school.
6. From the survey made it was found that while 20% of the boys might demand agriculture, at least 75% would demand a course such as suggested above.

I believe we are justified only in spending our money to do good to the greatest number instead of the few.

REPAIRS

Repairs and upkeep of school buildings are expensive. When repairs are made they should be of a permanent nature. All repairs made during the past two years have been permanent. The following program is recommended during the next three years so as to distribute the burden of cost as much as possible.

1. Remodeling the high school to provide for 2 extra class rooms.
2. Putting a metal roof on the H. S. building. This will have to be done this summer anyway.
3. Finish renovating the interior of the H. S. building and putting in the partition in the main room.
4. Rebuilding the stairways in the H. S. building. They

are unsafe at present time.

The above recommendations are major repairs. Some of this must be done immediately and the rest within three years or the cost will be prohibitive if you are suddenly faced with the problem of doing it all at once.

SCHOOL BUDGET FOR 1939-40

The school committee has prepared the following budget for the coming year. The figures represent the actual cost of running our schools. This budget if accepted, and the course in manual arts substituted for agriculture, will give one extra teacher in the high school and add a course which will be of great benefit to our young people. The total amount is about \$425. more than was raised last year and this has all been added to the repairs account.

The enrollment for our common schools show 145 pupils. This is an increase of 24 pupils over last year.

The High School had 81 register last year and 83 this year an increase of 2.

There are a total of 36 tuition students for the first half school year. This is an increase of 2 over last year.

CONCLUSION

This has been a profitable year in our schools for the most part. The trend for the school of the future seems almost too fantastic to believe but yet it is working out practically in several states at the present time. Geographically Unity is well located to be the center of a consolidated school system which will include at least four towns. This type of system is more economical and much more efficient than the system we have today.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

March 13, 1939

To Alton McCormick, a Constable of the Town of Unity in the County of Waldo.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Unity, in said County qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the Lower Hall, Odd Fellows Building, in said town on Monday, the thirteenth day of March, A. D. 1939, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said Meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 4 To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioner, Clerk and other Town Officers.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 more or less for the purpose of widening and ditching our town roads, so they will be acceptable to the state for plowing snow for the ensuing year.

Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 more or less for making and repairing roads and bridges for the ensuing year.

Art. 7. To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the assessors to rescind any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway Construction in excess of the amount required to meet State Apportionments.

Art. 9. To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L. 1935.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$632.00 for the maintenance of improved sections of third class roads or to be used in conjunction with the state apportionment for the construction of third class roads.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 more or less for maintenance of resolve roads.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 more or less for patrol maintenance on improved roads.

Art. 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to the removal of snow from our town roads for the ensuing year.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal for the ensuing year.

Art. 15 To see if the town will vote to raise and ap-

appropriate the sum of \$330.00 for lighting Village Streets for the ensuing year.

Art. 16 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 more or less for the care of cemeteries for the ensuing year.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,150.00 more or less for elementary and secondary schools, including teachers' wages, fuel, janitors' service, conveyance, textbooks, reference books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 more or less for insurance of school buildings.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 more or less for lights and power for Schools.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 more or less for repairs on school buildings.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 more or less for industrial education.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to substitute a Course in Manual Arts in place of the Agricultural Course.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$275.00 for salary of superintendent of schools.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 more or less for support of the poor.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 more or less for Mothers' Aid and the care of dependent children.

Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and ap-

appropriate the sum of \$500.00 more or less for miscellaneous expenses.

Art. 27. To see if the town will by its vote set the time when it's taxes assessed and committed for collection for the year 1939 shall become due.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen, on behalf of the town of Unity, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they deem advisable and to execute quitclaim deeds for such property.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money to pay town bills in anticipation of taxes collected.

Art. 30. To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the various town officers for the ensuing year what compensation for labor on public roads.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for 50-50 road.

Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$962.50 to pay the various town officers for services rendered for the municipal year 1938.

Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 more or less for cutting bushes on improved roads.

Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$66.00 to pay rent of Masonic Hall for the unemployed Compensation Beneficiaries.

Art. 35. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for trimming or removing trees in the limits of the road.

Art. 36. To see if the Town of Unity will vote to accept One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) in trust, the principal to be kept intact and the income therefrom to be used for the perpetual care of the lot of J. H. Damon in the Cemetery in Unity Village, as provided in the will of Linnie D. Mathews late of Waterville, Maine. Deceased.

Art. 37. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 more or less for the purpose of lighting Park Street, so called.

Art. 38. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 more or less for fencing grounds at Grammar School.

Art. 39. To see if the town will vote to allow an abatement of 2% more or less on all property taxes paid before July 1, 1939.

Art. 40. To see if the town will vote to make it obligatory for all who have town orders, to pay 50% more or less of such order to the tax collector to be applied on his unpaid taxes.

Art. 41. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 more or less for tarring improved roads.

Art. 42. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 the income of which is to be used for the perpetual care of George Benton Pillsbury, R. B. Pillsbury and G. B. Pillsbury lots in Pond Cemetery.

Art. 43. To choose any committee, hear the report of any and act thereon.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Selectmen's Office from one o'clock until four o'clock P. M. on the three secular days preceeding the Town Meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of

voters.
