# SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Unity.

I hereby submit the following report on the condition of your schools for the fiscal year 1947-1948.

#### COMMON SCHOOLS

The teaching staff is as follows: 7-8 grades, Mrs. Erskine; 5-6 grades, Miss Robinson; 2-3-4 grades, Mrs. Willey; P-1 grades, Mrs. Reynolds; Woods School Mrs. Nickless. There has been an improvement in the standard of teaching this year due to better facilities and additional training which the teachers have had during the year.

#### HIGH SCHOOL

Prin. Mr. Hicks, Asst. Mrs. Hicks, Asst. Mrs. Mc-Kechnie, Home Ec., Miss Bradstreet; Agriculture Mr. Bagley. The same high standard that prevailed in past years have maintained this year. The courses and teaching has been fitted to the individual rather than trying to fit the pupil to a hard rigid program beyond his level of attainment.

#### INDUSTRIAL ARTS

Miss Bradstreet replaced Miss Kelley as teacher in Home Economics. She is understanding and efficient in her first year of teaching. She also coaches Girls' Athletics.

Mr. Bagley is completing his second year as Agriculture Instructor. It should be remembered that the course was started last year after a four year period, and that it

takes time to work up the course to its fullest efficiency. Mr. Bagley coaches Boys' Basketball.

#### VETERANS' TRAINING COURSE

This is a new course given under the direction of the State Department of Education and the Veterans' Administration to those Veterans of World War II who qualify for this training. There is no expense to the Town for running this course as the Government supports it under the G. I. Training program. Some 25 Veterans are enrolled at present time.

#### SCHOOL BUILDINGS

An excellent program of repairs and remodeling was approved by the Town last spring at the special town meeting. The Building Committee and the School Committee carried out certain projects during the summer. The program is about one half finished and it is hoped that it may be completed this year. What has been done seems to meet with the approval of the Citizens who have inspected the buildings. A report on the work done and costs will be found in the report of the building committee.

#### Unity High School

Freshmen, 19 boys-12 girls; Sophomores, 8 boys-5 girls; Juniors, 6 boys-9 girls; Seniors, 5 boys-8 girls.

How to take care of the increase in school enrollment with the present school facilities is our number one problem at present.

A comparison of figures show last year a total of 141 elementary students and 57 H.S. This year we have a total of 165 elementary and 72 H. S. Students. seems to be only the beginning of a larger school enroll-The present facilities will be inadequate to take care of all pupils. I have recommended to the School Committee that the 5-6th grades be moved to the H. S. Building in the Attic room which it is planned to finish off this summer, and hire an extra elementary teacher. In 1951 if the trend continues as at the present the 5-6th grades will have to be split with one grade to a room. This will take one of the rooms which the high school is now This would mean dropping either the Home Ec using. In 1953 the 7-8th course or the Agriculture course. grades would have to be separated to a room each thus taking a second room from high school use. This would mean dropping all Vocational courses and crowding 80 H. S. Students into 3 rooms.

We who are charged with providing schedules and programs to run the school as efficiently as possible have to face the facts, and unless added school facilities are provided in the near future then the above housing arrangement will in all probability have to be carried out.

#### Conclusion

The teacher shortage is more acute than it was a year ago. In spite of higher salaries and better working conditions it will be several years before we will be able to secure enough qualified teachers for our classrooms.

School costs are going to be much higher than they are now. In spite of the fact that the State has assumed more of the cost than ever before, the increasing burden

of taxes on real estate to carry the local cost is apparent to everyone. It would seem that broadening the tax base would help in taking the load off local property taxes to some extent

Good progress has been made in our schools this year. If we can continue to go forward I believe we can more nearly meet the needs of the individual than ever before.

I wish to thank the teachers, the school committee, the building committee and the citizens for their cooperation and help during the past year.

# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING UNITY, MAINE, MARCH 8, 1948

To Blake Goode, a constable of the Town of Unity, in the County of Waldo, State of Maine

#### Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Unity, in said Waldo County, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Lower Hall, Odd Fellows Building, in said town on Monday the Eighth day of March A. D. 1948 at ten o'clock in the forenoon. Then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderatior to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Collector, Superintendent of Schools, Clerk and other town officers.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$799.50 for construction of State Aid Road, under the provisions of the statutes for State Aid highway construction.
- Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for repairs of roads and bridges for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$509.00 for maintenance of improved sections of our third class roads.

- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the maintenance of our resolve roads for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$858.00 for Patrol Maintenance for the ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for street lighting in Unity Village for the ensuing year; on contract basis it is \$390.00.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the care of Cemeteries in Town of Unity for the ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the care of the poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for elementary and secondary schools, includinf teachers' wages, fuel, janitor services, conveyance, textbooks, reference books, school supplies for desk and laboratory use and lights and power.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Industrial Education, (including Home Economics and Agriculture).
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$261.62 for insurance for school property for the ensuing year.
- Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs on school buildings for the ensuing year, (to be used by School Committee).

- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to have a school building committee of five members appointed by the moderator and authorize this committee to look after repairs and make a further study of the school situation.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the school committee to appoint a school physician for the ensuing year.
- Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for Mothers' Aid and Care of Dependent Children for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for plowing snow in the Town of Unity for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 to pay Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for salary of superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will, by its vote, set the time when its taxes assessed and committed to the tax collector for the year 1948, shall become due.
- Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to contract with some reliable party to plow snow on our roads in Unity, or act thereon as they see fit.

- Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to use State Aid Road money to complete the road leading from Farwells' Corner to Thorndike town line.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00, more or less, to complete road leading from Farwells' Corner to Thorndike town line.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for maintenance of the Fire Department.
- Art. 33. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 to pay loan authorized at Special Town Meeting held May 23, 1947 to repair

foundation, windows and stair ways in the High School building.

- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for further repairs on High School building.
- Art. 35. To choose any committee, hear the report of any and act thereon.
