Warrant for Town Meeting

To Edward Hodsdon, constable of the Town of Stow, County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Stow, qualified by law to wote in town affairs to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday, the fourth day of March A. D. 1935, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To allow accounts.
- Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assesors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year and grant their salaries.
 - Art. 5. To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year.
 - Art. 6. To choose a school committee for three years.
 - Art. 7. To choose a road commissioner for ensuing year.
 - Art. 8. To choose all other town officers for ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for common schools for ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repairs of roads and bridges for ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay town officers.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for school books, apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in section 19 of chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of (\$300.00) three hundred dollars or more for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Sec. 19, Chapter 28 Revised Statutes of 1930 or under the provisions of Sec. 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Aid highway during the ensuing year within the limits of the town under the provisions of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay overdrawn bills.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for high school purposes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to give a two per cent discount on all taxes paid before July 1st.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise money for maintenance of third class road, such sum cannot be less than \$217.00 as per State requirements.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to cut bushes on the State Aid highways within the limits of the town.
- Art. 24. To see if the sum of \$15.00 or more will be raised for school nursing in the town of Stow, under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare.
- Art. 25. To see what disposal the town will vote to make of any money received from the Federal Reserve during the present fiscal year, such money must be used for roads or schools to be according to law.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$180.00 for Mother's Aid.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for a doctor at North Fryeburg.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to plow the dooryards with the snow plow.
- Art. 29. To see if the town will vote for one half of all orders drawn after June 1st, to be turned in on taxes until paid.
- Art. 30. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session at the Town House at nine o'clock on Monday, March 4, 1935, in the forenoon, to revise the list of voters.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Stow:

Herewith my twelfth annual report of the progress, conditions and needs of the schools of the Town of Stow.

Schools began September 10, 1934, with the following teachers: Village, Ruth Keyes, West Pembroke; Union Hill, Merrill G. Safford, Monmouth.

I am pleased to report that upon application, we received the sum of \$58.00 from the State as Equalization for the purpose of aiding in extending the length of the school year. It is proposed as noted above to extend the winter and coming spring terms one week each.

If the appropriation recommended be granted, we should be able, if there be no marked reduction in the amount to be received from the State in 1935, to extend the school year and return to our former year of 36 weeks. I urge that this be made possible this year.

We received also from the Equalization Fund the sum of \$50.00 with which to assist in paying for the new desks at the village building. These new movable desks are very satisfactory and I recommend that a sufficient number be purchased this year for the Union Hill building.

A new stove at the village building would be a good investment. The old stove is a fuel waster and generally unsatisfactory now in its ripe old age. A new large box stove would cost, installed, around \$20.00. Our recommendation for the repair account does not include this item. If a stove is to be considered, the amount of at least \$20.00 should be appropriated above the recommendation.

There is available no Federal Free Milk this year but we have recently received a considerable quantity of canned beef soup from the Federal Emergency Relief Administration for use in the noon lunch.

The chimneys at both buildings should be equipped with metal or brick chimney caps to prevent the accumulation of snow in the flues during week ends and vacations with consequent trouble and damage to the interiors of the buildings.

We have two students at Fryeburg Academy and three elementary pupils in the Fryeburg schools for which we pay tuition.

For the times, I think, our schools are successful. Our teachers seem to be satisfactory. Our buildings are in fair shape. We do need new books and more instructional material. For instance, most of our geographies are pre-war books with pre-war maps. Our histories need to be changed. At least \$100.00 should be made available for the Text Book Account.
