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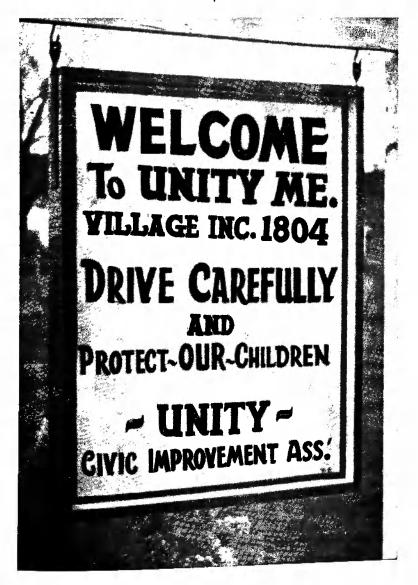

In the opinion of your public Health Nurse, and this opinion is shared by all of the leading health organizations, International, National and State, it means more careful study of our community health needs. SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Unity:

I hereby submit the following report on the conditions of your schools for the fiscal year 1948-1949.

Common Schools

The teaching staff is as follows: 7-8 grades, Mrs. Erskine; 5-6 grades, Miss Moulton; 3-4 grades, Mrs. Wood; 1-2 grades, Mrs. Braley; Primary, Mrs. Reynolds, Woods School, Mrs. Nickless.

This year for the first time the sub-primary has been placed by itself under the leadership of Mrs. Reynolds. This has been a great improvement in handling this group of beginners especially in making the desirable social adjustments so important to any child at the beginning of his school career. In the other grade rooms crowded conditions have lowered the efficiency of teaching somewhat. It is hoped that more favorable conditions may be available next year and that the teachers may utilize their abilities to better advantage.

High School

Prin. Mr. Littlefield, Asst. Mrs. McKechnie, Asst Mrs. Dunton, Home Ec. Miss Perkins, Agr. Mr. Bagley. The same high standards have been maintained this year as in the past. A new course in Social Living was introduced this year for a group of upper classmen. A testing program is under way. This all adds up to better guidance procedure for the individual students.

Industrial Arts

Miss Perkins replaced Miss Bradstreet as teacher of Home Economics. She is doing a fine job with her teaching and has been very successful in handling the girls' athletic activities.

Mr. Bagley is completing his third year as agriculture teacher. He is efficiently raising the standards of the course. He is coaching boys' basketball and his team has had a very successful year.

Veterans' Training Course

This Veterans-on-the-Farm Training course has been given here for the past two years. This course is supported under the G. I. training program. At present time there are 43 veterans enrolled. There is a 5-man teaching staff. This course has been of considerable financial gain to the taxpayers of the town. Some \$1700 worth of equipment has been purchased for the school. The school has also benefited by some \$1200 in the school fund this year.

School Buildings

This year the program of repairs as outlined under the Building Committee's Report has been continued. Both village schools are in reasonable good condition, further necessary repairs will be taken care of by the School Committee. It has been recommended that the following program should be carried out as soon as possible.

- 1. Repairing cellar wall, Grade building.
- 2. Building a fire escape from back room, Grade building.
- 3. Painting outside of Grade building.
- 4. Painting roof of High School building.

- Painting and renovating inside of High School building.
- 6. Purchase new seats for new elementary room.
- 7. Purchase of blackboards for new elementary room.
- 8. Installing an oil burner in High School boiler.
- 9. Installing a new pump in High School well.
- 10. Other changes and repairs of minor nature as they come up.

The set-up for grades next year will be as follows: if present policy is carried out: Grade School Bldg. P-1-2-3-4 grades as this year. High School Bldg. 5-6-7-8 grades 3 rooms on second floor. High School classes, 4 rooms on first floor.

Conclusion

The Committee has given much thought as to the problem of school facilities in the years to come. Because of crowded conditions and lack of class rooms the following policy for next year has been adopted. There will be no new tuition students accepted for H. S. beginning Sept. 1949. However, provision will be made to continue to take those who are enrolled this year until they have finished H. S. It has become necessary to drop the Home Economics Course and use that room for elementary grades. If the Woods school should be closed this will make a total or 77 pupils on second floor of H. S. Bldg. There will be some 80 odd students in 4 rooms on first floor of H. S. Bldg.

The shortage of elementary teachers is still acute. It is a problem we have to face and solve the best we can There should be sufficient regular secondary teachers available, but those in specialized fields will be in short demand.

I wish to thank the teachers, School Committee, Building Committee, and citizens for their support of good school during the past year.

REPORT OF UNITY BUILDING COMMITTEE

To the Citizens of Unity:

We hereby submit the following report on the activity of the Committee for the fiscal year 1948-1949.

Repairs

The repairs made on the H. S. building this year are:

- 1. Rebuilding back wall.
- 2. Refinishing attic classroom.
- 3. Changing windows in 7-8 grade room to comply with State regulations.
- 4. New regulation type windows in attic classroom, Home Ec. room, and 3 rooms on 1st floor.
- 5. Covering outside walls of building with asphalt insulating board.
 - 6. Moving fire escape to back of building.
 - 7. Rebuilding front porch.
 - 8. Installing 2 new toilets on 2nd floor.
 - 9. Heating for new classroom.
 - 10. Rewiring 2nd floor lights.

After discussion of proposed repairs the committee decided to buy its own materials and to do the work by day labor. Thus was accomplished for \$5,050.00 what a contract job would have cost \$7,000.00 or more.

The Committee feels that the necessary major repairs have now been done on the two school buildings. Painting, repair of cellar wall - Grade Bldg., and other repairs should no doubt be the function of the School Committee.

The Committee has held several meetings this fall to discuss long range planning for our school building needs.

Our superintendent pointed out that the following conditions exist as of the present survey:

- 1. The elementary grades must have 1 more room in the fall of 1949.
- 2. If the Woods school has to close, elementary grades need 2 more rooms in fall of 1949.
 - 3. By 1952 elementary grades will need 9 rooms.
- 4. With present facilites, therefore, the high school will be reduced to 3 classrooms, 2 courses and no new tuition students by fall of 1949 if Woods school has to close; or by 1951 otherwise.
- 5. The high school classrooms will be entirely taken over by the grade pupils by 1952.

In figuring ways to cope with this situation the Committee discussed the following possibilities.

- 1. Adding another story onto the grade school building.
- 2. Three additional rooms on the back of Grade School Building.
- 3. Making another room from the library and superintendent's office in H. S.

(Standard capacity about 15 students)

- 4. Two rooms and gym near H. S.
- 5. Four rooms and gym near H. S.
- 6. Feasibility of utilizing proposed gym as class rooms.
- 7. Building an 8 unit H. S. including gym for Unity students alone.

- 8. Building a 10 unit H. S. including gym for Unity students plus tuition pupils.
 - 9. An area High School:

Many of these suggestions were discarded as either not meeting State Dept. requirements or undesirable because not adequate for a long enough period of time.

In November the Unity Building Committee met with the Albion Building Committee to discuss an area high school. Sentiment of both committees then seemed quite favorable and tentative plans were made for each committee to talk it over with its respective citizens.

At our next building committee meeting the Supt. informed us that the Albion committee had later decided to drop area talk in favor of other plans for Albion alone and that if Unity wished to do anything now it must proceed without them.

Therefore, a joint School and Building Committee decided to hold a public meeting to discuss feasibility of Unitys taking care of its own building needs. Both committees felt that in their own personal opinion a \$100,000 building program would give Unity plus tuition students a very adequate long range facilities.

The public meeting, with about 80 in attendance, at which this program was outlined brought forth some general discussion and various questions as to the advisability of additions etc.

There seemed to be considerable feeling that the town could not afford the \$100,000 set up so at the next joint committee meeting Mr. Harry Brown was instructed to draw up a School District Bill for \$60,000. It was estimated that this sum would build 4 rooms and a gym of new construction to be placed near enough to the H. S. to make use of its water and heating facilities.

This district bill was submitted at a second public

meeting. After considerable discussion it was the opinion of the people present that this bill should not go before legislature, but instead the Town should work to get a Community School Project organized and started within the next 2 or 3 years.

This Community Project, your building committee feels, is the best long range solution for the town if it is not delayed too long; and the committee hopes all citizens will work with other interested towns to bring it to an actuality before we lose both vocational courses and certainly before we lose our high school.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING UNITY, MAINE, MARCH 14, 1949

To Maxwell O. Fortier, a constable of the Town of Unity, in the County of Waldo, State of Maine: Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Unity, in said Waldo County, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Lower Hall, Odd Fellows Building, in said Town on Monday the Fourteenth day of March, A. D. 1949 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- Art. 26. To see whether or not, the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the present fire truck, provided a new one is purchased.
- Art. 27. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise and appropriate for miscellaneous town charges.

Art. 28. To see if the town will, by its vote, set

the time when its taxes assessed and committed to the tax collector for the year 1949 shall become due.

- To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen in behalf of the town to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the town for non-payment of taxes thereon, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.
- Art. 30. To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection of taxes for the ensuing year and establish the price for same.
- Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue Town notes for a time not exceeding one year, the avails to be used in payment of current expenses of the town, provided the same becomes necessary during the ensuing year.
- Art. 32. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$100.00 for public health nursing in Unity, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health for local services.

Recommended by the Budget Committee \$100.00

- Art. 33. To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 more or less for the maintenance of Unity Fire Department. \$600.00
