

## Balance unexpended, \$2.96

The town voted to build four special side walks, the cost of each not to exceed the sum of 200. But where there was material left from the construction of one sidewalk it was taken to another street, and it was impossible to keep the appropriations separate; therefore it was deemed advisable to make a general fund, in order to expend the appropriations to the best advantage. More sidewalk was constructed on the road leading to the house of J. E. and J. M. Gerrish than on the other three roads, as an understanding was made with them and the undersigned that if the town would furnish the material for the sidewalk, they would furnish the labor necessary to construct the walk at an expense not to exceed the appropriation, which was

accordingly done.

### REMARKS.

The amount of money expended, this year, for common schools, exceeds that of the previous year by \$208.02. The epidemic which prevailed so extensively

in the fall of 1899, necessitated the closing of all our schools, thereby decreasing the number of weeks of schooling sixteen weeks. It has been more than made up this year. We have had one hundred and one weeks of school, about twenty-seven weeks more than last year. This includes eight weeks of primary school taught by R. Bickford, in the recitation room of the lower school, which was fitted up by the school committee for that purpose, there not being seats enough in the main room for all the scholars attending school. We deem ourselves most fortunate in having two such teachers as Miss Worcester and Mr. Boker. Both have proved to be thorough teachers and excellent disciplinarians.

#### SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The members comprising the school committee and their term of office are as follows: Jessie Smallidge, two years; George F. Childs, one year; and E. N. Bickford, whose term of office expires at the next annual meeting.

#### IMPROVEMENTS.

Some improvements have been made: A new floor has been laid in the upper schoolroom, and other work done. Both rooms are now in good condition. The committee, in their report, will probably make some recommendations, which they may deem necessary for the com-

## ing year.

#### SCHOOL BOOKS AND APPLIANCES.

There is one bill for books as yet unpaid, amount, \$52.80 less 20 per cent. which, when paid, will leave a balance of \$22.77 to be added to next year's appropriation. Great credit is due Mr. Jesse Smallidge for his efficient care of text books.

#### TRUANTS,

On the whole we have had but little trouble with truants. The State and Town laws have been enforced with excellent results.

#### S. I. L. M.

The two school improvement leagues connected with our schools have added somewhat to the improvements of the previous years, and should receive the commendation and support of all good citizens.

HIGH SCHOOL.

A fourteen weeks' term of high school commenced, December 16, under the management of Mr. Ellis Boker. Mr. Boker is an excellent teacher; and the scholars, as a whole, are doing more practical work and making greater progress than has been accomplished in previous years. We are unable to give the expenditures of the high school, as it will not close until the middle of March. There will probably be a balance of more than one hundred dollars. In conclusion I wish to thank the school committee for their assistance and support during the past year.

#### SCHOOL COMMITTEE.


