School Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Unity;

I hereby submit the following report on the condition of your schools for the fiscal year 1942-1943.

COMMON SCHOOLS

There have been no changes in the common schools from last year. We have enriched the elementary program to meet the demands of the war emergency. The 7th and 8th grade boys and girls are taking the industrial arts course twice a week. They have shown a great deal of interest in these courses and they have turned out some fine pieces of work.

HIGH SCHOOL

There have been three changes in the teaching staff this year. Miss Johnson, F.S.N.S. is teaching Home Ec-Miss Jones is teaching History and Biology. Mrs. Blake is teaching Math and Science. To meet the demands of the Federal Government and the StateDept. we have added courses in radio-aeronautics-physical fitness and Miliary Drill. We have secured the services of ES. Farwell who has been qualified by the State Dept. and State Adjunt General to give the course in Military drill. Since Christmas we have condensed our daily program with the approval of the State Dept. so that we may close the High School year much earlier than usual. All these changes are working out very well. Following is the report on the inspection of the High School Building by Earl Hutchinson, State Director of Secondary Education.

Dear Mr. McKechnie:

I am writing to report to you on my visit to Unity High School. I found the program well organized and the schedule running smoothly. I would judge that your teachers are doing well. I think your practical shop program is one from which the boys of your community will profit considerably. The chief deficiences of the school lie in the up keep of the building. sider it one of the poorer school plants in respect to its state of repair. For example parts of ceilings need to be replastered both because of appearence and because of safty. A program of painting and renovation should be inaugurated which, when carried over two or three years should have the building once more in good condition. This is not only economically sound, but it has found that youngesters respect school property more, take greater pride in their community and have generally a better attitude towards their work when the building in which they are housed has been kept in good repair. I thought the Laboratory was weak in that it had no sink for liquid waste disposal. I assume that you have checked annually on the safety of the drinking water.

I will appreciate hearing from you when any repairs or corrections have been made. Please feel free to call upon me if there is anything I can do to be of assistance. I would like as you would to see Unity High School have a high rating in this office.

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

Several visits have been made to the schools, both in the Village and at Farwells Cor. and Woods. The general health has been good. Aside from sporadic cases of mumps there has been no contagious diseases of any account.

In the spring of 1942 Small Pox Vaccination was

administered, and Antityphoid innoculations were given. This clears up this problem in so far as those parents requested the treatment is concerned. A larger proportion of those in school were cared for than has been the case heretofore and this menace to the health of the community from these sources has been taken care of.

In December Diptheria Toxoid was administered to those whose parents requested said treatment, two doces being given at the prescribed intervals and this included the children attending the schools in the Village, at Farwells Cor. and Woods.

It is the intention to proceed with this means of protection each year so that all may be reached.

INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION

There have been some changes in our Industrial Education set up from last year. Mr. Johnson was called into the Army in September and we were unable to secure another teacher to take his place. We had to drop the course in agriculture for this reason.

We were fortunate to secure the services of Mr. Crockett to teach Manual Arts course. He was qualified by the State Dept. We are now running a shop course in wood working, metals, and electricity. A great deal of interest is shown in these courses as they have provided direct training in essential war work.

Our Home Economic Dept. is functioning under the direction of Miss. Johnson. She has directed the training along the lines of household repairs etc as well as in cooking and sewing. She has charge of the NYA work and also the Noon Lunch program.

The elementary enrollment has dropped 25 below that of last year. The High School enrollment has dropped about 20 below last year. The decrease is due largely to families moving to defense areas during the emergency.

CONCLUSION

In times like these it is very difficult to plan ahead for any length of time. Some things in a report of this kind have to do with long time planning. The budget is prepared in February for the coming 12 months. With many factors effecting our schools it is hard to say what we will have for schools next fall. The shortage of teachers and conveyance seem to be the two major problems confronting us at present. The available supply of teachers will not be enough to go around next fall. This means closing schools when we can not get teachers. The closing of schools from lack of teachers mean the conveyance of these pupils to other schools, and we are lacking in proper facilities for conveyance. These factors are going to effect your boys and girls this coming year. Any plans that we make at this time must be so flexible

that they can be changed and readjusted to fit various conditions as they arise.

I have made certain recommendations each year in regards to the finishing off of the two attic rooms for class-room use. If we are forced to close one or both of the outside rural schools this coming year those rooms will have to be used or you will have to send some of your elementary boys and girls to some other town and pay their tuition and conveyance there. It is also possible that some near by town would have the same problem of having to close their schools and wish to send their scholars here.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING UNITY, MAINE

MARCH 8, 1943

To Alton McCormick, a Constable of the Town of Unity, in the County of Waldo, State of Maine.

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Unity, in said County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Lower Hall, Odd Fellows Building, in said Town on Monday the eighth day of March, A. D. 1943, at ten o'clock in the forenoon

Then and there to act on the following articles, namely;

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45.00 more or less, for repairs on school buildings.

- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of all tax titles held by the town, on such terms as they deem advisable and to issue quitclaim deeds for such property.
- Art. 30. To see if the town will by its vote, set the time when its taxes assessed and committed to the tax collector for the year 1943 shall become due.
- Art. 31. To see what action the town will take in relation to collection of taxes for said town for the ensuing year and establish the price of collecting.

- Art. 36. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Maude E. Conforth, the income of said sum to be used for the perpetual care of Rufus B. Bither's and Leonard Cornforth's lot in Pond Cemetery, so called, in Unity.
- Art. 37 To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Maud E. Cornforth, the income from

said sum to be used for the perpetual care of lots of Nathan Allen Cates and Mott Allen Cates in Pond Cemetery, so called, in Unity

Art. 38 To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from the estate of B. Frank Kelley, the income of said sum to be used for the perpetual care of the Benjamin F. Kelley lot in Pond Cemetery, so called, in Unity.
