Warrant for Town Meeting

To Irving Bryant, Constable of the Town of Stow, County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Stow, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to meet at the town house in said town on Monday, the second day of March A. D. 1936 at ten o'cleck in the foremoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To allow accounts.
- Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor for the ensuing year, and vote their compensation.
- Art. 5. To choose a Town Treasurer for the ensuing year and vote compensation.
 - Art. 6. To choose a school committee for three years.
 - Art. 7. To choose a road commissioner for ensuing year.
 - Art. 8. To choose all other town officers for ensuing year.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for common schools for the ensuing year.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repairs of roads and bridges for ensuing year.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for the support of poor for the ensuing year.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for town officers for ensuing year.
- Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for school books, apparatus and appliances for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.
- Art. 15. To see what sum the town will appropriate for State Aid road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sec. 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930 or the provisions of Sec. 3, Chap. 173, Public Laws of 1935.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for maintenance of State Aid highway during ensuing year within the limits of the town under the provisions of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to pay overdrawn bills.
- Art. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for repair of schoolhouses for the ensuing year.
- Art. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise for high school purposes for ensuing year.
- Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to procure a temporary loan or loans in anticipation of taxes for the purpose of paying indebtedness of the town, such notes to be paid during the current municipal year out of money raised during said current municipal year by taxes.
- Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to give a two per cent discount on all taxes paid before July 1st, 1936.
- Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise money for maintenance of third class road, such sum cannot be less than \$183.00 as per State requirements.
- Art. 23. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to cut bushes on the State Aid highways within the limits of the town.
- Art. 24. To see if the sum of \$15.00 or more will be raised for school nursing in the town of Stow under the auspices of the Bureau of Health of the State Department of Health and Welfare.
- Art. 25. To see what disposal the town will vote to make of any money received from the Federal Reserve during the present fiscal year, such money must be used for roads or schools to be according to law.
- Art. 26. To see if the town will vote to grant and raise \$130.00 for Mother's Aid.
- Art. 27. To see if the town will vote for one-half of all orders drawn after June 1st to be turned in on taxes until paid.
- Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase sign boards for reads.
- Art. 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on Monday, March 2nd, 1936, to revise the list of voters.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Stow:

Herewith my thirteenth annual report of the progress, condition and needs of the schools of the Town of Stow:

Schools began for the school year of 1935-36 on Sept. 9, 1935.

The following teachers were employed: Village, Ruth Keyes, West Sullivan; Union Hill, Merrill G. Safford, Monmouth.

By means of the appropriation made by the town and by the help of the State in the School Fund and the sum of \$60.00 received from the Equalization Fund, we are able to extend our school year to one of 36 weeks. This conforms to the school year in the pre-depression years. The town does well in this. Many towns are not able to have a 36 week school year and some never have had such.

New desks were purchased for the Union Hill School during the last summer vacation. Our school seating problem is now solved for some years to come. The schools are now completely equipped with the most up-to-date school seating. Every pupil has an individual, modern, movable chair desk. No other town in this school union can approach this condition at the present time.

A new stove was purchased for the village building. New window shades were hung in both buildings. During the next school year I recommend that the interior of the village building be redecorated in colors which will be more attractive and cheery and which will improve the light conditions. We still need metal chimney caps to prevent the snow from clogging the flues.

New geographies, Stull and Hatch, with work books to accompany the same, new Grade VIII U. S. Histories and new reading material for the lower grades have been purchased. The usual supplies and teaching materials are in use. Whenever text books are purchased we take particular care that such be the latest editions and are the best obtainable.

The most helpful feature of our schools this year, I think, is the fact that the school year has been extended to its former length of thirty-six weeks.


