## SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and citizens of Unity.

I hereby submit the following report on the conditions of your schools for the fiscal year, 1946-1947.

#### COMMON SCHOOLS

The list of teachers in our elementary schools are as follows. Seventh and eighth grades, Mrs. Erskine with 24 years experience; fifth and sixth grades, Miss Moulton With 30 years experience; second, third, and fourth grade, Mrs. Morgan with 10 years experience; primary and first grades, Mrs. Reynolds with 13 years experience. Woods school, Mrs. Nickless with 2 years experience.

It can be seen from the above that we have an able, experienced staff of teachers who are producing good results.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

The high school faculty is as follows: Principal Mr. Hicks, Colby, A. B., M. S. with 10 years experience; assisant, Mrs. McKechnie, Colby, A. B. with 8 years experience; assistant, Mrs. Hicks, Colby, A. B. with 16 years experience; Home Economics Miss Kelley, Farmington Teachers College, B. S. with 2 years experience; Agriculture, Mr. Bagley, University of Maine, B. S. with 2 years. experience.

We have an excellent group of teachers who are maintaining a high standard of instruction. Your high school has a very high rating with the State Department of Education, both from the stand point of instruction and type of courses offered. The high school teachers and Mrs. Erskine have enrolled in the workshop extension

course and are devoting one night per week attending classes at Waterville.

#### INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION

Miss Kelley returned to teach Home Economics again this year. Her girls have shown much improvement in their class work. She also supervises the preparation of the hot lunches for the high school students. Mr. Farrow resigned as Manual Training teacher and we were fortunate to be able to hire Mr. Bagley to teach agriculture. We had to drop this course during the past four years due to shortage of teachers. Mr. Bagley is doing an excellent job in starting the course again in this school. He also has charge of the Veterans on the Farm Training class.

#### SCHOOL BUILDINGS

At present time we are using three buildings for school purposes. All these buildings are in need of extensive repairs if they are to meet the requirements of the law. The school committee have investigated carefully the condition of these buildings and listed below are things which in their minds need immediate attention.

Grade School Building-

- 1. Heating Plant
- 2. Painting Outside
- 3. New Plumbing in Toilets
- 4. New Lighting System
- 5. Sixty New Seats

High School Building-

- 1. Painting Outside and Roof
- 2. Repair of Foundation
- 3. Refitting and Weatherstripping Windows
- 4. Rebuilding Stairways
- 5. Finishing Off of Attic Room on West Side
- 6. Lighting System
- 7. One Hundred New Seats
- 8. New Plumbing in Toilets

#### Woods-

- 1. Shingling Roof
- 2. Rebuilding Chimney

In the grade building the heating plant is in bad condition and may play out at any time.

The last time the building was painted was twelve years ago. It has weathered badly.

The toilets are set on flooring which has ratted out and is unsanitary. More flush closets should be added.

For years the pupils have had to study in poorly lighted rooms. An up-to-date lighting system is needed.

New seats are needed to replace worn out and broken ones and to take care of the increase in pupils.

The high school building presents a problem in where to begin first. As we reported last year, the foundation has rotted out in the basement and allowed the building to settle in the center. This has thrown the stairways out of line and caused the treads to spread. It has thrown the whole building out of line, affecting doors, windows and cracked the walls. This condition has become worse during the past year.

The building was last painted outside nine years ago. The roof should also be painted to preserve it.

Refitting of windows and rebuilding stairways should be done after foundation has been fixed.

The west attic room will be needed within the next two years to take care of increased enrollment in elementary and high schools.

The lighting system can be improved at less expense than in the grade building. New seats are needed to replace worn out and broken ones and to take care of increased enrollment.

The toilets are inadequate to take care of the number of pupils and should be raised above the level at which they are now set.

At the Woods school, the roof needs shingling and probably will need new boarding also. The chimney

should be rebuilt to be safe to use. It now presents a fire hazard.

All the above repairs should be done within the next two years. These things have been accumulating during the past 8 or 10 years and nothing has been done about it.

It is the duty of the town to provide proper school facilities. It is the duty of the school committee to recommend proper facilities so they can keep the schools going under the law.

The above repairs will cost the town a lot more money now than if they had been taken care of when they first began to develop and spread over a period of years. All the things listed above can be plainly seen by any citizen who cares to investigate the matter.

## Unity High School

Freshmen, 11 boys, 6 girls; Sophomores 7 boys, 11 girls; Juniors, 6 boys, 7 girls; Seniors, 4 boys, 5 girls; Post Graduate, boy, 1.

It is expected that the elementary enrollment will increase slightly next year.

Unless unforseen factors develop the high school enrollment should increase to about 80 students next year.

#### Conclusion

The teacher shortage is still acute and will continue to be so unless we can attract more people into the teaching profession. To do this, I believe we should—1. Pay higher salaries. 2. provide better working conditions.

3. provide better security for teachers. 4. provide adequate pension. These things can not all come at once but a start is being made by the Maine Legislature to provide higher salaries and better pensions. Better working conditions and more security for teachers on the job will have to be provided by the various towns at present time.

I would like to point out again as I did last year that the amount of Insurance coverage on our school buildings is very inadequate to even partially cover any loss by fire. We should take heed by what happened in Freedom.

I would also like to mention that school costs and services demanded by the citizens of the town have gone up this year same as in other things. This, of course increased your budget and school appropriations. Your school rate will be about 21 mills, based on appropriation asked for by your school committee in their budget. This equalization money from the state which amounts to \$3,800 this year.

I wish to extend at this time, my sincere thanks to the teachers, school committee and citizens of the town for their cooperation in making the schools of Unity of such high standard.

# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Unity, Maine, March 10, 1947

To Alton McCormick, a constable of the Town of Unity in the County of Waldo, State of Maine.

#### Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Unity, in said Waldo County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Lower Hall, Odd Fellows Building, in said town on Monday the Tenth Day of March, A. D. 1947 at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, Superintendent of Schools, Clerk and other Town Officers
- Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$799.50 for construction of State Aid Road, under the provisions of the statutes for State Aid highway construction.
- Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for repairs of roads and bridges for the ensuring year.
- Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$509.00 for maintenance of im-

proved sections of our third class roads, or to be used for the construction of third-class roads if not needed for actual maintenance purposes.

- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the maintenance of our resolve roads.
- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$858.00 for Patrol maintenance for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see whether or not the Town will vote to enter into a contract with Central Maine Power Company for a term of ten (10) years, whereby, in consideration of the furnishing of street lighting service to the town during the term of said contract, all as more fully set forth in the contract, copy of which has been presented to this meeting, the town will pay for such street lighting service in accordance with the Company's municipal street lighting rate-contract basis.
- Art.10. To see what action the Town will take with reference to authorizing the Selectmen to execute and deliver the contract referred to in the preceding article.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting in Unity Village for the ensuing year, on contract basis it is \$390.00.
- Art. 12. To see whether or not the Town will vote to enter into a contract with Central Maine Power Company for a term of twenty (20) years, whereby, in consideration of the extension by the Company of its lines along the Waterville Road, in said Town, and in consideration of such additional line extensions as may be constructed along said road or roads in said town under the terms of the contract, and in consideration of the Company's furnishing electric energy during the term of the contract for lighting the Grammar School in said town,

the town will pay to the Company for the term of the contract for the electric service furnished in connection with lighting said Grammar School in accordance with the Company's schedule of rates for the type and character of service rendered and, in addition, will pay to the Company annually during the term of the contract, beginning with the effective date thereof, a sum equal to all taxes assessed, imposed or levied by the Town upon the line extensions constructed under the terms of the contract.

- Art. 13. To see what action the Town will take with reference to authorizing the Selectmen to execute and deliver the contract referred to in the preceeding article.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of Cemeteries in the Town of Unity for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the care of the poor for the ensuing year.
- Art, 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for elementary teachers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for High School teachers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for conveyance for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for schools, including Fuel, Janitor Service, Textbooks, Reference Books and school supplies for desk and laboratory use.
- Art. 20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Industrial Education

(including Home Economics, Manual Training or Agriculture).

- Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$261.62 for insurance on school property for the ensuing year.
- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to build a safety fence along the highway in front of the grade school building and raise money for same.
- Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to appoint a school building committee of five to make a survey of the school situation and report at the next Special or Regular Town Meeting.
- Art. 24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on school buildings for the ensuing year.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for lights and power for schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the school committee to appoint a school physician for the ensuing year.
- Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Mothers' Aid and care of dependent children for the ensuing year.
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for plowing snow in the Town of Unity for the ensuing year.
- Art. 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 30. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for salary of Superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.

- Art. 31. To see if the Town will, by its vote, set the time when its taxes assessed and committed to the tax collector for the year 1947, shall become due.
- Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to contract with some reliable party to plow snow on our roads in Unity, or act thereon as they see fit.
- Art. 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for miscellaneous expenses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell all property acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes and give deed for same.
- Art. 35. To see what action the Town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the ensuing year and establish the price of same.
- Art. 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue Town notes for a time not exceeding one year, the avails in payment of current expenses of the Town provided the same becomes necessary during the ensuing year.
- Art. 37. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for Public Health Nursing in Unity, the said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local services.
- Art. 38. To see whether or not the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the State Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 80, Section 95, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 39. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for repairs on road from

John Edgerly's Corner by Grady's to the Albion Town Line.

- Art. 40. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for construction of a sidewalk from L. H. Adams' store to the school house grounds.
- Art. 41. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for maintenance of Fire Department.
- Art. 42. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for Fire Hose and Nozzles.
- Art. 43. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen in behalf of the Town to accept the by-laws of the Unity Volunteer Fire Department.
- Art. 44. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to secure land for a Town Dump or act thereon as they see fit.
- Art. 45. To see if the Town will adopt an Ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Prohibiting the Dumping of Waste Material" which proposed ordinance shall read as follows:

- Art. 50. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Ada M. Longley, said sum to be invested and the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Ethel G. Brown lot in Pond Cemetery, so called.
- Art. 51. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the estate of J. A. Adams, said sum to be invested and the income of same to be used for the perpetual care of the J. A. Adams lot in Pond Cemetery, so called.
- Art. 52. To choose any committee, hear the report of any and act thereon.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the selectmen's office from one o'clock until four o'clock P. M. on the three secular days preceding the town meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.
