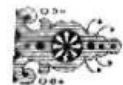

Winter term taught by Nellie B. Charles, 9 weeks at \$6.50 per week, including board, amt., \$58.50.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

The winter term of 1902 on account of sickness was two weeks short which has been kept out this year.

Spring term taught by Cora B. Emerson, 9 weeks at \$5.50, including board amt., \$49.50.

Fall term taught by Ethel Guphill, 9 weeks at \$5.50 per week, including board, \$49.50.

Winter term taught by Louise Chandler 10 weeks at \$6.00 per week, including board, amt., \$60.00.

DISTRICT NO. 5.

Spring term taught by Eda Bickford. 8 weeks at \$5.50 per week including board. \$44.00.
