Report of Road Commissioner.

To the Citizens of Skowhegan:

As Road Commissioner I herewith hand you my fourth annual report:

The advance in prices of labor and material has made the cost of all work more than in former years.

I have tried several different ways of building walks viz: of crushed brick and crushed stone, and in connection with these materials different proportions of tar and pitch have been used, with the object of doing away with the plank walks and substituting instead a good walk cheaper but with the durability of the regular concrete. About three-fourths of a mile of old plank walk has been renewed with crushed brick and stone and seems to be satisfactory.

The brick walks on Water St. in front of Milburn block and on North side of same street, from Madison, St. to within a short distance of Railroad have been replaced with concrete. The old brick were used in building manholes and catch basins elsewhere.

The North end of Mechanic street has been bettered by changing the walk from East side of the street to the West.

West Front street has been improved, as per vote of town, requiring about 1000 yds stones for wall and road bed and about 1500 yds earth filling.

Lawton street sewer has been extended to junction of Court St.

The old stone sewer leading from Bush St. to Kennebec river has been abandoned and a tile sewer laid from junction of Water St. about 130 feet North on Bush St.

North street sewer has been extended from its former terminus northerly about 930 ft.

The suspension bridge has been completed; also the bridges on Madison and North avenues.

The Bridge at foot of Ross hill, so called, has been rebuilt and the water way made more than twice as large as before.

Judging from our short experience with the snow roller it appears to be a success.

Report of Health Officer.

TO THE TOWN OF SKOWHEGAN:

I submit my report for the year ending Feb. 20th, 1903.

It has been a source of satisfaction to me, that our town has been so free of contagious diseases. For the three years that I have served on the Board of Health, there have been four cases of typhoid fever, two cases of scarlet fever and none of the other severe contagious diseases.

We have had two scares caused by reports of people coming here who had been exposed to small pox. One was a traveling man from Massachusetts who was quarantined two days after leaving our town. The other was caused by a family coming from Shiloh, Me., where there were several cases of the disease; in both instances the circumstances were promptly investigated and no further trouble ensued.

As in years past the largest number of complaints have been on account of earth closets and bad sink drains but at this time I wish to express my thanks to the inhabitants of the town for their hearty co-operation in eliminating these nuisances.

REPORT OF SECRETARY.

March third the town re-elected Mrs. Clementine A. Weston for Park Commissioner, to serve three years.

Work was begun, this year, in April, being similar to that having been done the past three years, clearing up the different parts from leaves and other debris, which must accumulate each year. More work than usual was required upon repairing roads and walks on account of the heavy rains during the season. The fences, seats, and shelters were repaired and the roofs of the shelters painted. Culverts were also repaired.

There was considerable grading done on different parts of the grounds, and many plants and shrubs were bought and set out. The surface of the Park inclosed by the first road was very uneven and it was necessary that the ground should be properly prepared in order that walks could be laid out. The ground was ploughed, harrowed, rolled and sowed with grass, and a new road was also made around this plat.

A little double building was put up on the bank for keeping tools and also for a closet. For the past three years we have sold the grass on the Park for \$20.00. This year there was none. Two trees have been given by Mrs. Elizabeth Burrell and Mrs. Clara B. Moore. A great number of plants were given by Mr. Danforth, the florist. From the Skowhegan Park Association, Mrs. Helen Doran, Treasurer, money was given to the Park Commissioners for the building of the buttresses at the entrance. Some sixty-three dollars is left toward building something permanent the coming season. An arc light has been put on the grounds. The Town Improvement Society donated five dellars to be expended by its committee in plants and shrubs for the north side. There is an abundance of work needed for the next year. Walks to be laid out, the new road to be finished, shrubs and trees to be put out on the newly finished plat, and there should be iron seats in this part as well as plants in beds, etc. We hope the town will help us to continue in the good work.

TO THE CITIZENS OF SKOWHEGAN:-

Since the publication of the report of this committee recommending the Town Council act for your consideration as an improvement upon the present form of town government the various discussions to which that report has given rise seem to demand another word from your committee. The committee carefully considered the question of a city charter and also of certain modifications in our town meeting and finally decided upon the Town Council form of government, as all things considered, the best for our citizens.

While at the present time our people are probably not ready for this important change we believe that there are certain steps in the line of improvement which may be made at once.

For these reasons your committee would make this supplemental report. A simple modification of the present form of town meeting such as would diminish some of the abuses seems the most feasible step at the present moment, and therefore your committee recommend that the town take such action as to bring about the following changes, and if necessary take steps to procure from the legislature a special act enabling them to make these changes.

First—that on the first Monday in March—or the second if the town shall so vote, no other business shall be transacted except the election of officers, that on that day the polls be opened from eight until five o'clock and that the check list be used.

Second—that at this meeting a committee of seven be elected to report upon all articles in the town warrant which shall seem to them to demand explanation or information in order that the voters may act intelligently upon them.

Third—that on the following Monday the town shall meet to consider and vote upon the business of the town as covered by the articles in the warrant.

Fourth—that the corporation be abolished and its affairs be united with those of the town proper.

Warrant for Town Meeting.

To Henry K. White, Constable of the Town of Skowhegan in the County of Somerset, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Skowhegan qualified to vote in town affairs to meet at Coburn Hall in said town on Monday the second day of March, A. D. 1903, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles, to wit:

First. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a Town Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the poor, and all other officers required by law to be chosen at the annual March meeting.

Third. To see if the town will elect a Road Commissioner for the ensuing year.

Fourth. To see if the town will elect a Superintendent of schools for the ensuing year.

Fifth. To see if the town will elect a Park Commissioner to serve three years.

Sixth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing highways in said town and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Seventh. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of four hundred dollars, to be expended in repairing the Notch road —two hundred dollars to be refunded by the State, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Eighth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for making and repairing bridges and culverts in said town and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Ninth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for breaking snow roads the present winter, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Tenth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for support of the poor and defray town expenses for the ensuing year, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Eleventh. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the necessary repairs of cemeteries in town, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Twelfth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to defray the expenses of Memorial day under such directions as may be deemed proper, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same. Thirteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of one hundred dollars to be expended for fence wire to be used for fencing in different localities, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Fourteenth. To see if the town will vote to light the bridges across the river in the village, and pass all votes necesary respecting the same.

Fifteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the improvement of Coburn park and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Sixteenth. To see if the town will vote to support arc lights on Coburn park, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Seventeenth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the support of schools in said town for the ensuing year and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Eighteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase text books and school supplies for the schools the ensuing year and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Nineteenth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for a Free High school the ensuing year and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Twentieth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repairs of school houses in said town the ensuing year, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Twenty-first. To see if the town will vote to extend the macadamizing on Water street from the point where it now is macadamized near the juncture of Water and High streets easterly to the entrance of Coburn Park and raise a sum of money for the same, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Twenty-second. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of eight hundred dollars for rebuilding the road across the Island, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Twenty-third. To see if the town will vote to build a bridge across the Kennebec river at or near Kennebec street, in said town, and raise a sum of money for the same, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Twenty-fourth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of replacing the bridge across the Wesserrunset stream, on the Canaan road near S. F. Steward's and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Twenty-fifth. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to introduce manual training into the schools.

Twenty-sixth. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of two hundred dollars, bequeathed to the inhabitants of said town by Huldah Parlin, late of Skowhegan, deceased, and hold the same in trust and apply the yearly income as per the terms of said bequest, to the care of the Amos F. Parlin burial lot, in the North side cemetery, in said town.

Twenty-seventh. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of five hundred dollars bequeathed to the inhabitants of said town by Helen Robinson, late of Skowhegan, deceased, and hold the same in trust and apply the yearly income as per the terms of said bequest, to the care of the Helen Robinson burial lot in the cemetery in said town.

Twenty-eighth. To see if the town will vote to sell the cemetery lot on Parkman hill, or raise a sum of money for the purpose of fencing the same, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Twenty-ninth. To see what action the town will take relative to the Austin farm (so called) and the title to the same, and pass such votes in regard thereto as will enable the town officers to make conveyance of the rights of the town therein.

Thirtieth. To see if the town will vote to extend the sidewalk from a point near Dr. Pulsifer's office up Court street to High street, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Thirty-first. To see if the Town will vote to have our annual March meeting occur on the second Monday in March the fiscal year ending Feb. 20th.

Thirty-second. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars for the Public Library and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

Thirty-third. To see what compensation the Town will vote to pay its school committee, and pass all votes necessary respecting the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters on Saturday, February 28, 1903, at two o'clock in the afternoon.
