Annual Report of Water Commission

Such large and unusual expenditures of money were involved in the operation of the Water Works during the year 1936 that we feel that we should explain to the citizens as briefly as possible the complete details of our operations, together with some recommendations for the future.

The floods of last spring destroyed our Cooper Spring Dam and undermined our 12 inch Main crossing the river at Park Street Bridge, resulting in it eventually breaking apart under water, and drifting several feet down stream. In attempting to repair the main we employed Green & Wilson of Waterville at an expense of \$255.59 plus the expense of our own crew; but we found it inadvisable to repair the old main, and decided by a vote of the Corporation, to lay a new 12 inch flexible joint pipe 5 feet under the bed of the river at a different location. This we did at a net cost of \$3,119.52; then to take up and re-lay the old 12 inch line from the new crossing to Park Street at south end of bridge, we spent \$167.11, making a total of \$3,842.22 expense on 12 inch main.

For several years we have been studying the problem of increased water supply for our village; the only solution of this seemed to be a new dam at Cooper Spring Brook, and the re-laying a part of our supply line which would have cost approximately \$24,000.00. Therefore, after the loss of the dam by flood, our last annual Corporation meeting authorized the expenditure of \$10,000 for building a dam at Cooper Spring Brook, as a start towards increased water supply.

Fortunately for South Paris, Mr. Stephen B.

Church of Seymour, Conn., came into the picture at this time, and after making tests at a cost of \$350.00, to us, made a proposition to install a well and pump to furnish 400 gallons of water per minute at a price of \$6,765.00 for his part of the job. He later raised his guarantee to 500 gallons per minute for \$751.59 extra. This, together with \$300.00 for purchase of land of Everett Farrar, \$700.00 for building the pump house, and \$1,133.43 for pipe and fittings, freight, 6 inch main extensions, board of men, wiring, trucking, etc., made a total cost of \$10,000.00 for the finished job.

Since we began supplying the village with water from the new well on December 9, we have operated the pump on an average of five to five and one-half hours per day, which will probably be increased to from seven to eight hours in the summer months. The cost of pumping is about 50 cents per hour for electric current.

While the original purpose of this well was for an auxiliary to our old system, the quality and quantity of water from the well is such that we believe the citizens of the village will demand its use 100% in the future. If this is the case, we should install another well and pump, and abandon the old supply entirely, as at present we are obliged to keep Stony Brook Dam, supply line, and chlorinator in readiness for use in case of accident to pump or lack of power. A well and pump of smaller capacity with a combination of electric and Deisel power would be desirable as an auxiliary to our present well.

As to the finances of the Water Works, as the auditors' report shows, we made a net profit in 1936 of \$5,000.00, and we have on hand nearly \$8,000.00 in cash with which we propose to retire the remaining \$3,000.00 of bonds, and pay off about \$4,000.00 of the \$14,000.00 temporary loan which we made in 1936.

To see if the inhabitants of the South Paris Village Corporation will vote to authorize the Water Commission to contract for an additional "Church" well, as an auxiliary to the one already in use and to raise money for same and will authorize the Water Commission to hire sufficient money to pay for same and authorize the Commission with the Treasurer of the corporation to execute a note or notes for the amount so raised or for the cost of the additional well.

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the corporation will grant and raise for the care of the fire alarm system.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the corporation will grant and raise for night watchman.

Art. 15. To see if the corporation will vote to buy Workmen's Compensation for employees of the corporation and raise money for same.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the corporation will grant and raise to defray the expense of the Fire Department for the ensuing year.

Art. 17. To see if the South Paris Village Corporation will vote to accept and take over from the Town of Paris the sewer system within the limits of the Village corporation to be maintained under the provision of Chapter 80 of the Public Laws of 1923, under such terms as may be agreed upon between the Town of Paris and said Village corporation as to taking care of the surface water.

Art. 18. To see what sum of money the Village Corporation will grant and raise for the support and maintenance for sewer within the limits of the Village Corporation.

Art. 19. To see if the corporation will vote to locate a street light on Hill Street near the residence of Carl Hakala.

Art. 20. To see if the corporation will vote to locate a hydrant on Hill Street near the residence of Carl Hakala.

Art. 21. To see if the corporation will vote to have a curfew law, fix the terms thereof, and instruct the night watchman to enforce the same; or appoint a committee to draw up such an ordinance and report at a later meeting.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the corporation will grant and raise for miscellaneous bills for the ensuing year.

Art. 23. To see if the corporation will authorize the treasurer to make temporary loans to meet current expenses and interest on corporation bonds and notes.

Art. 24. To see if the corporation will allow any discount of taxes paid or charge interest on unpaid taxes, fix the rate for same and the time or times when discount will be allowed or interest charged.

Art. 25. To see if the corporation will vote to pay for the bonds for Collector and Treasurer and to raise money for that purpose.

Art. 26. To act on any other business that may properly come before said meeting.
