Annual Report of Water Commission

Following is our annual report of the Water Commission for the year 1935.

We have very little to report for the past year, as our activities for the year have been practically all routine, we having made no extensions or improvements except our regular repairs to our dams and reservoirs.

During the past year we purchased a new chlorinator of the most modern type, Wallace & Tiernan, at a price of \$675.00, and turned in our old chlorinator for \$100.00.

As to finances of the Water Co., as our financial report shows, we retired \$4,000.00 of our water bonds on Oct. 1st, which reduces our indebtedness to \$,8000.00 and we had on hand as of Jan. 1st \$6,314.64, with which we can probably retire \$4,000.00 or \$5,000.00 on April 1st. We believe that in the very near future that we should divert some of our funds to the rebuilding of Cooper Spring dam, and relaying our supply line around the summit from the Sam King pasture to Howland's meadow. Both jobs would cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000.00, but our storage would be increased about 400% and the capacity of our supply line would be increased about 100%.

Art. 9. To see if the corporation will appropriate the income from the water system from the sale of water and other income of the water system to defray the expense of maintenance, pay for extensions, and pay the interest on the water bonds and other water loans.

Art. 11. To see if the corporation will vote to buy new ladders for the Ladder truck and raise money for same.
